

He runs fast. Chieftain football fans are already familiar with the speed of Juan Reyes, a junior wide receiver and all-district defensive back who thrilled fans with his "out-of-nowhere" pass deflections.

Reyes, the son of Eva Monreal of Friona, has

taken his speed to the asphalt. "I've been in track since junior high," Reyes said, "but this is my first year to run the 100." And a good decision it has

At the Friona track meet March 3-4, Reyes set a new school record in the 100m dash, posting a blazing 10.52. The previous school record was held by Andy Kendrick who set the record of 10.71 in 1997, according to school sports historian Bill Ellis

Reyes' time is currently the fastest posted in all classifications in the Panhandle this year in the Amarillo Globe-News and Lubbock Avalanche Journal track rankings. The nearest time to Reyes is Green of

Sweetwater at 10.57 and Glynn of Lubbock Estacado at 10.64.

In addition to the 100m dash, Reyes has clocked a 22.18 in the 200m dash ranking him 4th in the Lubbock Avalanche Journal stats and a 50.83 in the 400m, ranking 5th behind runners from Tahoka, Hart, Cooper

and Levelland. He also participates in the mile relay.

During the Friona track meet, Reyes suffered a slight injury to his upper thigh which he says is now fully recuperated. He has also participated in the long jump with a best of 22'2" but will not enter the high jump event at today's district meet in Tulia. Coaches are concerned that he might aggravate the thigh injury in the strain of long jumping.

The District 6-2A track meet at Tulia begins at 9:30

a.m. with the 3200m run. Running prelims start at 10:15 a.m. Field events start at 1 p.m. and the running finals are scheduled for a 5 p.m. start.

Water level declines in 2005

surements made in early 2006 by the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 show an average decrease of 0.54 of a foot in groundwater levels of Ogallala aquifer during 2005 within the district's 6.8 million acre service As a comparison, the 2005 depth-to-water level measurements had indicated an average increase of 0.74 feet during 2004.

The district 10-year average annual change decreased from -0.99 of a foot for the 2005 report to -0.84 of a foot for the current report. The district five-year average annual change decreased from -0.70 of a foot for the 2005 report to -0.58 of a foot for the current report.

The district portions of Armstrong Randall Counties as well as Lynn County reported an average increase in water levels of less than a foot for 2005. The district portion of Potter County reported no average change in water levels. The remaining eleven district counties reported average water level declines. Of these, eight counties had declines of less than one foot.

District officials say the previous average increase of 0.74 of a foot during 2004 was a relatively rare phenomenon, which may have continued to affect water levels in observation wells into 2005. Extraordinary filling of cones of depression during 2004 resulting from greater than normal precipitation and the resulting reduced pumpage could have allowed for greater migration of water into deficit areas, which would have filled most residual cones of depression. This may have tem-porarily delayed drawdown of water

groundwater generally results in a decrease in water-level declines; however, additional groundwater pumpage may be needed if normal or drier than normal climatic conditions prevail during the 2006 growing season.

Depth-to-water level measurements are normally made during January to March each year to allow stabilization of water levels in the aquifer following pumpage during the previous year of groundwater production.

The current issue of the High Plains Water District's newsletter, The Cross Section, features the results of the annual 2006 depth-to-water level measurements. It contains individual county

location of each well in the district's observation well network. Each map is accompanied by available 1996, 2001, and 2006 depth-to-water level measurements for individual wells in that county. Also listed are available total changes in water levels for each observation well for the periods 1996 to 2006, 2001 to 2006, and 2005 to 2006.

courthouse third floor. The commissioners re-issued the burn ban for Parmer County. Residents of the county are reminded to use the three designated dumpsites for their household trash. Those sites are:

Friona-Monday through Friday 12:30 p.m. to 5:30 p.m. and located east of the Hwy. 214 bridge, south of Friona.

Lazbuddie-Monday through Friday, 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. and located on

Stadium Drive ¼ mile west of the Lazbuddie school.

Bovina-24 hours a day, 7 days a week and located on the east side of

There is no charge for dumping during the Burn Ban.

Violators of the Burn Ban are responsible for any damages incurred as a result of a fire. There is up to a \$500 fine for throwing trash in bar ditches

Amendments to the Burn Ban were instituted at the March 27 session. Those amendments include pit burning on days that are foggy, rainy and

Sharon and I met with the lady one evening at her home in a nice part of Dallas. She was pleasant and polite. We answered her questions, gave her our background, kids ages, what we required, and expressed our concerns about finding the right per-

She said she thought we should consider a woman named Maria. She said she would have Maria there at our next meeting so we could meet her. Sharon and I were nervous. We hoped we were smart enough to pick the right person.

Employing a stranger to feed and bathe and look after the safety of our little ones was not a decision that we took lightly. No caring parent would. Not to mention the guilt that crept in, bringing in a stranger to take the place of mommy and daddy.

We met Maria and it was pretty much instant acceptance. She was mid-30s but like many her comrades, looked older. Maria had a big smile. A permanent one. Her eyes twinkled too. was energetic and cooperative but had a certain take-charge authority about her too. We liked Maria and she liked us.

The details were worked out. She would live with us Monday through Friday. We paid her

Every Friday night I drove Maria to her East Dallas enclave, down a couple of back streets to her apartment. On Sunday night I drove back to pick her up at 8 p.m. She spoke just enough English to communicate but not enough to carry on a conversa-Over the months she was with us she tried to teach us to speak Spanish and laughed out loud when we butchered the lan-

On occasion while she was home on weekends Maria would go to a local Mexican market and buy the ingredients for her recipe for Mexican salsa. She would make the salsa and bring it to us in big quart jars. It was the best Mexican salsa I have ever had.

The kids loved Maria. She made them mind but she was kind about it. She spoiled them in her own way and they weren't always happy when Maria wasn't there on weekends. She often brought them Mexican candy and Mexican sodas. She had them speaking Spanish. They had their own special words and phrases that Sharon and I had no clue what they were saying.

We liked Maria. We were careful about not taking advantage of the situation and overworking her just because we could We

respected her time even though the kids didn't always. Maria had her own bedroom and bathroom. We furnished a TV and linens and towels and furniture.

She would put the kids to bed at night if we needed her to. But she thought, and told us so, that we should tuck them in. She was right, of course. After all, they were ours.

Maria had a son of her own, just a little older than ours. He stayed in East Dallas with a grandmother during the week. Maria didn't seem to mind. Her room had a phone and she talked to him often. A few times we allowed her to bring him over and play with Kirsten and Casey.

She was part of our family for more than a year. The kids got older. We moved from Irving to near downtown Dallas and enrolled them in a private school so they didn't need a nanny anymore. There were a few tears when she left us for the last

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

Recently, a bill was introduced in the U.S. Senate that would expedite the access of new drugs that might benefit terminally ill patients-S.1956 titled Access Act.

Suppose that you have a loved one with a life-threatening illness or a degenerative disease and all approved chemotherapy has failed, and the doctor says there is a new drug that has worked well with the type illness of your loved one, but the FDA won't let your doctor use the drug as your loved one is NOT in a clinical trial for that drug.

Or perhaps that loved one is in a clinical trial where 50% of the participants unwittingly receive a sugar pill.

This bill would allow terminally ill patients who are not part of a clinical trial to have access to promising new treatments while they are alive.

The bill would prohibit placebo (sugar pill) or non-treatment in any clinical investigation with respect to any life threatening

Probably we all know or have known someone who perhaps would or could have benefited from access to a new drug.

I urge you to write your senators and ask their support of this bill. The bill is now (as of March 4, 2006) in the Senate Committee on Health and Education.

I would be glad to send a copy of the bill.

Guest James Phipps presented a program on wind turbines. Phipps was a coach here about 10 years ago but has since left coaching and works for the Mitsubishi Corp. He lives in San Jon, New Mexico, and is part of an operations and maintenance crew responsible for 80 wind turbines.


Mr. Phipps presented a slide show and gave some interest-ing facts about the wind farm. tall and weigh 207,000 pounds. They cost about \$1.3 million each to build and install. The blades are over 90-feet long. The wind turbines are controlled by a huge generator and computer system mounted on top

Phipps and his co-workers ascend the towers by climbing up inside. They perform routine maintenance for the owners of the towers. He said the ranch owners who furnish the property for the wind turbines receive approximately \$2,000 per tower per year in rental income. One landowner at his location in San Jon has 30 turbines on his property.

It was an interesting and eveopening program on the subject of wind farms. Thanks to Lion Kevin Wiseman for arranging the program. Have a pleasant and happy Easter.

Need for rooms is stressed

A fund drive to finance an addition to Parmer County Community Hospital was begun in Friona this week. It is hoped that funds can be raised in a short time, so that construction on the much-needed additional rooms

Teams of local citizens began canvassing the city and area last weekend, and will have a breakfast meeting Friday morning to report the results of the first week's efforts.

Plans call for the addition of 10 new private rooms to the hosa cost of approximately \$75,000.The rooms, which will measure 13 by 14-6, will be designed to convert into semi-private rooms, and actually give the hospital room for an additional


While there is no particular goal for the current drive, Charles Allen, general chairman, set a goal of at least \$5,000 for each team, which is working, and there are

The hospital also has some lots on Highway 60 that it is inter in selling. Then, too, there is \$13,000 in the building fund at present.

H.E. Barnett, hospital administrator, pointed out that a contract cannot be let until a sufficient amont of money is available. With winter rapidly approaching, it is now doubtful that the addition can be constructed in time for the "rush period," but it is hoped that construction can begin before weather becomes too inclement.

Team captains for the drive include Andy Hurst, Flake Barber, Dick Rockey, C.V. Potts, Mrs. Claude Osborn, Mrs. Marty Martinez, A.L. Black, W.D. Buske, Porter Roberts and J.B. Buske.

At the kickoff breakfast last week, it was explained that the hospital is showing a 10 per cent increase in the use of its facilities this year over last.








Notes from a friend...

This time every year I set out to read through the Gospel accounts of the last week of Jesus' ministry. Being attentive to the events leading Jesus to the Cross always stirs my thoughts and moves my heart. Simply, exposure to this message of God's love has an effect upon me.

My assignment with this article is to answer the question: How do we apply the truths of the suffering, death, and resurrection of Christ to our lives? The discipline of Bible study, prayer, and personal worship are worthwhile and needful activities of every person who calls upon Christ as Lord. However, applying these activities by human effort alone will not accomplish what God has purposed for us.

The message of the cross and the resurrection are not about what we can do, but all about what Christ has accomplished for us. Applying the truths concerning Jesus' suffering and death upon the cross and His victory over the grip of death requires only one thing of us. FAITH!

Jesus described faith very simply as being "childlike". A child has the capacity to believe and trust those whom he/she is depending upon. That is what He requires of us, nothing more, and nothing less. How can a person apply the truths of the Easter message to their life? This Easter, become dependent upon the Lord Jesus Christ.

The cross was a Roman tool of execution. It was an offense to everyone guilty of a crime. Jesus transformed the cross into the tool by which He transferred to Himself our guilt and sin in exchange for His rightness before the Father. We literally become children of God by adoption. The apostle Paul said it this way: "For He made Him (Jesus) who knew no sin to be sin for us, that we might become the righteous-

When we apply what Christ accomplished upon the cross (by believing/trusting/depending upon Him) it will affect every aspect of our lives. The promise of life that lasts forever is imparted when we look, to Him with childlike faith. Though physical death is certain, the assurance that we will emerge, like Christ, from our grave is


Being perfect in love

In the middle of the "Sermon on the Mount" Jesus says this: Be perfect, therefore as your heavenly Father is perfect.

If one takes the last verse of the passage out of context, it might seem like a call to endless anxiety. Who can be mistake-free? Who can have perfect knowledge? Who can have perfect social skills or physical abilities? Who could take such a passage seriously without going crazy? The key to understanding this verse about perfection, however, comes when we see the context of the remark.

This whole passage is about loving not only the people whom it is easy or even "natural" to love, but also loving our enemies. If we grow in the Christian life so much that the disposition to love is fixed firmly in our hearts, if our eyes focus so consistently on the object of our faith-Jesus Christ-that we can do nothing but love all whom we encounter, whether or not they are "friendly" or "lovable," then we are "going on to perfection." In his many writings explaining Jesus' call to perfection as a call to perfect love, Wesley tried to deal with many of the objections to perfection. However, for Wesley perfection meant nothing more or less than the scriptural injunction to love all, including our enemies.

The Dust Bowl Days

by C. L. Vestal

Editor's Note: My friend, C. L. Vestal, wrote this story for the second volume of Parmer County history, Progress". It is a "Prairie Progress". It is a first-hand account of the "dirty thirties" in Friona and the Texas Panhandle. DB

When we moved to Parmer County [Friona] in the late 1920's, there were few fences and they all had dust blown into them. In some places the dust had shifted across the road and the comment among the people was: "Oh, that [land] should never had been broken

In the early 30's, we had dry years and crop failures. The Depression was in full swing and farmers didn't have the money to buy tractors. Many were still farming to buy trac-Many were still farming with horses and mules, but the farmer didn't grow enough feed for the animals. The year 1934 was a very dry year. The farmers had sled(s) with a knife on the side that would cut the feed off even with the ground, then they would catch it by hand, and pile it on the sled. This would be hauled to the barn to be fed to the cows and horses. This type of operation left the fields bare and powdery, caus-ing soil erosion. This condition prevailed from Canada to

The beginning

One Sunday in early March of 1935, my mother and dad and I had Sunday dinner with friends, Mr. and Mrs. Ed New, who had moved west from Lamar County after we had moved here from Grayson About mid-afternoon we saw coming out of the west a dark red cloud made up of thousands of little whirlwinds jammed together, each one trying to get in the lead. We went back into the house and Dad sat down looking out of a south window. Mr. New was in the kitchen looking out the door. He had his left hand resting on a broom by the door facing. Mother, Mrs. New and I went in the bedroom to watch the storm out of the west window, but the dust hit before we got to the window, and as quick as the snap of your fingers-there was total darkness.


couldn't see it! Mother and Mrs. New were uttering a few prayers on our behalf, and wondering what was going to happen next. Mrs. New, looking back into the kitchen, and saw that her stove still had a burner going, and since no self-respecting housewife would let the world come to an end with her cook stove still burning said, "Ed, turn off that burner, please." So Mr. New turned around and walked across that ten-foot room, turned off the burner, and went back to the door to continue watching the storm. He began laughing and Mrs. New said, this is no time to laugh.'

The total darkness seemed to last for about 20 minutes, but I'm sure it wasn't but about three or four minutes By then the darkness had changed from black to red. Visibility became a little better after the onslaught of the After the cloud had moved on, we realized that the world had not ended. Mr New then apologized and told why he had laughed. As it turned out, when he crossed back from the stove to door where had been standing with his left hand on the broom, he had his right hand on the broom and had been unable to tell the difference between the wall and the window! That was the darkest of all dustbowl storms! It had come out of the west accompanied by a rain cloud, as there were half a dozen drops of rain on the car.

The next morning when I got on the school bus, the wind was hard out of the west and Dad was forking bleweeds over the yard fence. That afternoon when I got off the school bus, the fencerows were piled not only with more weeds, but also with about two feet of dust that had blown into the weeds. north and scatter the dust back south. Back and forth it would scouring the land clean 1935 was a very dry year, with no crops harvested. 1936 was no crops harvested. even worse, a little drier and a little dustier.

The wind in those days seemed to have a different gusto about it-a different twist and current. The really bad ones seemed always to blow in out of the north on a Sunday afternoon or night. I remember one storm hitting during church one Sunday night. We lived six long miles south of town and drove in the middle of the road and counted each mail box as we passed it so that we would w when we got to our own and where to turn in. Most people had nailed tarpaper over their west and north doors and windows to try to keep out some of the dust. Blow-dust reacted like mercury or quicksand when you were walking or driving through it. It was almost impossible even to shovel it.

To drive across a drift was an experience! One day our local doctor, Dr. Stover, was out in the country on a house call and his car stuck in a dust drift. All he could do was sit there until help came along. In about an hour help did come along and to make conversation the neighbor said, "Hi Doc, what's the matter?" Doc's reply was, "Can't you see that I'm stuck in this dust drift?" Then the neighbor said, "There's no dust under your wheels, just hard road!" The doctor opened his The doctor opened his door and stepped out of his car. Sure enough the car had caused a different current around the wheels and the dust

In the spring of 1936, we had west wind for 8 days consecutively. We could see our neighbor's house, which was just a block away, only a while after sun-up and again just before sundown. All the pictures made of the Dust Bowl Days are very true and a good re-minder that it could happen again, if the land doesn't get the moisture and the proper care. In the fall of 1936, we got some rain and the farmers cultivated their land and sowed

There was a good wheat crop come 1937 and things began to improve. The community took on new hope and new life. All the home places took on a face lifting and the people's spirits were high. Improved farming methods and knowledge on how to use that which God has given us has made our country a beautiful place to live.


