J. W. Pipkin was chosen president of the Association, E. H. Humphries, vice-president, Fred Crawford, secretary and J. W. Willis, teasurer.

A Campaign for More Miles of Concrete Sidewalks will be Waged Next

There is nothing very mysterious about the laying of concrete but the streets on the northwest corner of the square are being thronged this week by happy citizens who gaze as if fascinated by the maneuvers of the mixers of mud who are laying some very proper street crossings each way from the First National Bank Building.

They are good substantial crossings and will probably last easily until Plainview's streets are paved. Were they needed? Have you ever been in Plainview immediately after the rain? The City Council has certainly endeared themselves with the people by this progressive move. The old crossings of plank were very unsatisfactory but but were even more expensive than the new as they were always having to be replaced at short intervals. Besides, they were no good and meant expense in many other ways, such as extra shoe shines, tailor bills, lost tempers, and far more important than all-lost prospectors.

We understand that this is only the beginning of a crusade for more sidewalks and street crossings in our town. The City promises to put down the crossings as fast as the blocks of sidewalks are ready to be connected. Fort Worth, Texas, May 13.-The death of Addison Clark, founder of Texas Christian University, occured at 4 o'clock this morning at the home of his daughter in Comanche, the culmination of an illness of two months duration. #### BROOM CORN IN THE PANHANDLE

The broom corn brokers of Illinois are looking to Kansas, Oklahoma and the Panhandle of Texas for the future supply of broom corn.

They declare that the days of Illinois supremacy in this product is at an end. For the past twenty years, Matoon, Ill., has been the broom corn center and Coles county, Ill., has raised more broom corn than any similar area in the world. But the farmers have banded together and agreed not to raise broom corn for less than \$120 per ton guaranteed in advance. W. M. Checkley, a prominent broker of Matoon, replied to this threat as follows: "If you cannot raise broom corn for less than \$120 per ton, you had better quit because the farmers in Kansas, Oklahoma and Texas can raise it for less than \$100 per ton. The land in those states can be bought for about one-fourth of the value of Illinois land. Labor is cheaper and market conditions are becoming equally as good. In my opinion, Illinois must cease to raise broom corn, for it will no longer pay."-Dal-







An Ordinance Providing the Distance that Electric Light and Telephone Wires shall be Placed and Kept Apart, Within the City of Plainview, and Providing a Penalty.

Be it Ordained by the City Council of the City of Plainview, Texas:-

SECTION 1. That it shall hereafter be unlawful for any electric light Volume 22, page 44, Hale county deed company to erect or place, or cause to be erected or placed any of its electric light wires within less than three feet of any telephone wire, or to permit any of its electric light wires to become and remain within less than three feet of any telephone wire; and provided that if any elec-1909, and duly recorded in volume 25 tric light company has erected or placed, or has caused to be erected or placed any of its electric light wires within less than three feet of any telephone wire, said electric light company shall immediately re move same so as to be not less than three feet of said telephone wire, within the city of Plainview, Texas:

That it shall hereafter be unlawful for any telephone company to erect or place, or cause to be erect. ed or placed any of its telephone wires within less than three feet of any electric light wire, or to permit it: telephone wires to become and re main within less than three feet o any electric light wire; and provide. that if any telephone company has erected or placed, or has caused to be erected or placed any of its telephone wires within less than three feet o any electric light wire, said telephone company shall immediately remove same so as to be not less than thre eet of said electric light wire, with in the city of Plainview, Texas:-

SEC. 3. That if any electric ligh or telephone company shall violate any of the provisions of this ordi nance, they shall be guilty of a mis demeanor, and upon conviction there of shall be fined in any sum not less than Ten \$(10.00) Dollars and no more than One Hundred (\$100.00)

SEC. 4. The fact that there is no adequate law regulating the distance that electric light and telephone wire. shall be placed and kept apart, create: an emergency and public necessity and the rule requiring a second and third reading of an ordinance is here by waived and suspended, and this ordinance shall be in full force and effect, from and after its passage and publication, and it is so ordered.
