#### "ONE CHERISHED LIBERTY PRESERVED."

Under the above caption, The Kansas City Times cites the following incident as of interest to those accustomed to wait at stations for delayed trains, concerning a decision handed down by the Iowa Supreme Court:

"An lowa woman was injured while walking about the station platform. She was struck by a baggage truck, and the railroad was sued for damages for personal injury. The road contended that the woman had no right upon the platform, and that if she had remained in the waiting room of the station, where she ought to have remained, she would have escaped in-

"Now comes the court with a decision for relief of those who are compelled to wait at country stations for late trains. It informs the railroad companies that it is an inalienable right of those who are forced to kill time at a depot while waiting for a strain, to walk about the platform, to inspect the water tank, the mail cranes, the baggage trucks and anything else of interest that will afford entertainment to relieve the monotony of that most monotonous of all occu-

"And, furthermore, the court rules that the railroads must take this situation into consideration and provide for the reasonable safety of patrons on the station platforms, no less than

in the waiting rooms. "One 'cherished liberty' has been preserved the traveling public, anyway, as long as the Iowa Supreme Court is on guard."

# Ruling of the Attorney General on Poll Tax Payments, Austin, Texas, Nov. 8, 1911

No citizen has the right to pay his poll tax either in person or through an agent at any other place except the office of the tax collector at the county seat. It will thus be seen that all taxes including poll taxes are required to be paid at the tax collector's office at the county seat.

Blank orders for poll taxes will be found at post office in Petersburg, bank at Abernathy, bank at Hale Center, post office at Norfleet, post office at Runningwater, post office at Bartonsite, post office at Ellen.

The above ruling will be followed to the letter, be careful to fill your orders out properly. No receipts will be issued and delivered after midnight Jan. 31, 1912, without penalty being added.


