

The renditions for this year show a grand total of \$8,547,560, as against \$7,828,327 last year. County Assessor Jordan's records show on the resi roll \$5,101,000; non-resident \$907,200; unrendered \$1,627,470; railroads, telegraph and telephones \$604,420; State and National Banks \$307,370; 7,072 horses and mules are valued at \$273,-425; 19,404 cattle at \$208,710; 97 jack and jennets at \$5,345.

There are 3,185 sheep, valued at \$4,825, and only 55 goats, with a valuation of \$110; 6,753 hogs are rendered at \$21,765, and 2 dogs, rendered at \$20.

Fifteen hundred and ten carriages. . buggies, wagons and automobiles are rendered at a valuation of \$60.690. Goods, wares and merchandise are turned in at \$269,710; manufactured articles at \$350; implements and machinery at \$77,595; engines and boilers at \$12.845.

The amount of money belonging to banks is placed at \$67,675; notes of individuals and banks, \$145,725. Individuals reported \$3,000 in money on hand. The value of property of companies or corporations is placed at \$5,000, and miscellaneous property is rendered at \$55,745. All of this is on the resident list
