In the May number of the Earth, one J. C. Gaither, who signs himself secretary of the Commercial Club at Floydada, hands Lockney a basket of

In his comment on irrigation wells in the South Plains country, he says: "In some of the counties to our west, plants have been established and a great body of water made available for much irrigation, but owing to the abundance of crops maturing with our annual rainfall the farmers of Floyd county have not become interested to any great extent in the question of irrigation. The water is available here for the use of those who may prefer that method."

When the above was written, Lockney had brought in the McGee well, and machinery was being installed to test the Ramsey well in Lockney. These well are not located in " counties to the west of Floyd county but right in Floyd county. Mr. Gaither was either ignorant of these facts or he endeavored to hand us a lemon.

In his writeup of Floyd county the McGehee well picture is produced with the inscription, "McGehee Gusher Well, Lockney, Texas." In view of the above quoted statement that "in counties to our west plants have been established," one could not tell whether Lockney was located Hale or Luboock counties, or in South Texas.

Floydada is a good little town and for the present, county seat of Floyd county, but Lockney enjoys the distinction of not only being the largest town in Floyd county, but located in the best section of the country. It is located in the shallow water belt, whereas Floydada cannot boast of being so fortunately located. We only have to go 40 to 52 feet to water, where as Floydada, our unfortunate sister town to the southeast of us, has to go from 125 to 260 feet to the first strata. Perhaps these facts influenced the Floydada scribe in leaving Lockney out of the irrigation district, and not numbering our people among the progressive citizens of the Plains country, who

We will say further that Lockney was the first town on the Plains to follow Plainview's example in putting down irrigating wells, and there has not been a move made to develop irson that the depths they would have

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
