When collected revenue was not enough to pay the bills, the
ospital came close to closing. The formation of the hospital district and employing a manage ment company saved the day. Now, Medicare, Medicaid, and indigent care, along with stringent government regulations de mands that changes be made at the hospital. Inspectors have

Mr. Phipps presented a slide

ing facts about the wind farm. The turbine towers are 226 -feet tall and weigh 207,000 pounds. They cost about $\$ 1.3$ million each to build and install. The blades are over 90 -feet long.
The wind turbines are controlled by a huge generator and computer system mounted on top
of the towers behind the blades. Phipps and his co-worker ascend the towers by climbing up inside. They perform routine maintenance for the owners of owners who furnish the ranch erty for the wind turbines ceive approximately $\$ 2,000$ per tower per year in rental income.
