HALE COUNTY FRUIT WINS AT DALLAS

First Announcement Gives Twelve First and Six Second Prizes on Apples, Pears and Peaches.

OTHER AWARDS MADE

Chamber of Commerce Will Take Up Constitution and By-Laws at Thursday's Meeting.

"We didn't do much-twelve firsts and six seconds," was what a telegram received this morning from E. H. Perry and J. D. Hanby, in charge of Hale County's exhibit at the State Fair, said. No other awards had been made up to Tuesday morning.

A second telegram, received this afternoon, stated that up to that hour Hale County had won more premiums than the total number won by the county at the Dallas Fair last year. At the time of the telegram all awards had not been made.

As best the first telegram could be made out, the twelve first and six second prizes consisted of first on Arkansas Black Apples, Missouri Pippin, Mammoth Black Twigs, Limber Twigs, Rhode Island Greenings, Snow; best plate apples, any variety; Columbus Peach; White Heath Peach; largest display of peaches; Seckle Pear and largest display of pears. Second award was given to Hale County on Winesap, York Imperial and Huntsman's Favorite Apples and Keifer Pears. The other two awards could not be made out from the telegram.

Two years ago Hale County sent twenty-six exhibits to the State Fair. We received nineteen first and seven second prizes. "An accident," shouted competitors. Last year thirty-six blue and sixteen red ribbons were brought home from Dallas. Texans are pretty good losers; they cheered Hale County. This fall our exhibit at Oklahoma City took first over an exhibit collected by the Great Northern Railroad from five Northwestern States; also an exhibit collected and sent out by the Canadian Government. At Amarillo we won eighty-two firsts and seconds. Rather consistent winning, iron. isn't it?

Matters connected with the exhibit at Dallas will be taken up by the Chamber of Commerce Thursday night. The committee appointed to draft constitution and by-laws will also make a report. The County Court room was full at last week's meeting. Enthusiasm is beginning to bubble over. Better come out to the meeting and help make Plainview a bigger, better, busier town. It means dollars

ANDERSON'S WELL PUMPS 2,000 GALLONS A MINUTE

Test with Electricity Gives Gratifying Results on Big Well; 35-Horsepower Motor.

Electricity as a motive force for pumping big wells had its first test in the Plainview district yesterday. Dr. J. C. Anderson has installed a 35-horsepower vertical motor on his well, five miles west of town. Installation was done by the Connor Electric Company, and power is furnished by the Malone Light and Ice Company. Layne & Bowler pump, set 50 feet below ground. On test yesterday the well flowed nearly 2,100 gallons of water a minute.

O. Holland has a smaller well and a 71/2-horsepower motor. He lifts about 400 gallons of water a minute.

NEW 'PHONE QUARTERS READY JANUARY 15TH.

Six Boards Will Have 1,800 Line Capacity; Modern Flash-Light System.

The new telephone service will be ready by January 18, says the foreman in charge of installing the new system. A long time, this seems to the man on the outside. When you come to consider that it means a new system out and out, then the task seems somewhat larger; and when you are told that \$65,000 is being spent in installing this new equipment, you get a somewhat better idea of the work involved.

The second floor of the Ryan-O'Keefe Building is covered with cables and other paraphernalia for the new system. All old telephones will be taken out and a new flash-light system installed. Six boards in the central office will give 1,800-line capacity.

The engineers for the Southwestern Telephone Company made a survey. Their report was 10,000 people in five years; and the new system is expected to take care of this increase.

Eight or ten residences have been built. That is not enough. Two or three old houses which had been abandoned have been repaired and families are living in them. The places are unsightly and they tend to make disgruntled residents-"knockers," if you please.

When a four-room house will rent for \$16 to \$20 a month, and when the demand has been constant for twelve months, it seems that cottages offer a good channel for investment. Particularly so, in view of the constant and rapid increase in real estate values.

SUMMARY OF WORLD NEWS OF THE WEEK.

The L-2, newest and largest of Zeppelin airships, was destroyed in midair by an explosion, at Johannisthal, near Berlin. All but one of the 27 military men on board, including the entire Admiralty Trial Board. were killed. The machine was 2,500 feet in the air when the explosion occurred. The craft was 500 feet long. It was to have been the flagship of the serial navy.

Julian Hawthorne, novelist, was released from the Federal Penitentiary at Atlanta, where he had served almost a year for misuse of the mails in promoting an investment enterprise. He declares the Atlanta prison is one of the worst in the world and that he intends to write freely what he knows about the institution.

Mrs. Wilson, wife of President Wilson, and Misses Margaret and Eleanor Wilson, their daughters, have returned to Washington from the Wilson summer home, in Cornish, N. H.

The House of Deputies of the Protestant Episcopal Church, in triennial general convention at New York, voted to hold the next general convention, in 1916, at St. Louis, Mo. The decision must be ratified by the House of Bishops.

A convict in the State Reformatory at Jefferson, Indiana, has confessed that he murdered Florence Brown, stenographer in a Dallas, Texas, real estate office, who was found July 28 with her throat cut. Superintendent Peyton refuses to give the convict's name, but says it has been ascertained that he was in Dallas the day that Miss Brown was killed. Chief of Police Ryan of Dallas has been to Jeffersonville and is investigating in Dallas the possible implication ether persons.

President Wilson has given Presi ient Huerta of Mexico to understand that if harm was done to the deputies Huerta had placed under arrest, it would be regarded with extreme disfavor by the United States Government. Huerta says they were arrested them. They are, however, to be tried for sedition. The German foreign office has decided to send a warship to Mexico. President Wilson notified Huerta that in view of his decree announcing his assumption of legislative powers, the United States could not recognize as constitutional the election to be held October 26. The disentatives of Great repre Britain, France, Spain, Cuba, Guatemala and Norway, in Mexico, held a conference and decided to recommend that their respective nations send warships to Mexico. Huerta has obtained a loan of \$2,600,000 in Paris, chiefly through the influence of the chiefs of the Catholic Party. It is believed that a crisis is coming in Mexico's relations with the United States, and that this Government soon will have to take drastic action.

Governor Major of Missouri, Governor Dunne of Illinois and Governor Eberhart of Minnesota, speaking at Upper Mississippi River Association, at Hannibal, Mo., advocated a progressive, coherent policy looking toward a deep channel for the Mississippi River, which would give the great valley an outlet to the world.

Blake, for the alleged alienation of the affections of her husband, Dr. Joseph A. Blake. Official announcement was made at Paris of the victory of the American balloon, Goodyear, in the international race for the James Gordon Bennett Cup. The pilots of the Goodyear were ton. The balloon piloted by H. E. Honeywell, of St. Louis, won second place. The race will be held next year in the United States, probably in St. Louis.

Senator John L. Hare, of Lexington, Tenn., an outspoken supporter of prohibition measures, announced in the Tennessee Legislature that he had been offered \$2,500 to absent himself from the extra session. He gave no to investigate.

Miss Ruthey Howes, the smallest perfectly-formed woman in Iowa, died at New Albion, that State, at the age of 66. She was 37 inches tall and weighed 60 pounds. She was a school teacher and musician of ability.






