JUSTICE HARLAN DEAD.

Washington, D. C., Oct. 14 .- Associate Justice John Marshall Harlan, of the United States Supreme Court. died at his home here at 8:15 this morning, of acute bronchitis ,his age being seventy-six. He was taken with a severe cold Monday.

Justice Harlan has served as Associate Justice since his appointment by President Hayes, in 1877, and his highest ambition was to serve until next June, when he would have exceeded in length of service any man who ever sat on the United States Supreme bench. As it was, his service was longer than anyone except Marshall and Stephen J. Field.

John Marshal Harlan was born in Boyle County, Kentucky, in 1833. He graduated from Center College in part in the Civil War as a Union solattorney general of Kentucky. 




