The price paid is said to have been \$640,000

The Kokernet ranch has hereto fore been in the possession of the Kokernet brothers of San Antonio and, like many another huge trac of land in this section of Texas, has long been a means of retarding the country's develoyment by reason of the fact that its owners have persistently refused to dispose it in small tracts to smit the farm er of moderate means. Bert E. Nash is given as the name of the gentleman who was here last Monday and who closed up the deal for the property. Mr. Nash is from Chicago, but it is understood that he represents a syndicate of purchasers, who will immediately throw the land on the market in tracts to suit purchasers, thus solving another of the Plainview country's many difficult problems of development. The name of the conern which Mr. Nash represents huld not be learned at this end of line this week. He passed through town last Monday, but at that time no inkling of the big deal had leaked out, and consequently no details of it were obtained from him.

> > A message from Amarillo Friday afternoon stated that about ten inches of snow had fallen in that city, and it is stated that the thermometer registered zero Thursday night.


At Canyon City it is stated that about four inches of snow had fallen rnd the thermometer Friday afternoon registered twenty degrees above.

************** **Definition of Money** By Col. F. B. Adams, Central Plains

College.

Much ingenuity has been spent upon attempts to define money, and puzzling questions have arisen as to the precise kinds of credit documents which are to be included under the term. Standard legal tender coin of full weight is undoubtedly money, and as convertible legal tender bank notes are exactly equivalent to the coined money for which they may at any moment be exchanged, it has often been considered that these also may be included. But inconvertible notes are often made legal tender by law, and can discharge in inland trade all the functions of money. Are they not then to be included? The question will next arise whether cheques may not be as good as money.
