Cotton Recommended. A year ago, when the cotton pro
ducer was suffering from a low mat ket due to the large cotton crop various suggestions were offered along the line of substituting cotton for jute, a outlined by Senator Ransdell. As the
result of the Mayfield-Connally amend ment to the agricultural' appropriation bill the Department of Agricul ture made a study to find new uses for cotton. More than 75,000 tons of
jute and more than $900,000,000$ yard jute and more than $900,000,000$ yards
of jute cloth are imported here annually from India.
"It would make a large dent in the cotton surplus to replace even half of the imports with American cotton,"
