

Jo Anne Barnhart, Commissioner of Social Security, and Patrick O'Carroll, Jr., Inspector General of Social Security, issued a warning today about a new email scam that has surfaced recently.

The Agency has received several reports of an email message being circulated with the subject "Cost-of-Living for 2007 update" and purporting to be from the Social Security Administration. The message provides information about the 3.3 percent benefit increase for 2007 and contains the following "NOTE: We now need you to update your personal information. If this is not completed by November 11, 2006, we will be forced to suspend your account indefinitely." The reader is then directed to a website designed to look like Social Security's Internet website.

Once directed to the phony website, the individual is asked to register for a password and to confirm their identity by providing personal information such as the individual's Social Security number, bank account information and credit card information.

Inspector General O'Carroll recommends people always take precautions when giving out personal information. "You should never provide your Social Security number or other personal information over the Internet or by telephone unless you are extremely confident of the source to whom you are providing the information," O'Carroll said.

After serving 20 years as a policeman, he retired to take care of his ailing father, who was dying with prostate Just before he passed away he told Frank to get a physical. Frank said he would and after his father died, he kept

The doctor told Frank he had an advanced stage of non-Hodgkin's lymphoma, an increasingly common cancer. Frank, it was the beginning of a long and exhausting battle against the disease. He started intense chemotherapy sessions that would last for 8 years.

Fifteen hundred miles away in Dallas, Deidre's husband Stan was fighting lymphoma, the same disease Frank had. cians at Baylor Medical Center put Stan on the bone marrow transplant list and the search began to find a donor.

Frank Ryan's medical team decided to look for a bone marrow

When a couple of our friends, Deidre and Gordon, got took a blood test and got on the donor list. She was not a donor for Frank. His brothers and sisters were tested. None arried a few years ago, I noticed a man at the wedding match. Finally a match for Stan was found was a match.

Deidre was. Deidre, who went on the list trying to save someone she loved, is given another chance to save a life. Doctors at Baylor drew Deidre's stem cells and a courier transported them to Fox Chase.

Deidre's stem cells were transfused into Frank through an IV. Once the donor cells assert themselves, they attack the lymphoma. Frank's disease melted away.

A year later, Frank and Deidre met for the first time. Deidre and her fiancé, Gordon, went to Philadelphia and met Frank at the train station. He was waiting for her with a bouquet of red When they roses and a big sign bearing her name. other, they embraced. Frank said, "Thanks for everything."

As they left the train station, Frank said to a crowd of people, "This lady saved my life. Bone marrow transplant." They became good friends and stay in touch. and Gordon got married, Frank was an usher at their wedding.

Cargill employees tap innovative thinking to conserve water

Preserving precious natural resources sparked an innovative employee-led campaign to conserve vater usage at the Cargill Meat Solutions beef processing facility in Friona. Employees collaborated to address the goal to reduce water usage at the plant by 10 percent, which will save 58.5 million gallons of water each year.

During a two-month bilingual innovation campaign called "¡Qué Buena Idea!/What a Good Idea!," Cargill's 2,000 Friona employees were asked to look at their work environments in a new way and think of ideas to improve water usage by reducing the amount of water used in their work areas. A committee of employees trained team leaders to help encourage workers to identify and submit new conservation techniques for the

"Cargill believes its employees at the plants are among the most knowledgeable about the day-today processes, and they are the best to ask what will and won't work," said Steve Thompson, general manager, Friona. "The campaign was a great tool to engage our employees to come up with their own innovative ideas on new processes that could conserve more

'We had a great response from our employees and exceeded our goal of 240 ideas," explained Rhonda Weakley, innovation committee leader and Cargill technical services trainee. "We received 283 great ideas, and the committee was very impressed with the amount of creativity in each idea. Ideas were as simple as waterless soap to very

complex ideas that warrant patents. We are very pleased with the results.

Since the campaign began, the plant has already reduced water usage by 10 gallons per head (a savings of 11.7 million gallons per year) by identifying leaks, shutting off faucets when not being used and simply raising employees' awareness of water conservation

"The committee used bilingual posters, paycheck stuffers and key chains to keep the campaign top of mind with employees," added Rachel Tyner, "Cargill's assistant human resources manager. "Of the 283 ideas submitted, 30 will be implemented over the course of the next few months. We are doing our part for preserving our limited natural resources right here in Friona."

Innovation is not an unfamiliar term at Cargill or with its employees. Cargill encourages all of its employees to think outside the box and develop better processes for the work they do.

"The innovation process isn't about 50 employees gathering in a room; it's about all 33,000 employees at Cargill Meat Solutions who recognize innovation as a part of their daily job," said Paul Hiemenz, vice president, new brand initiatives. "It's about a process which effectively links all of Cargill for the purpose of creating distinctive value for our customers, employees and Cargill, Incorporated. We will continue to implement innovation campaigns as new topics are recog-



Thanksgiving travelers should expect to see plenty of High- weekends. way Patrol troopers out on Texas roadways. Troopers will be looking for drivers who are speeding, driving while intoxicated or who are not properly restrained, or have passengers who aren't

'Thanksgiving should be a happy time," said Col. Thomas A. Davis Jr., director of the DPS. "Don't turn the holiday into a tragic time for you or others because of bad driving decisions."

During the Wednesday through Sunday Thanksgiving period last year, DPS troopers wrote 14,686 tickets for speeding and 3,358 tickets for no insurance. They wrote 2,138 tickets for no seat belts and 298 tickets for child restraint violations. DPS has a no-warnings policy for seat belt and child restraint violations.

Troopers also arrested 613 people for DWI and issued 60 tickets to minors who were operating a motor vehicle after consuming alcohol.

Friona defensive back Gerald Padilla, all 5'8" and 145-pounds of him, made a great leaping interception in front of the Mule receiver to close the door on a Muleshoe victory. During the interception Padilla's helmet was ripped off and Muleshoe was assessed a 15-yard penalty, giving the Chiefs possession at their own 20.

But Friona was not able tomove the ball and punted with 1:13 left on the clock. The booming punt by Sanchez put the Mules back at their own 35. The Chieftain D took care of the rest, chasing the Mules quarterback around in the backfield and forcing an illegal forward pass, leaving Muleshoe with a 4th and 15 as their last offensive play of the game.
