CITY COUNCIL, IN SPECIAL SEC-SION, GRANTS FRANCHISE.

Plainview's Brilliant Present and Promising Future Arouses the Interest of Northern Capitalists.

Convening in special session of last Wednesday morning, the city council granted a franchise to H. E. Powell, of Chicago, for the establishing of a gas plant in Plainview.

The plant is to cost from \$40,000 to \$50,000, and will generate gas from crude oil by the modern water process. There is no need to emphasize the convenience and the economy of gas for cooking and heating purposes. In the landing of a gas plant of this capacity, Plainview has certainly donned "ten-league boots" and taken an upward step toward metropolitan

"HOME, SWEET HOME."

Many American Settlers in Western Canada Are Returning.

Washington, July 24.-The tide of the administrators of the public domain for the past few years, has turned, in the opinion of officials of the reclamation service. Thousands have returned, and a great many more are expected back soon.

J. Blanchard, statistician of the reclamation service, reports to the headquarters of the service here that he has interviewed a great number of settlers in Montana, who had tried the saddening experiment, who were glad to return home. He stated that practically every American farmer in Alberta, where the Canadian government maintains an irrigation project, was anxious to get back if he could sell his holdings in the Dominion.

The American settlers were dissatisfied with the character of the land, the crops from which, they alleged, consisted principally of alfalfa and such hardy crops as winter wheat, and even those were not sure. The form of government did not appeal to them, and they considered the railroad freight rates to be exhorbitant. Ice and snow in August of last year added to their discontent.

During the last ten months, it was said at the reclamation service, 15,000 settlers have returned to the United


