KAFFIR, MAIZE AND MILLET.

An immense amount of wheat, kaffir, maize alfalfa and millet is being shipped out of the country this fall. Most of this stuff goes to Central and South Texas, much of it to Fort .Worth. From there it is distributed throughout nearly all the counties in the lowlands, where the feed crop was cut short by drouth.

This Plains country, properly handied, could furnish the balance of the State with all the bread, grain, hay, pork, beef and mutton it could use, and then spare enough to help the outside world to a considerable extent. This land is cheap, and as good as the best, and all it needs is proper handling to make is produce abundantly all the various products needed for the support of man and stock. No country has better water, and no soil gives better returns under irrigation, while good returns from the dry farming method are as sure as in almost any country.



This is larger by \$447,832 than any previous apportionment.


