

35,187 AUTOS IN USE IN TEXAS

\$44,000,000; \$7,000,000 a Year for Automobile Tires.

DALLAS COUNTY FIRST

Automobile Is Great Stimulus for Good Roads; Has Not Affected Price of Horses.

Fort Worth, Texas, Dec. 14 .- A census recently taken by the Texas Commercial Secretaries and Business Men's Association shows that there are 35,187 automobiles in Texas, and their total value is approximately \$43,893,750. Compared with 1911, this is an increase of 5,204, and a decrease of \$1,016,250 in value. 33,623 of the ars in the State are used for pleasure, while 1,564 are in commercial use. There are 105 different models

cars, with 3,409, Harris County second, with 3,030, and Bexar, Tarrant, McLennan and El Paso follow in the and 1.132 cars, respectively.

In the principal cities Dallas ranks first in number, having 2,944 cars; Houston second, with 2,809; San Antonio third, with 2,673; and Fort Worth fourth, with 1,600 cars.

Compared with other states in the Union, Texas ranks tenth in number

The total number of cars in use in the United States is approximately 850,000, with a total value of \$935,-

\$25,000,000 for Joy Rides.

Those in close touch with the automobile industry, says the Dallas News, estimate that approximately \$120,000,-000,000 was spent during 1912 for tires alone. Over 500,000 bales of cotton are consumed annually in the manufacture of automobiles. One machine requires six tires per year, which cost approximately \$210, and on this basis \$7,389,270 was expended in Texas last year for automobile tires alone. The average life of an automobile is three years, and it is safe to estimate that we spend \$25,000,000 for joy rides annually in Texas, including tires, oil and other supplies,

Automobile manufacturing is one of the leading industries of the world, and the capital invested in American plants is \$173,837,000. Products valued at \$250,000,000 are manufactured annually, and 85,359 persons are employed in this line of endeavor. The annual payroll is approximately
