

Udden, geplogist for the Bureau It is thought that this publication can be issued within the next two weeks and copies can be obtained from the Bureau free of cost. It describes a very encouraging situation in Potter and Randall Counties, where a much larger amount of potash has been found in deep borings, 875 to 1,700 feet. than has been reported from any such borings anywhere in the United States "In these counties potash salts have

been found not only in brines, but as a solid material closely associated with common salt, as is the case in Geimany. The two wells in which the potash salts have been found are about 35 miles apart, one of them being 23 miles northwest of Amarillo, in Potter County, and the other in Randall County, 16 miles southwest of Amarillo.

"It is yet too early to say whether workable beds of potash salts do occure in Texas, but from the information at hand it seems probable.







MAN WITHOUT ARMS WILL CROSS CONTINENT TO FRISCO.

Albert L. Stevens, who lost both his arms in a railway accident twenty-six years ago, when he was fourteen years old, will start next June from his home, in Schenectady, New York, on an automobile trip across the continent to the Panama-Pacific Exposition, at San Francisco, driving his own car, a Ford.

Touring and doing the driving will be no experiment for Mr. Stevens. This remarkable man, by grit, determination and natural cleverness, has taught himself to do most of the things that other men do, in spite of the fact that his right arm was removed from the shoulder and his left one just below the elbow.

Some time ago he determined that he could drive a car, and he picked a Ford because of its simplicity of control and operation. He purchased his car in April. 1914, and by December 1st had driven it a little over 10,000 miles. He has made many long tours, one to New York City, one to the Thousand Islands and one of 1,044 miles to Washington, D. C. His touring experiences have taken him over all manner of roads, and he has never met with an accident. On these trips he has averaged as high as 25 miles to a gallon of gasoline. Mr. Stevens drives a regular Ford touring car, and he describes the few slight alterations he made as follows:

"I had the emergency brake lever changed so I can operate it with my foot. I have a foot accelerator to feed the gas; electric lights which I turn on or off with my foot; an electric horn which I blow by pushing a button with the side of my knee; spark lever bent so I can advance or retard the spark with by knee; and I crank the engine with my foot. I have a steel 'U'-shaped attachment which clamps on the side of the steering wheel. I place my arm in that and steer very easily. I drive just as steadily and well as most people with two hands and arms, and I think a great deal better than some. I can turn around anywhere and go anywhere anyone else can go with a Ford.'

Mr. Stevens will be accompanied on his cross-the-continent trip by his wife and two friends. They will carry a light camping outfit, to make themselves independent of hotels.

rows necessarily d or winding in some fields is of importance when compared to the conservation of moisture and even of the soil itself, in some instances.

Seeds and Quantities to Plant. Seeds of Kaffir, Milo Maize, Feterta and Broom Corn should be selected in the head direct from the field and stored during the winter in some dry place, secure from depredations of birds, rats or mice. Just before planting time the seeds should be threshed by hand and carefully cleaned. From one to two pounds of the seeds from crops named will be found sufficient Texas every day.

to plant an acre. Most farmers plant too much, rather than not enough, and then fail to properly thin the crops. Kaffir, under Southwestern conditions, should be thinned to from 24 to 30 inches apart in the row, and Milo Maize, Feterita and Broom Corn should be thinned from 18 to 24 inches apart in the row. It pays to plant only the best and the purest, regardless of the fact that such seeds may be a triffe higher in price. If these crops are grown for seed, it should be remembered that they all belong to the sor ghum (non-sacchariae) family, and hence mix readily, and should be planted as far apart as possible to prevent this undesirable mixing.

Time to Plant. Kaffir, under Southwestern conditions, should be planted from April 29 to June 15 for dwarf varieties, while

the planting season for other strains would be somewhat shorter. Milo Maize, Feterita and Broom Corn should be planted from May 1 to June 20. Cultivation.

Crusts forming in the bottom of furrows' following dashing rains after planting and before the seeds come up frequently prevent the plants from breaking through. A trough through which large spikes have been driven from the inside will prove an excellent instrument for the breaking of these crusts. These spiked troughs may be so arranged as to drag three or four rows at one and the same time, and may be used in connection with the harrow for the first two or three cultivations with good results. The lister-cultivator or "go-devil" will do excellent work when run once or twice following the harrow, where crop is planted with the lister. All cultivations should be done with sweeps or small shovels. In cultivating Kaffir, Milo Maize, Feterita and Broom Corn, cars must be exercised to prevent throwing too much dirt to the row. 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




