Mexico City Circulates Rumor of Attempt Assassination of Constitutionalists Leader By Women

HUERTA ALARMED BY REVOLT

Carranza Agrees To Parley With Envoys From Dictator; Niagara **Protocol Submitted To Capitals**

EL PASO, Texas, July 9.-Juarez Constitutionalists declare that rumor circulated in Mexico City of an attempt by some women to assassinate Villa is a fake. No stock is taken in the rumor of an effort to rob the rebels of

Further information is anxiously awaited concerning the assault on Guadalajara by General Obregon. It is probable that the town has already surrendered, if the rebels were not re-

Yesterday's advices said that Obregon had practically annihilated 5,000 Federals and taken many cannon, together with munitions, after 36 hours of desperate fighting. Indications then were that the Federals were de-

FORT WORTH HOG MARKET LEADS ENTIRE COUNTRY

Prices At Texas Center Set Record For Months On Shipment of Plainview Porkers

Two loads of hogs from the Plains on Thursday's last market again demonstrated Fort Worth's superiority as a livestock market, bringing \$8.75 per hundred, which was 15 cents above the Chicago top for the day and 321/2 cents above the best that Kansas City was able to offer. It was also the highest price paid for hogs on the local market for many months.

One consignment of the \$8.75 porkers came from T. W. Morrison, of Plainview, an old-time shipper to the Fort Worth market. There were 64 head, averaging 291 pounds, and the shipment brought \$1,615.25. This shipment was sold through the Daggett-Keen Commission Company. The other top-price shipment, handled by the Cassidy-Southwestern Commission Co., came from Clay Dunlap, of Cedric. It consisted of 91 head, and averaged 203

the demand for hogs on the Fort Worth market is not nearly filled. Not only the local packers, but Dallas, San Antonio and Houston slaughterers are represented here by hog buyers .-




