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

A number of citizens have indicated that they would use city ed not to be diminished to any appreciwater rather than operate windmills if the rate could be lowered, say, one-third. Undoubtedly individuals who use water sparingly on their lawns and gardens would use a great deal more at the lower rate.

Charges for interest and sinking fund would not increase with larger water consumption. Expense for upkeep would increase very little. There would be a charge of 5c for each thousand gallons pumped. However, if the water consumption might be considerably increased on a lower rate, the water department might show larger net income than it shows now.

For example, if we now use 150,000 gallons of water a day at a fixed charge for upkeep of the plant, with a variable rate of 5e a galthousand on each thousand gallon increase, it would be good business cakes of floating ice.
