PUMPS 1,400 GALLONS

WITH 18 H. P. ENGINE.

Dr. Anderson's Well Has Tested 2,200 Gallons; First to Operate with Electric Motor.

An 18-horsepower engine is lifting 1,200 to 1,400 gallons of water a minute from Dr. J. C. Anderson's new well, 5 miles west of town, according to J. M. Layne, of the Layne& Bowler City Will Begin Weed Cutting Next Purposes to Dig Six Wells on His Company, who dug the well. The flow increased to 2,200 gallons a minute, Mr. Layne says, when the big tractor took hold.

The lift in this well is about 60 feet; pump is set 50 feet below ground. is 234 feet deep.

A line is being run from the local power house to supply electricity for pumping Dr. Anderson's well. This will be the first well, except the well Company, for pumping into Lake Plainview, to pump with electricity.

Notwithstanding "Dixie's" populartty in this country and abroad, few know today its history, or even the words of the song. It was written on a rainy Sunday afternoon in New York City before the war, and its composer was not a Southerner, but was old Dan Emmett-Daniel Decatur Emmett, who was born in Mount Vernon, O., October 29, 1815, is well remembered as a minstrel by Indiana people, and who died at Mount Vernon, O., June 28, 1904. Dan was one of the first "negro minstrels," and even the late genrations remember him well as not a bad one in the heyday of minstrelthe country with modern minstrels.

The song as written and sung by Emmett in the North was only a "negro melody." Its first real use in the South was on February 18, 1861, at the inauguration of Jefferson Davis as President of the Confederacy, which was at Montgomery. 



TULLE IS EVERYTHING IN HATS.

No trimming competes with tulle just at present in Paris. Hats seem entirely made of it, either gathered or pleated. The straw shapes are completely veiled with pleated tulle, which is then drawn out leaving the loose line of pleating. In another model a deep tulle frill is made in box pleats, the center of which is sewn round the crown, where the brim meets it, forming two frills, one standing up round the crown and the other veiling the brim; the latter comes beyond the brim. A moire ribbon is drawn round the center of this frill, from which springs behind a dainty spiral arrangement of tulle made on wire, ending in an exceedingly pretty pompon. Fashion decrees that the narrow effect of the straw brim should be enlarged by the 4-inch tulle frill (goffered or pleated) which comes beyond it and shades the face so gracefully, always edged with a dainty picot. Many hats have satin brims and light tulle crowns. Two or three rows of twisted tulle lie round the brim, which is finished off at the edge with a narrow ruching.-London

Receipts of cattle here last week were 6,000 head less than in the previous week, and about the same number short the corresponding week a year ago, favorable circumstances for developing whatever strength there was in the market

Heavy steers closed this week about steady, after selling 10 to 15 cents lower the middle of the week. Light steers fipished a shade higher for the week, cows strong to 15 cents higher, and stock cattle 25 to 40 cents higher. Today the supply is 14,000 cattle here and 19,000 in Chicago. Prices here opened steady to a shade lower on steers, but later sales were weak to 15 cents lower. Cows and stock cattle sold about steady.

There is a large number of choice to prime steers here today which sold at \$8.30 to \$8.75, bulk of the native steers \$7.75 to \$8.50. Fancy Missouri mixed yearlings brought \$8.65 today, from same feed lot that furnished \$8.75 animals a week ago.

Stock steers range from \$5.75 to \$7.75, feeders up to \$8.00. Top stockers \$7.75. More than two hundred cars of quarantine cattle came in today, the record supply for this year, and sales in that division are unevenly lower, grass steers largely at \$5.40 to \$6.50, fed cattle \$7.00 to \$7.50, grass ows \$4.25 to \$5.75.

Hogs made an average net gain of cents last week, with a bad close Saturday. Supply today is 5,000 head, market 5 to 10 cents higher, top \$8.70. bulk \$8.65 to \$8.70. The light run day was good medicine for the mar ket, as buyers late last week were in a bearish mood

Sheep and lambs are sustaining their reputation for eccentricity. The market made sensational gains one or two days last week, but today there is another bad break of 30 to 50 cents. Top spring lambs today brought \$7.50, native ewes sold largely at \$4.25 and under, and an early bid of \$4.60 on Texas muttons could not be duplicated later. Receipts, 10,000.



As a matter of fact, most of the veterans congratulated themselves on the fact that it was nowhere near so hot as fifty years ago today, and that there was not the necessity for haste that there was then.

And, despite the exhortations of the first-aid men to refrain from drinking any of the fearful and wonderful concoctions sold so freely everywhere outside the camp reservation, the visiting hosts simply suited their own tastes and drank when they were thirsty, and the drinks semed to do little harm.

Gen. Bennett Young, commander-inchief of the United Confederate Veterans, arrived with his staff today and was escorted to his headquarters by an impromptu procession of Union and Confederate veterans, who did their best to show by their enthusiastic greeting that they realized just what this visit meant.

G. A. R. and U. C. V. Commanders There.

The commander-in-chief of the Grand Army of the Republic, Gen. Alfred B. Beers, of Bridgeport, Conn., was already on the ground, and for the remainder of the week the two ranking officers will be the most prominent figures in the celebration. Only two hours each day are to be devoted to formal exercises.

The officials realize that because of the age of most of those here it would be a hardship to lengthen the program. So for the greater part of the time the veterans will be permitted to go as they please and "fight the war over again" in their own picturesque manner.

According to the report made yesterday at the local post office, the receipts for the year ending June 30, 1913, total \$1,002,405,98. This amount is twice as great as any other post office in the State, it is said, and puts Dallas in the rank with cities of 400,-000 population and upward. Last year the receipts of the Dallas, office amounted to approximately \$856,000.

The receipts for the month of June, this year, totaled \$81,646.87, compared with \$61,310.34 for the corresponding period last year, or an increase of about 33 per cent.

TEAM WORK.

How to Develop Agriculture and Commerce Through a County Wide Club.

[National Crop Improvement Service.] There is a certain class of men, and unfortunately many of them are now in authority, who look with suspicion and prejudice upon the development of all agricultural projects, except their own particular one.

W. J. Bryan, Secretary of State, in a talk before the Chamber of Commerce, Trenton, New Jersey, during March, said:

"Team work is the slogan of modern thought. The surest test of a man's sanity is his willingness and ability to co-operate with others in a great work. The surest evidence of a man's insanity is his inability to co-

It is the purpose of the Crop Improvement Committee of the Council cil of Grain Exchanges to learn of the good work of all the forces, and to encourage the County Farm Bureaus to adopt as many of these plans, for their own development, as possible.

All of these projects must be carried along together, which means team work. This can only be accomplished by an organization, which partakes of both an agricultural and a commercial club, with practical committees appointed to take charge of each phase of the work.

ROAD DRAGGING LAW.

Work for the County Road Committees.-Highway Board Should be Recommended by and Co-operate With the Advisory

Council of County Farm Bureau.

(National Crop Improvement Service)
A new road law enacted by the plies to every county in Missouri is what is designated as the "County Seat Road Dragging Law," the purpose and provisions of which are to have all of the public roads connecting the county seat towns of all adoining counties improved by a regu-

lar systematic plan of road dragging. This law provides for the appointment of a county highway board by the county court, to consist of three members, of which the county highway engineer is one, who hold their positions for two years and serve without compensation. This board, acting with the state highway engineer, is authorized and required to select "the most practical road from the county seat to the county seats of each adjoining county." After these particular routes, which are to be designated as county seat roads, have been selected the state highway engineer certifies to the state auditor the number of miles of such highway in each county. The county highway board contracts to have such roads dragged under certain prescribed regulations at a cost per mile per year of not exceeding \$15, which amout is paid out of the state good high.—Crosbyton Review.
