w Offices Contested and No Grea Imount of Interest Manffested. Proposed Aldermen.
The election of city officials to erve for the ensuing two years takes lace on Tuesday, April 5.
A $\$ 10,000$ bond issue will also be oted upon at this election.
The offices of mayor and city secetary are not contested. Mayor Delay's name will appear on the ticket or re-election, and Jas. R. Hamilton the only aspirant for the secretary ship.
In order to print the tickets and old the election in conformity to the aw it was necessary for all candiates to file a petition with the nayor signed by 5 per cent of the oters at the last city election. The me for filing such petitions has ex pired, and the names of none excep hose who have already filed thei petitions can be placed on the official cket. Voters may write the nam icket and the same will be counted and will be entirely legal.
The election will be held in the court-room, upstairs in the court house, with R. E. Burch as presiding officer.
Three candidates are contesting for the marshal's office, J. F. Watson, the present incumbent, George McKinty and A. M. Stoddard. Five aldermen, are to be elected and the following na
B. E. Mitchell, A. A. Hatchell, H. T Akers, W. A. Nash, Dr. A H Lindsay D. L. Hammer, J. W. Pipkin, A. B. Muncey, Charles McCormack.
Not all of the above-named gentlemen are candidates of their own voltion, but petitions have been filed for them by their friends and their name will appear on the ticket. election will be intense. The capital location measure was initiated by Oklahoma City and names Oklahoma
City, Guthrie and Shawnee as the City, Guthrie and Shawnee as the
towns to be voted upon for the permanent capital. The capital shall be rality of votes, unless its nearest competitor should demand another the cost. Only the two towns re-
ceiving the highest and the next highest number of votes at the June election would be allowed to participate in this second election.
