Twenty Six Dead Bodies Recovered by Noon; Forty-Five Believed to Be Dead

CLOUDBURST WASHES TRACK

Heavy Rains Put Roadbeds in Kansas and Missouri in Bad Shape: **Bad Washouts**

ST. LOUIS, Mog. Sept. 15 .- By noon to-day twenty-six dead, bodies had been recovered from Goodwin Hollow, into which a Frisco passenger train bound for Texas points plunged last night. At least forty are believed to be drowned. Most of them were in RAILROADS ASK RATE the chair car. Many bodies have been washed away.

It is reported that the wreck was caused by the trestle washing out. The roadbed has been in poor shape on account of excessive rains, and last night's cloudburst washed many trestles away. Receiver W. C. Nixon denied the report that a trestle had washed out, and said that the washout had removed earth for fifty feet and the hollow contained twelve feet of water, into which the combination baggage and smoker and the chair car plunged. The relief train is going slowly, on account of washouts.

Rains and Heavy Roads Impede German Retreat; Thousands of Prisoners Taken

ALLIES YET SUCCESSFUL

Uncredited Report That Von Kluck and General Staff With 14,000 Soldiers are Captives

By United Press.

PARIS, Sept. 15 .- Germans are returning to the attack. They have made a stand north of Aisne River and north of Rheims and Chalons. They are occupying entrenchments previously prepared. The German Crown Prince's army has been driven back to Varrennes. Rains and heavy roads are increasing the difficulty of German retreat. Allies' successes continue. Thousands of prisoners are being taken.

The Germans are concentrating east of Amiene. Everything points to a renewal of serious fighting. French pursuit is encountering terrific resistance. German artillery covering the rear is inflicting heavy loses to the Allies.

BERLIN, Sept. 15 .- All efforts of the French to break through the German lines in isolated parts have failed. General fighting continues, with no decisive result. In Prussia, advance against Russians continues.

Four Russian army corps and reserve sent forward from Vilna are completely defeated. Another Russian army is defeated at Lyck. Russian casualties are enormous.

Mouth infection causes many fatal disorders-a heart disease, ulcer of the stomach and acute rheumatism. Masses of bacteria collect in between the teeth and cannot be reached by the brush. These must be swept out by floss silk. Tooth-brushing methods heretofore have not cleansed because the brushes have been too large and the bristles too long. The ordinary space for brushing in the mouth is not over 21/2 inches. The ordinary tooth

At 16 he graduated from the college at Perpignan with a degree of Bachelor of Letters, and before he had completed his seventeenth year-his case is uniquie in France-he was admitted to the Polytechnique, fourteenth in a list of hundreds, France having two West Points, the Polytechnique, for the engineers, and St. Cyr, for the other branches of the land forces.

After one year at the military academy he became an officer in the army during the Franco-Prussian War of 1870. After the war he was put in charge of the new defenses of Paris, and it was upon the fortifications designed by himself at Engheim that Marshal McMahon promoted him from Lieutenant. Joffre was at that time but 22 years old. Later he was sent to the Eastern frontier to build the fortifications at Pontarlier; to Tonkin, China, on a similar mission and elsewhere.

But Joffre wanted to see some real fighting. He began to be afraid that his life was going to be spent in building forts. He yearned to throw down the trowel and pick up his sword. General Courbet gave him his chance. Courbet took him to Formosa. There, under the enemy's fire, he organized the defense of the island. He did the same thing for Madagascar. Then he was sent to Dahomey with Colonel Bennier, who was killed in


