

Galveston, Aug. 10.-The majority report on platform is as follows:

1. We believe that a representative Democracy is the most perfect form of government ever devised by the wisdom of men and we are unalterably opposed to every effort to destroy or impair the excellent system established by our wise and patriotic fathers. We hold it to be the first and highest duty of every representative to faithfully execute the will of his constituency fairly ascertained.

2. We hold the constitution to be a solemn compact between the government and the people adopted for the protection of individuals and minorities, and we insist upon a strict construction of its letter as well as
