Oficial admission was given that the Government had sent army officers in Ireland written guarantees that the army would not be used to crush Ulster's political opposition to the Home Rule Bill. Officers were told that the army would be used to maintain law and order, but would not be required to "shot only in case the order was a reasonable one under the circum-
