#### ALLEY MAKES TWO TONS ALFALFA AT 4TH CUTTING.

Hale Center Man Also Threshed 50 Bushels of Wheat to an Acre; 2 Waterings.

Two tons of alfalfa to an acre-that s what R. F. Alley, of Hale Center, is cutting. And alfalfa is \$20 a ton! This is the first year's cutting on this field. Mr. Alley has cut three times already this year, securing a ton at each one of the other cuttings. He watered twice for this cutting.

The alfalfa is on upland. Mr. Alley planted fifteen pounds of seed to an acre. He has about twenty acres in this tract. Mr. Alley uses a fiftyhorsepower engine and pumps 1,500 gallons of water a minute from his

#### SANTA FE FOLDER BOOSTS SHALLOW WATER DISTRICT.

#### Railroad Company to Make Wide Distribution of Publication on Pumped Irrigation.

"Shallow Water Country of Northwest Texas" is the title of an attractive folder just issued by the Colonization Department of the Santa Fe Railroad. The booklet covers briefly Bailey, Castro, Deaf Smith, Floyd, Lamb, Lubbock, Parmer, Randall, Swisher and Hale Counties. It contains halftone engravings of five irrigation and farm scenes around Plainview and three scenes from other districts. No mention is made of where the pictures were taken.

The booklet refers to tests made of three wells at Hereford, two at Hurley, one at Janes, one at Lubbock, one at Hale Center and one at Plainview-the Slaton well! Rather too flattering attention is paid to Plainview. We do not have paved streets yet, and we had rather not have it advertised that our streets are paved.

No mention is made of Dr. Scott's big well, which has pumped more than 2,500 gallons a minute, nor of the second big well on Dr. White's farm, which has tested 2,600 gallons a minute. The development project of the Texas Land and Development Company is given attention which such an undertaking deserves, except that a number of their wells were flowing when the representative of the Railroad went through Hale County. No mention is made of any of them.

"Shallow Water Country of North west Texas" will tell thousands of prospective settlers about the South Plains. It will undoubtedly attract many of them this way.

#### GOVERNMENT ASSISTANCE TO LARGE FAMILIES IN FRANCE.

By AMERICAN CONSUL JOHN BALL OSBORNE, Harve, France.

The French Parliament has passed law-approved July 14, 1913,which grants official assitsance to large families in poor circumstances. Every head of a family of French nationality, having under his care more than three children, legitimate or recognized, and whose resources are insufficient to rear them, shall be entitled hereafter to receive an annual allowance for each child of less than 13 years of age after the third child of less than 13 years.

If the children remain under the care of the mother by reason of the death of the father, his disappearance, abandonment of his family, or any other cause, the assistance is given for each child of less than 13 years after the first child of less than 13 years.

If the children remain under the care of the father by reason of the death of the mother, her disappearance, abandonment of her family, or any other cause, the assistance is given for each child less than 13 years after the second child of less than 13 years.

Children of 13 to 16 years for whom ither parent has signed a contract of apprenticeship in due form will be ciassified with children of less than

The amount of the allowance is to be fixed for each commune by the municipal council, subject to the approval of the general council and the Ministry of the Interior. It shall not be less than 60 francs (\$11.58) per annum per child, nor more than 90 nes (\$17.37). Any excess shall be

d exclusively by the commune. the allowance is paid monthly in advance: it is non-transferable and not subject to distraint. It may be paid to the mother or other member of the family instead of to the father, if the municipal council so decides. It may be given for payment of rent or in kind by the bureau of charity.

The law provides that the necessary funds for carrying out its provisions shall be derived from the following ources: (1) Special resources arising from

foundations or gifts made for the purpose of assisting large families. (2) Eventual participation of the

bureau of charity. (3) Subvention of the department

(aided itself by a subvention of the State) calculated according to a table annexed to the law and inversely proportional to the charges of the com-

(4) Ordinary receipts or revenues ved from taxation. The contribu-. of the commune comes under this head.

There is, therefore, a threefold parinteresting legislative measure for the relief of large families of the poor. Several factors have contributed tod the adoption of this law, notably he very high cost of the necessities of life, the dearth of lodgings for large families in the cities, the tendency toward a lower birth rate, and the prospective extelsion to three years of the period of compulsory army service.







BOY SCOUTS TO FIGHT FIRES.

Philadelphia's Director of Public Safety Writes Simple Rules for Them.

"Two dozen fire don'ts," compiled by George D. Porter, Director of Public Safety, of the City of Philadelphia, are published in the September number of Boys' Life, in an interesting illustrated article entitled, "When There's a Fire!" The main part of the article deals with what all the boys should Scouts all over the country are learning these things so they may earn 'Firemanship Merit Badges."

The simple precautions he gives are

"Don't go into closets looking for clothing with a lighted match.

"Don't kindle fires in stoves with "Don't put hot ashes and coals in

wooden barrels or boxes. "Don't thaw out frozen water pipes with a torch or lamp.

"Don't allow waste paper, excelsior and rubbish to collect.

"Don't use gasoline for cleaning in "Don't look for gas leaks with a

match or lamp. "Don't allow lace curtains near gas

"Don't allow oily rags near stoves or about the premises.

"Don't allow sawdust to be used in curpidors or on floors.

"Don't throw cigarettes or cigars

"Don't keep matches in paper boxes or lying about carelessly.

Taboo them "Don't forget that matches are the

beginning of many conflagrations. "Don't hang your clothing near

open fires or stoves. Don't fill lamps after dark, and never when lighted.

"Don't allow rubbish in halls or on fire escapes.

"Don't burn leaves and dead grass on windy days.

"Don't forget to have the chimneys of your home cleaned once a year. "Don't fail to look twice at every-

hing that looks like fire. Don't leave everything to the landord; inspect your own building.

"Don't fail to notify the chief of the fire department of anything you may see that is dangerous and liable to cause fire, remembering that every day is fire prevention day.

"Don't fail to give the representative of the fire marshal or the firemen themselves every opportunity to make a careful examination of your property. They are trying to help you."


