Placing the Burden Where It Belongs

· The City Council has acted wisely in taking from the merchants of the town the expense of street sprinkling and of providing a night-

These are both of community interest and benefit. Every citizen of Plainview has occasion to be on the streets of the business district, and any steps taken to make this section more comfortable is a benefit to all, and not alone to the merchants.

Every property owner in the business district receives benefit from the nightwatchman. Heretofore the merchants alone have been paying for this service, and some of the property owners, right in the heart of the city even, have not contributed. The merchants of a town are easily accessible, and often people feel that they can force them to assist in any enterprise by advancing, consciously or unconsciously, the fact that they trade with the merchant and that this places him ander obligation to them. The merchant will be the first one approached for contribution for any cause.

To say that the business men should keep up the street sprinkling or nightwatchman because they are most benefited is no more sound than to say that a citizen should build the street in front of his house and maintain it, because he is most benefited; or that the people in the section of the town most accessible to the water or sewer mains should pay for them.

Taxation is for the purpose of raising revenue to be expended so that the majority benefit most from it, and a distribution of expenditure for water and sewer mains, street maintenance and construction, street crossings, fire protection, police protection and general conditions of sanitation and comfort is just and equitable

OBREGON MAY BECOME CHIEF OF THE CONSTITUTIONALISTS.

Villa's Right-Hand Man, Too, Has Left Mexico for Boston, Massachusetts.

WASHINGTON, June 19.—General Venustiano Carranza, original leader of the Mexican Constitutional movement, is face to face with a situation that may eliminate him as a factor in Mexican politics, unless he yields to the dictates of his commanding gen eral, Alvaro Obregon, and other high officers in his army.

Official advices today revealed that four of Carranza's Cabinet Ministers had resigned and that General Obregon was insisting on their retention, as well as the dismissal of the members to whom they were opposed.

Marines May Not Be Landed.

Word also came to the American Government that General Jose Maytorena, the Villa commander in Sonora, objected vigorously to the possible landing of American marines to rescue Americans in the Yaqui Valley, indi cating that he would regard such ac tion as a hostile invasion. Inasmuch as Maytorena promised to send troops to the region to protect foreigners, the American Government, which had decided to land marines only if absolutely necessary, it is understood, will consider the incident closed with the arrival of the Maytorena troops.

RUSS ARE RETREATING ALONG GALICIAN FRONT

TEUTONS AND AUSTRIANS TAKE TRENCH AFTER TRENCH FROM RUSSIANS.

Germans Now as Near Lemberg As They Were Paris Last Fall; Are Confident of Success.

VIENNA, June 21, via London, 4:40 a. m.—The Russians have been in general retreat since 3 o'clock this morning along their entire front, after having been forced out of their positions on the Werezycs River, a short distance to the west of Lemberg.

Such observations, naturally enough, gave rise to doubts and to skepticism as to any essential causative relation between undernourishment and peltify the inference that pellagra is not a disease of malnutrition, provided that by undernourishment or malnutrition we mean no more than is ordinarily understood, as some degree of starva-

The comparatively recent studies that have definitely established beriberi as a "deficiency" disease, a disease of "undernourishment" or starvation in a sense hardly dreamed of before, have given a new and added significance to the more recent studies of nutrition and have opened a practically virgin field to the student of epidemiology and therapy.

"If now we consider pellagra as fault of nutrition ("undernourishment" or "starvation") in this new and special sense (that is, as in some way analogous to beriberi or scurvy), we at once get a new and more sympathetic tolerance for the reports of beneficial results not only from the use of "nourishing" food alone, but also from those reports of unusually favorable results following the administration of this, that, or the other form of arsenie or other medicine. For on closer inquiry it will be found that in those instances where there seems to be reason for believing that the favorable results claimed for this or that drug appear to have a substantial basis in fact, the credit usually claimed for the inedicine alone must, to say the least, be shared by the modification in the diet that is invariably found to have been made. Recurrences in such instances are not rare and not hard to understand when one reflects that, having gotten well, the natural tendency is to go back to one's ordinary diet, and this usually the winter diet, to some of the characters of which we will again refer.

On the basis of the foregoing conclusions and in the light of the general considerations presented, we would recommend that so long as clinical evidences of pellagra are manifest the patent should be given and urged to take (if necessary tube fed) an abundance of fresh milk, eggs, fresh lean meat, beans, and peas (fresh or dried, not canned).

We are not to be understood as saying that all cases will, or can, in this or in any other way be saved. We fear that there will always be patients who even in their first attacks are, and will be, beyond hope of recovery.

Baking Helps

Learn to Regulate the Heat of Your Oven

By Mrs. Janet McKenzie Hill, Editor of the Boston Cooking School Magazine

There is just one way to make your cakes rise high and keep an even surface. Have your oven moderate at first, until the cake is fully rizen; then increase the heat, so as to brown it over quickly. Extreme heat stiffens the dough. If you stiffen the outside of the cake before the rising is complete, you stop the rising process. Then the leavening gas, forming inside, will bulge up the center, where the dough is still soft, and spoil the shape of the cake.

NOTE-Biscuits of other pastries made from stiff dough, that are cut into shapes for the oven, bake in a hot oven. This is because the cut surfaces of the leavening gas to escape and the heat to Small ovens cool penetrate readily. quickly; therefore they should be made several degrees hotter than a larger oven, and the less the door is opened the better. Do not attempt to bake bread and pastry together. Bread reprolonged, moderate baking pastry the reverse.

THE MARKETING PROBLEM

One of the problems the Plains farmers are having to face is that of marketing. It is a demonstrated fact that the co-operative plan of marketing produce is the most successful. In order to have a steady market there must be enough truck and produce to supply the demands. For if an order is given during the season for products raised in a section and the producer cannot supply the order, the next one will be sent elsewhere. By having an abundant supply confidence in the shipping point is maintained. An individual cannot raise enough to supply a good live market, and pooling produce offers a ready solution to this problem.

The expense of maintaining an efficient manager and salesman when distributed over the business of several men almost loses its identity as an overhead cost, whereas it would be prohibitive for a

A canning factory in connection with a warehouse for marketing is feasible, in that the surplus produce can be preserved for future

This idea occurs: There should be a good sale for beet pickles during the winter months. In the Plainview country beets are grown with light cost and the canning of this vegetable and storing the product until winter sales open might be profitable.

An exceedingly interesting bulletin, "Successful Marketing," was issued this week by the Extension Service of the Texas Agricultural and Mechanical College. It gives the experience, not of some remote section, but of the East Texas Fruit and Truck Growers' Association. of Jacksonville. It is a concrete example of the successful marketing organization. These scavengers may convey the germ of typhoid fever or other contagious diseases from the sick room or excretia to the milk. Typhoid epidemies have been caused by flies spreading the germs. Milk and other food should be guarded from flies as rigorously as you would avoid exposure to

Several years ago an epidemic of typhoid fever broke out in Plainview. The precautionary measures taken since that time have kept our town remarkably free from the disease. As a matter of fact, this section has become noted for the excellent health-producing environment, and is remarkable for a town of five thousand.

To swat the fly, and keep forever at it, is one of the best preventive steps that can be taken against disease.


