than Sunday, but this is made so by reason of the humidity in the atmosphere. Where the air is dry and the
air currents almost constant, high temperature does not affect one appreciably, since the perspiration evaporated as rapidly as formed an

The plant will be the most powerful west This winter they will install an up to date ice plant, 20 tons capacity, and we will next summer not swelter n the simmering heat without ice as summer This electric pore will sufficient to handle any of the ma hinery in town, and when our stree wo colleges, it will be a simple the er to tie on to the plant here and go to business. The entire building will be of reinforced concrete, with a cement roof and will be absolutely fire rane traveling ry. Wires are now being placed in ith the requirements in accordance Fire Preventive Association, an exof the work. At the proper time steps will probably be taken to light the streets, but as yet nothing has being put forth to get the plant completed. The street poles are being erected throughout the town. This plant has a ten year contract to pump the water for city water
