WT Services starts major expansion in Hereford

just got competitive in Hereford.

WT Services has nounced plans to spend \$8-\$11 million to hook up the city of Hereford with local telephone, cable television, and high speed internet service. Initial road boring work got underway Monday, August 28. Construction is expected to take about a year.

WT Services, Inc., a subsidiary of West Texas Rural Telephone Cooperative (WTRTC), has purchased the former Edwards Pharmacy location near downtown Hereford as a part of the project. The packages offered will include high speed Internet, digital cable television with high

Tom Hyer, general manager of WTRTC, says early work on the directional boring to install the underground fiber optic cable will begin in downtown Hereford, spreading to other areas of the city once downtown boring is com-

Services will become available as soon as the fiber optic system reaches locations within the city of Hereford. Of interest to WT Services customers in Friona and Bovina will be the high definition television capability.

The high definition cable television feed to Hereford will originate at the WT Services location in Friona. Customers with HDTV units will be able

Longhorn to be unveiled Wednesday

The long awaited Friona fiberglass longhorn will finally make his appearance next Wednesday, September 6, at the Friona City Park

Local artists Carol Ellis and Bobby Wied have coordinated the painting of the fiberglass animal, which was made possible through local private donations.

The small plaza near the northwest corner of the park will be landscaped with some of the personalized bricks from the gazebo. The Friona longhorn will graze lazily from a bed of concrete as he idly stares at the Main St. traffic.

Names for our longhorn were suggested by Friona 7th graders The official name for our longhorn will be announced at the unveiling and the winning students who chose the name will be recognized and awarded medals. The time for the ceremony is 4 p.m. The public is invited to attend.

Friona and Bovina customers will remember the backhoes and ditching machines used to run fiber optic cable from alleys to homes. Today's technology allows WT Services to use directional boring machines to avoid sprinklers and other underground systems. No ditches will have to be dug to install the fiber

According to Jim Steiert of West Texas Rural Telephone, the company began the bor-ing process Monday by boring under Highway 60 to bring the main cables into the down town Hereford area. General manager Hyer said, "We'll buy all of the inputs that we possibly can locally as the project proceeds. There will also be some temporary employment opportunities on the crew during the construction project.

WT Services was incorpo rated as a wholly owned sub-sidiary of West Texas Rural Telephone Cooperative in November, 1982. Hereford Long Distance became one of the early subsidiary operations in June 1984, introduced as a discount long distance service to the Panhandle.

In 1983 WT Services ac-

radio shops in Hereford and Muleshoe servicing Motorola products. In 1990 the Hereford radio shop began marketing Motorola communications equipment in a seven county

WT Services opened a radio shop in Amarillo in 1991 and a warehouse just south of the WTRT business offices two miles south of Hereford on Highway 385 was remodeled to serve as the WT Services Hereford radio shop. It opened in April 1991. WT Services purchased the former Two-Way Shop in Borger in May 1992.

In 1994 they purchased a paging terminal and customer base from Sinclair Communications in Amarillo and began operating a network called Panhandle Paging. In Sep-tember, 1995 WT Services

Hereford providing sales, service, and programming of computers in the local area. In January 1996 the computer division became an Internet service provider to all nine WTRT exchanges and in Hereford, Friona, Bovina, and Farwell. The WT Services office in Friona opened in 1996 extending local telephone and cable service to Friona, then Bovina.

In the trade arena, they're competing with producers in developing countries who have nothing equivalent to our Environmental Protection Agency breathing down their necks, who use products on their crops that are outlawed here, who turn around and steal our

the gutter through over-production.

American producers have to compete against developed countries with much higher subsidies than our own, who talk tough about lowering their subsidies, but balk when the cutting time comes.

American producers have to defend their livelihoods against the Environmental Working Group's Kenneth Cook, who creates envy of

technologies, then complain our domestic subsidies, but could simply apply for protecthat we are driving prices into doesn't explain how much subsidy actually ends up in a farmer's hand.

American producers have to contend with countries that file complaints about our subsidies, yet still practice a form of slavery on some of their farms. zil, if you recall, won its WTO case against the United States cotton program, and this resulted in the loss of our Step 2 program.

So imagine our surprise at a small news item about a senior member of the Brazilian Congress being ordered by a court in February to pay more than \$100,000 to 53 farmhands he kept in virtual slavery on his ranch.

There are estimates that at present throughout Brazil, some 20,000 to 50,000 farm workers are being kept by their employers under very poor liv-ing conditions. Pardon my insensitivity for a moment here, but hey, who needs a subsidy when you keep your labor under lock and key?

The narrow, winding roads of the big island

We'll go back to the Big Island of Hawaii. We did a lot in the week we were there, but there are so many more things we want to see and do. Like malasadas. Portuguese donuts. We never had any. They are hot items on the BI. When we went to

a bakery to get some, they were sold out. I also want to spend more time at Polulu, one of the most scenic spots. I want to perhaps stay at Waimea, voted one of the top places to live in the US. I want to visit the seahorse farm between Kona's airport and harbor.

We had visited Oahu and Kawai before and fell in love with both of those islands, but the Big Island seems to be more diverse. The beautiful flowers and trees are there for sure. At intersections of main streets in Kona, acres of pink and white bougainvillea drape the hillsides.

We visited coffee and macadamia plantations; saw bananas, papayas and mangos ripening on trees. We saw fan palms and coconut palms. Coconuts fall from trees without much notice and some people get hurt every year when a coconut bonks

them on their heads.



We went to the Sheraton nearly every night to watch the Manta Rays feed on plankton. The hotel has a big overlook and shines bright lights into the water so visitors can see the huge sea creatures maneuver along the rocky shoreline. They have a wingspan of 16 feet and their movements are mesmerizing

We drove along the island's perimeter, stopping occasionally to visit a waterfall, intriguing valley, or botanical garden. Most roads are only two lanes and if you can drive 40 MPH you're doing well.

We watched Pilot Whales accompany us when we took a boat ride in the Pacific. We watched giant sea turtles come ashore to lay eggs. We lunched at a beachside restaurant and saw people of all ages play in the surf with boogie boards. We stood at high overlooks and looked down at places where the

water meets the land. The Pacific water is warm and near the shore it displays at least half a dozen colors, from deep blue to a light turquoise

We went to the place where the Hawaiian Islands were first formed by tons of lava shot into the air from a volcano. walked through clouds of steam coming from deep inside the earth. We had a picnic while watching boiling lava hit the sea Perhaps our greatest adventure was watching a sunset from the top of Mauna Kea, the tallest volcano on the island (elevation 792 feet). From sea floor to summit it towers more than 5.6 miles. The summit is covered with observatories, which attract astronomers from all over the world. Big Island residents ski and snow board on the summit in the winter when it is covered with snow. We wore heavy parkas and big gloves when we were there in late July. The temperature was 32 degrees, quite different from the 100-degree weather along the coast.

Chair exhibit set at PPHM

Chairs from the 1600s to the 1900s with a variety of purposes will be on display in "Sitting Pretty: Seating Furniture from the Permanent Collection" beginning September 9, 2006, in the furniture gallery at the Panhandle-Plains Historical Museum (PPHM).

A 1947 high chair, 1950s steel yard chair, 1900's oak Morris


chair, and an 1875 Renaissance Revival side chair represent the

varied design and application in seating for young and old.

An ornate five-piece suite of parlor furniture made around 1860 by John Henry Belter characterizes posh seating. A German-born New Yorker, Belter made massive, curving forms with lace-like and deeply-cut ornate carving. Belter introduced the Rococo Revival Style to America.

Also for view are handcrafted, white oak chairs presented to the Panhandle Plains Historical Society by the Summer Graduating Class of 1936 at West Texas State Teacher College, now West Texas A&M University. Inspired by mid-18th century furniture, the chairs were designed and hand-carved by John A. Gillis, who taught manual training. Long-time art professor Isabel Robinson prepared the chair design for carving.





FHS grid history traced to 1923

The book "Friona on Parade" about Friona school athletics and academics is "hot off the presses." Here the first copy of the book is being handed to author Bill Ellis by printer Rod Sanders, of the Ink Spot in Hereford.



(Editor's note: the following excerpted from the book 'Friona on Parade," authored by Bill Ellis and scheduled to go on sale Sunday, September 10, from 2:30-4:30 at the Friona Public Library.)

Friona High School's football program is traced back 83 years, to the fall of 1922, when recent graduate of West Texas "Normal," Floyd Golden, who had been hired as FHS principal beginning in 1921.

Golden became principal after it was stated that "some of the big boys had run off the previous one.

In his third year in Friona, Prof. Golden, who later played a role in the establishment of Eastern New Mexico University, decided that it was time for football in Friona.

The team nickname of Chieftains and school colors of red and white were also established that first year. Among those on the first grid team were Roscoe Parr, Sr., Milton Sanders, Bill Guyer, Elwin and Estin Crews R.R., Tommy and Elwin Galloway, Johnny and Pool Hodge, Ralph Staley, Paul Taylor and Harold Schlenker.

No scores or team record from that first season survived, nor for the sport's first three years at FHS. Finally, in the fall of '27, it was reported in the Friona Star that FHS downed the Vega "Outlaws," 7-0 and followed that up with a 12-7 win over the Happy "Jacks." Center J.G. "Red" McFarland was singled out for his play. TDs were scored by J.D. Curry and

Friona became one of the first schools of its size to play night football when lights were installed prior to the 1935 season. The game showed up beautifully under the lights," said the article in the Star. Friona downed

So anxious were FHS' opponents to try the new "phenom" that the Chieftains were able to play their first seven games of the '35 season at home! The team won five of the games.

Having to compete with such larger schools as Canyon, Hereford, Dumas and Dalhart for dis trict honors, FHS didn't taste a grid title until 1944, when the vas co-champs with Hereford. Hosting the Whitefaces on Thanksgiving Day for the outright title, FHS led, 13-7 late in

the game only to fall, 14-13. Raymond Cook's 1952 Chieftains won the school's first outright district crown, going 5-0 in District 3-B. Friona was finally the largest school in its "loop," instead of the smallest!

Colie Huffman followed Cook as coach, and his 1957 charges won another district title, being 4-0 in District 3-A. The team fell to Ralls in bi-district, 21-12.

Don Light and Bob arrived in Friona in 1963, to take jobs where the grid team had lost its past 27 straight games, longest streak going in the state at the time.

The duo orchestrated one of the biggest "turn-arounds" the area's history, tutoring the Chiefs to eight straight wins before dropping a 13-0 decision at Muleshoe in game #9.

Light and Owen coached FHS to a district co-title in '64, losing only to Floydada, 7-6 in district. The following year, they won the championship outright at 5-0 in district.

Lonnie Phillips' 1977 team tied for its district crown, as did Tommy Moss' Chiefs of '82.

'86 gridders were the first FHS team to win a playoff game. Tommy Moss' troops won eight of their last nine games including a 19-13 win over class 4A Pampa.

FHS met Perryton in bi-district. Shy Burney's 35-yard interception return brought the Chiefs to 10-7 at the half. Moss made a tough decision after Sam Montoya's field goal tied the game 10-all late in the game. He decided to take the points off the board, giving Friona first and goal at the Ranger' five. QB Daniel Echols validated his coach's decision, running around end for the TD, which gave FHS the win, 13-10.

In the area round, Kermit kicked a late-game field goal to steal a 15-13 win after the Chiefs had led most of the way.

James Morton overcame a 0-10 start at FHS in 1992, to take the gridders farther than any ever been-to the state semi-finals in 1996, with four straight playoff wins, over

Denver City, 25-7, Monahans, 27-6, Vernon, 14-13 on a day the Lions were ranked first in state, and Aledo, 28-13 in the quarterfinals.

FHS' enrollment in '96 was 330 students. Monahans had 706, Vernon 651, Aledo 615 and Denver City 450. That team epitomized the old coaching axiom "They can only put 11 men on the field at one time!'

"Friona On Parade" started out to be a book about Friona Chieftain and Squaw sports, including such records as have been preserved since the beginning of the school's various sports programs. After some serious thought, it was determined that such a book must also include academic honors, names plus superintendants, principals,

teachers, etc.
So the book grew to 368 pages, with a 165 page in-depth section on Chieftain and Squaws sports records and photos from the mid-1920s through 2005. Other sections of the book contain stories and photos of valedictorians, salutatorians, class rosters, foreign exchange students, UIL honors, and more. There is also a chapter entitled 'The Professionals," which is a look at some, not all, of the FHS exes who have distinguished themselves in their chosen careers

The book will go on sale Sunday, September 10 from 2:30 to 4:30 p.m. in the Library and will also be available at the city's Centennial Maize Days Celebration in the City Park on Saturday, September 16, follow ing the parade.

After Maize Days the books can be purchased at the Library and at the Friona Star. Otherwise, the books can be ordered directly from Bill Ellis for \$60.00 (tax included). Rains too late for dryland cotton

nantly dry weather pattern and many have seized the opportunity to take a much needed break in what had become a non-stop effort to keep irrigation water flowing to a thirsty

The area is benefiting from over a week of cooler temperatures and varying amounts of rainfall. While the rainfall was a far cry from the general rain that most had hoped to see move through the region, the storms have provided some significant rainfall totals in many areas of the Plains.

It is unfortunate that change in the weather didn't happen a few weeks earlier. it had more of the area's dryland producers could have reaped some benefit from the rain as well. As it stands, however, the rain was just "Too Little; Too Late" to help improve the prospects of most dryland acres

Dryland crops that received highest levels of rainfall could even take a step backward if the plants begin to regrow, which would harvest even more difficult, or shed bolls.

On a brighter note, the rainfall was a boon to irrigated producers across the board. While not likely to significantly increase current yield prospects since the crop is for the most part well past "cut-out," the rains have allowed many growers to rest irrigation wells that have been the crop's only source of water for most of the growing season.

Based on the calendar and the advanced maturity of the crop overall, some growers opt to terminate their irrigation activity altogether if they received enough rain to finish the crop out. For those that are still on the outside looking in, or who have been on the fringes of the recent storms, another round of storms in the next week could see them take similar action.

Yield prospects for the area are unchanged with most irrigated crops expected to produce near average yields. Dryland crop yields are expected to be well below average as well and many fields could be abandoned before harvest due to extremely poor yield pros-

No Decision On Changes To Boll Count Appraisal Pro-

Earlier this month, Plains Cotton Growers officials requested a change in the boll count appraisal process as it applies to dryland cotton in effort to address the significant impact this year's drought is having on that po-

tion of the crop. Extreme drought stress causes cotton plants to be abnormally short (making them harder to harvest efficiently because what few bolls the are able to set are generally very close to ground level) and undergo a restricted reproductive growth period due to the plants inability to produce additional fruiting

This often translates directly into dryland plants that are only able to sustain 1-3 percentage will fail to contribthey are not able to be retrieved by mechanical harvesting equipment or simply

The lack of moisture during the bloom/boll-setting period also leads to bolls that contain fewer seed per boll which contributes to a smaller overall boll size and further decreases the crops yield po-




