

Bighty-Two Ribbons Awarded Plainview District at Panhandle State Fair.

OVER ALL COUNTIES

HALE COUNTY WINS

32 FIRST PRIZES

Won at Oklahoma City Over Combined Exhibit from Five Northwestern States.

Hale County has won eighty-two ribbons at the Panhandle State Fair, from Hanby and Perry, in charge of the display at Amarillo. The Plainview district also won a special \$20

prize for the best exhibit from any irrigated district and purple sweepcounties. A letter from Messrs. Hanby and

Perry yesterday specifies 32 first Hale County displays up to that time. The exhibits from irrigated districts were divided from unirrigated displays. Of irrigated exhibits, Hale County won first on eighteen displays; Coldren Land Co. won first on two, and J. M. Boone, of Hereford, won two, according to the Amarillo News,

Hale County's exhibit at Oklahoma City won sweepstakes over the Great Northern Exhibit, which was assembled from the States of Montana, Washington, Idaho, Oregon, Wyoming and the Dominion of Canada.

At Amarillo Hale County won first and second on wheat, oats, spletz, broom corn, alfalfa seed, garden and field seed, peaches, Irish potatoes, ess plant, feterita and alfalfa hay; first on Indian corn, sheaf oats, best and largest display of manufactured products from wheat, sorghum seed, millet seed, red milo, white milo, sorchum hay, prairie hay, cow pea hay, peanut hay. Panhandle flour, wheat middlings, cotton stalks, plums, pumpteans and general vegetable display.

McRae, of Plainview.

SANTA FE ENGINEER RECOMMENDS IMPROVEMENTS.

But Railroad Company Will Not Act Until City Raises Grade at Depot.

N. R. Cullings, engineer for the Santa Fe, advises Mayor Dorsett that he has recommended that his company grade up the grounds on this side of the depot and fill in the mud hole just as soon as the town raises the grade of Pacific Street adjacent to the stafeed will go a long way, Captain Til- tion 7 inches. He also wants a cement gutter to carry off the water.

Mayor Dorsett says that this grading will be done just as soon as the town can get to it. All teams are at work at places which the Mayor thinks are just as important as that, and he is not willing to change until the work now in hand is completed.

When Mr. Cullings was here last week he promised that the company would keep down the jungle of weeds which has grown this summer along Lake Plainview. He also thought that one electric light ought to be placed at the depot; he was not favorable to a light at the railroad crossing to Lake Plainview. The railroad company, he says, will not park its property along the lake front. The Santa Fe seems to think that Plainview and the Texas Land and Development Company are doing enough to beautify the town: it doesn't seem to matter that the road is taking considerable interest in parking its property in other towns; at present the company says it will not park its property in Plainview.

NUMBER SIXTY WEDNESDAY'S HAIL

CRUSHES WINDOWS

Seth Ward College, Plainview Floral Company and Masonic Temple Lose Heavily.

KILLS MANY CHICKENS

Storm Area Is Less Than a Mile in Width; No Damage Done by Run-Away Teams.

It is a safe venture that more window glass was sold in Plainview Wednesday afternoon than has been any other day. The trouble was a result of the hail storm which struck town just after one o'clock that day. The hail seems to have covered an area of nearly a mile in width. It came from the southwest and passed on in about fifteen minutes.

Hale Center suffered considerably. and reports indicate that the storm continued for fifteen or twenty miles northeast. Some residents of Plainview say that some of the hailstoned were as large as hen eggs. The more conservative vouch for the statement that many of the ice balls were large as guinea eggs.

Hail this size must have formed nearly 5,000 feet above earth, according to the United States Weather Bureau. Hail falling 5,000 feet would have a velocity of nearly 600 feet a

second when it struck the ground. Four hundred windows were broken at the Plainview Green House: Seth Ward College lost about 200 glasses; practically every window on the south and west of the City Hall, Grant and Blueher's new building and the Masonic Temple was broken. Forty-6dd were broken at the Santa Fe depot. Every window on the south side of the passenger train was smashed. The Herald suffered a hundred-dollar loss in windows, roofing and stock.

DENTISTRY FOR TREES.

Whether it is a shade or a fruit tree, little judicious treatment of a cavity will often save the tree for many years of usefulness. Whether it be a branch or the main trunk the treatment will be the same. First, all decayed or apparently decaying or diseased wood should be removed with a sharp chisel or knife until perfectly sound heart-wood is exposed. Immediately wash the wound with a solution of copper sulphate, in the proportion of one pound of sulphate to five gallons of water.

As soon as this has been done fill the cavity with a thin mortar made by mixing one part of cement with three parts of clean sand. When it has become stiff, but not hard, face it on the outside with thin cement, using a trowel to smooth the cement over all parts that have become injured. If a cavity or split should occur near a fork of the tree it would be an additional safeguard to put a long bolt through both branches, so as to hold them together. When the cement hardens in a cavity the trunk will be perfectly solid and decay will be arrested.-Farm and Fireside.



Training in Growing and Fattening Hogs Is the Purpose.

Training the boys and girls on the farms in the fine art of growing and fattening hogs is one of Uncle Sam's latest applications of the club idea. This work is being carried on by Bradford Knapp's farmers' co-operative department, through the bureau of animal industry.

It has been in progress only about two years, but during that time remarkable results have been achieved by the young members of these clubs, particularly in the South. In Louisiana last year there were ninety-seven hogs at the State Fair, and the grand champion Duroc sow in this lot was raised by one of the boy members of a pig club. At one county fair in that state last year all the prizes for hogs were taken by club members.

This year the bureau has started the club work in Alabama, ten counties entering and offering prizes in addition to those regularly given by the state and county fairs. In a short while the bureau will have issued bulletins dealing with the progress of this work and, according to the experts, will have some striking examples of what can be done by the youngsters on the farm when their efforts are properly directed and encouraged .-- Country Gentleman.


