## STORM IS GENERAL

" How would you like to be in Amarillo now?' is the question one requently heard on the streets of Plainview Friday morning.
Amarillo has the reputation of being the coldest spot in the Panhandle of Texas, whether justly or unjustly remains for Amarillo herself to show. The Panhandle is oot an unusually cold country, but at times, like other countries, the thermometer helps out the clothing man. This was proven Thursday night. For when the citizens of Plainview awoke to the dawn of a new day Friday they were greeted by the worst blizzard that has vis Texas in two years. The country of
Terrific wind had beaten the snow through every possible cràk and crevice in buildings, until the interior of some Plainview homes had snow
pfled ùp an incin or more inside the walls. It came through even the hingles on the roofs.

Reports from various other points in the Panhandle show that the blizzard was general throughthe blizzard was general through-
out this section of country. The snowfall here was about an inch but the wind caused it to form in drifts, sometimes as high as two and three feet. The busiuess streets of town were practically free from it, while around corners and in spots protected from wind it accumulated in quantities that were astonishing.

upon attempts to define money, and puzzling questions have arisen as to the precise kinds of credit documents which are to be included under the term. Standard legal tender coin of full weight is undoubtedly money, and as convertible legal tender bank notes are exactly equivalent to the coined money for which they may has often been considered that these also may be included. But inconvertible notes are often made legal tender by law, and can discharge in inland trade all the functions of money. Are they not then to be included? The question will next arise whether money.
All such attempts at definition seem to me to involve the logical blunder of supposing that we may, by settling the meaning of a single word, avoid all the complex
differences and various conditions of many things, each requiring its own definition. Bullion, standard coin, token coin, convertible and inconvertible notes, legal tender and not legal tender, cheques of several kinds, mercantile bills, exchequer bills, stock certificates, etc., are all things capable of being receired in payment of a debt, if the debter is willing to pay and
the creditor to receive them; but the creditor to receive them; but
