### Child's Play

Edinburg may be the only city in the country where students can begin their college education in the sixth grade.

It's the unique College for Kids at The University of Texas-Pan American. Students from grades 6 through 12 can enroll in up to four classes in each of two summer sessions.

Students have more than 50 classes to choose from, ranging from math and the sciences and basic skills improvement, to fine arts, music and drama. There are even courses in personal finance and baby-sitting.

### You Might Like To Know

That Texas is one of 28 states that still allows the use of a paddle as punishment of public school students.

Corporal punishment, as it is called, has been around since the Old Testament prophet warned that "he who spares the rod spoils the son." It was not until 20 years ago that Massachusetts became the first state to ban the practice.

In 1991, Arizona became the 22nd state to make spanking by school officials illegal.

Belt-tightening by The University of Texas System has saved \$214 million in the last five years.

When the Higher Education Coordinating Board asked public universities how they have increased efficiency and saved taxpayer's money, U.T. System Chancellor Hans Mark told the System's 15 component institutions to sharpen their pencils.

They did. From 1987 to 1992, while enrollments were growing 12.4 percent and legislative appropriations remained relatively flat or declined, the cost-cutting helped the U.T. System bridge the chasm of trying to serve more students with less money.

Chancellor Mark said that saving millions through more efficient administration, automation, energy conservation and other devices wasn't the System's only contribution to helping solve the state's budgetary problems.

Pioneering efforts in winning funds under the Federal Disproportionate Share Medicaid Program enhanced Texas general revenues by \$435 million!

### Progress Report

School dropouts in Texas are steadily declining.

Of the 1.37 million students enrolled in grades 7 through 12 last year, only 53,965 quit classes. That's a rate of only 3.9 percent.

Scientists think this may be why the city has one of the lowest rates of admissions to mental hospitals in the U.S.

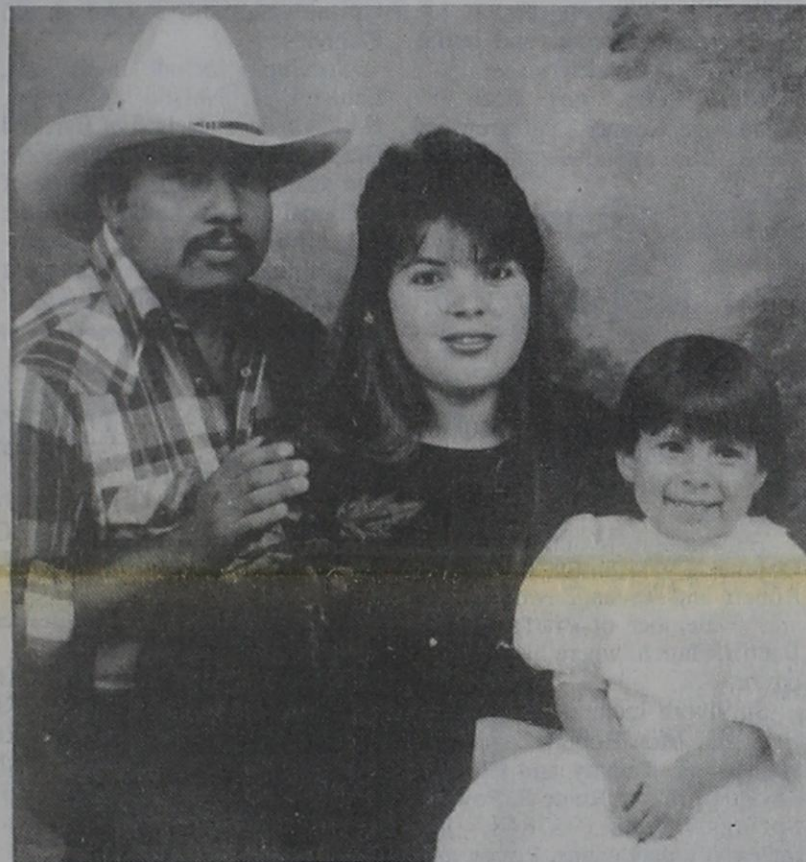
### Air Apparent

## City Gets Friona All-Stars Sales Tax Have Three 1-Run Rebate Games At Altus

The City of Friona received its monthly sales tax rebate from the state comptroller's office this week, in the amount of \$7,898.30.

The July check was \$629 less than the city received at the same time a year ago, when the city's check was \$8,527.40.

However, for the year, the city has received \$66,361.73, which is 1.46 per cent ahead of the 1991 year-to-date total of \$65,406.03.

State Comptroller John Sharp said that overall, the July rebates across the state were 5.5 per cent above their totals of the previous year.

Parmer County's three municipalities have received \$104,555.50 during the current calendar year. That is an increase of 1.59 per cent over the \$102,918.30 that the three cities (Friona-Bovina-Farwell) had received at the same time in 1991.

The City of Houston received \$14.2 million, up 2.2 per cent from its total of \$13.9 million in July of 1991. "Houston's trade employment has remained stable, adding 600 new jobs to the local economy between May 1991 and May, 1992."

"Defense cutbacks and the national recession continue to ravage the manufacturing and construction industries. The bright spots of the Dallas economy are the government, services, transportation and trade sector," Sharp said.

Friona's Bronco League All-Stars, winners of the regional tournament at Lubbock, have been involved in several cliff-hanger games at the sectional tourney this week in Altus, Oklahoma.

The all-stars were playing Thursday night in the finals of the elimination bracket of the tournament, having won a pair of one-run decisions and lost another in their three games this week.

Friona dropped a 10-9 decision to the Lawton All-Stars on Monday, when the Oklahoma team scored pairs of runs in the sixth and seventh to score a come-from-behind win.

Sam Perez and Cecil Cooper each socked home runs to pace Friona's 10-hit attack, but Lawton, which was limited to six singles through the first six innings by a trio of Friona pitchers, got its first extra-base hit, a double, in the seventh, to claim the win.

Quint Ellis, Jesus Mata and Cooper pitched for Friona. On Tuesday night, Friona held on for an 11-10 win over the Lawton, Oklahoma Breakfast Optimist Club.

Cooper paced a 12-hit Friona attack with three singles and a double. Friona was trailing, 5-4, when they came to bat in the top of the fifth inning. The West Texans scored seven runs, more than batting around, to take an 11-5 lead. Then they had to hold on for dear life.

Ellis, who was the third pitcher for Friona, was the winner. Cooper started the game, relieved by Mata in the third inning. Jeff Hamilton is the Friona catcher.

Hamilton's two-out single in the bottom of the seventh inning scored Cecil Cooper with the winning run on Wednesday night, as the Friona All-Stars stayed alive in the post-season tournament.

Cooper started the seventh-inning rally with a one-out single. He advanced to second on a two-out walk to Perry Hanes before Hamilton lined a single to right field.

Friona was meeting the Altus All-Stars for the second time Thursday night. They are forced to keep winning, as one more loss would eliminate them from the tournament.

**60 Yrs. Ago-July 29, 1932**  
Returns from last week's Democratic Primary in Parmer County showed that Ferguson received 698 votes for governor, Sterling 420 and Hunter 207. Aldridge led the voting for county judge with 716 votes Goodwine received 651, and Ray 268. Hall was elected Sheriff with 1002 votes, to 515 for Hawkins and 131 for Hawks. Rushing received the nomination for County and District Clerk with 980 votes, to 666 for McCuan. Witherspoon led the bal-

lot for District Attorney, with 1005 votes, to 520 for Richards.

**50 Yrs. Ago-July 24, 1942**  
The June 30 registration of 18, 19 and 20 year-old youths in Parmer County showed a total of 128 men, according to the order number list released this week by the county selective service board. Names are arranged according to age. Only men who have reached their 20th birthday are now liable for military service. Others become eligible as they reach their 20th birthday.

O.B. Ginn, superintendent of Friona Schools, has been elected president of the Graduate Club of WTSU, Canyon.

**40 Yrs. Ago-July 24, 1952**  
Formal opening of Strickland's Shamrock Service Station in Friona has been announced for this Saturday and Sunday. This is the first Shamrock station in Friona, and it will be operated by Paul Strickland. Lee Campbell will assist Mr. Strickland in keeping the station open 24 hours per day.

**35 Yrs. Ago-July 25, 1957**  
Repair and patchup work on the well that failed about two weeks ago started in Friona last Thursday as a well service rig pulled up to the pump house and hoisted the pump and housing from the hole. This was done after the city commission decided last week to start looking for more water.

A 1957 Ford, stolen from in

front of a cafe in Clovis Saturday night, was overturned northeast of Bovina Sunday morning. The driver, Louis Williams, was arrested Sunday afternoon and was charged with speeding. He was fined \$10 and court costs in J.R. Thornton's justice of the peace court Monday morning, before being turned over to Clovis authorities.

**30 Yrs. Ago-July 26, 1962**  
Two indictments of four counts each against Emmett Tabor, former mayor of Bovina, were returned by Parmer County Grand Jury following a Monday session. A shortage of \$13,055.21 was found in City of Bovina funds following Tabor's resignation as mayor in February. Restitution of the entire amount was made.

**25 Yrs. Ago-July 27, 1967**  
Work is progressing at Missouri Beef Packers, with construction approaching the height of activity, according to Rufus Davis, plant engineer. At the present time, 24 men are working full time on various stages of construction. Within 30 days, Davis says he expects to have 70 men working in a daytime shift and 70 working a night shift, when things really reach "high gear."

**20 Yrs. Ago-July 27, 1972**  
The greatest gathering in the history of Parmer County for the cause of Christ is the goal of Encounter '72 this Sunday evening at 8:30, which will conclude the weeklong Crusade at Friona's Chieftain Field. Through the first three services, attendance had averaged over 1,250 per evening. The first service last Sunday drew the largest crowd to date, when around 1,600 people turned out. Excellent weather blessed the first three services.

**15 Yrs. Ago-July 24, 1977**  
The Parmer County Sheriff's Office recovered almost \$30,000 worth of farm machinery Wednesday, and may have broken one of the biggest theft rings of the county has seen in years. Machinery from all over Parmer County was found at a second-hand farm implement house in Clovis, NM. A suspect is under surveillance, and Parmer County Sheriff Charles Lovelace is planning to file charges in the case, although an investigation is still being conducted.

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## When The Hurting Won't Stop

Some people think of suicide when the hurting keeps going on and on. It's not that they are mentally ill, they just want the pain to stop. They may feel like they have tried everything and nothing helps. The light at the end of their tunnel is an on-coming train instead of hope.

People who commit suicide do not just suddenly decide to do it. It involves circumstances that keep eroding and tearing away at their coping abilities for the things they are facing. They normally give out clues about their attitude about life. Some of the clues are obvious like a long time in deep depression with statements like, "life isn't worth living," or buying a weapon. Other clues are less obvious, like hoarding medication, slowly drawing away from others, giving things away, etc.

It's important to take the clues you do not see seriously. Ask the person about their thoughts and intentions of suicide, especially if you see a cluster of clues. Take threats seriously. Don't shrug them off as if they are just trying to get attention. You can call the police

if you suspect a person is suicidal. There is a local crisis-line available also at 296-5555.

If you are one who is thinking of ending your life, there may be another option. There is nothing wrong with hurting and feeling bad about life. Most of us do at some point. You are not strange, bad or weird for struggling with what you are facing. I would suggest two things:

1. Call a counselor or someone you trust that will allow you to express your feelings-someone that will let you hurt; and
  2. Do some type of physical exercise. It doesn't have to be an extreme thing. It could be like moderate walking. If you are physically limited, find something you can be involved in mentally or as physically as possible that will allow you to expend energy.
- My hope is that the sun will shine for you someday soon.

Although the anglers began at the stroke midnight, it was three o'clock before the first bass came to the scales. Danny Mitchell fooled a nice 5.44 lb. black bass that would have won the previous three day-time tournaments, but this was not a normal tournament.

At 5:00 a.m., when the eastern sky just promises the arrival of the sun, the big bass started feeding. Using a black lizard, Les Widowski of Amarillo caught a 7.29 lb. and a 7.31 lb.

Is a seven pound bass good enough to win? Not during moon-

light madness. De Francis caught a large 8.05 lb. bass and was on his way to becoming the first three-time winner.

Using a black/chartreuse salt craw, Ron Griffith derailed De's plans by catching a huge 8.20 lb. Ron won \$770 and a trophy almost as big as his bass. Don't feel too sorry for De because he took home \$420 for his efforts.

What techniques did the top finishers have in common? Each used big black baits--Zoom lizards and Gene Larew saltcraws. Big bass prefer big baits and black works well at night. Each successful angler used a "black light" that enabled him to 'see' the line.

## Commerce Exceeds Job Creation Goal

## Food Safety Is A Serious Consideration At Picnics

Picnics are such exciting summertime adventures. The break from everyday meals at the dining room table can give sandwiches and potato chips new meaning.

The perfect picnic is an all-day event. From planning the meal and packing the food to spreading out the checkered table cloth and eating in the great outdoors, picnics can involve the entire family.

A picnic can be a fun-filled day with games and activities for the children, or it can be a just-for-two romantic outing.

One of the most important things to keep in mind when planning any type of a picnic is food safety. Follow these tips for all of your outdoor meals.

\* Cook food thoroughly to destroy harmful bacteria.

\* Avoid "cross contamination" by washing anything that comes into contact with raw meat or poultry. Use hot, soapy water to wash your hands, counters, utensils and cutting boards.

\* Never eat raw meat, eggs or seafood.

\* Take a well-insulated cooler and plenty of ice. Keep the cooler in a cool place.

\* Thoroughly chill all perishable foods and then keep in a cooler while outdoors.

\* Use an insulated bottle or dish for hot foods. Hot foods should be kept at 140 degrees or above and should be served soon after removing from the heat or insulation.

\* Do not leave perishable foods at room temperature for more than two hours or at an outside temperature of 85 or above for more than one hour.

\* Either cook the food completely at home or take raw food and cook it at the picnic site.

\* If taking a cooler is not possible, pack a picnic meal of safe foods: fruits, vegetables, hard cheeses, canned or dried meat or fish, dry cereal, bread, peanut butter and crackers.

For your next picnic, try some of the following recipes.

### NEW POTATO SALAD

2 pounds new potatoes  
1/2 cup sliced celery  
3 hard-cooked eggs, sliced  
8-ounce carton sour cream  
1 tablespoon fresh dillweed or 1 teaspoon dried dillweed  
2 tablespoons vinegar  
1 teaspoon sugar  
2 teaspoons prepared horseradish  
1/2 teaspoon salt  
1/2 teaspoon dry mustard  
1/8 teaspoon pepper

Cook the potatoes in boiling water for 20 minutes or until tender. Drain well and let cool. Peel the potatoes and slice into 1/2-inch slices. Combine the potatoes, celery and eggs in a large bowl; toss

gently. Combine the remaining ingredients in a small bowl. Pour over the potato mixture; stir gently to coat. Chill thoroughly. Makes 6 to 8 servings.

### SPICY DOGS

2 tablespoons softened margarine  
2 tablespoons honey mustard  
1/2 cup chopped tomatoes  
1/4 cup chopped onion  
1/4 cup chopped green pepper  
1 small jalapeno, finely chopped  
4 bun length wieners  
4 mini French baguettes or hot dog buns

Combine the softened margarine and honey mustard; set aside. Combine the tomato, onion, green pepper and jalapeno. Split the wieners almost through the length; spoon the tomato mixture into the split. Cut a 1/2 inch slice off each end of the baguette. Using a serrated knife, cut the bread down the center almost to bottom. Carefully spread the halves apart. Spread with the mustard mixture. Place the filled hot dogs into the bread; cut the sandwich in half with a serrated knife. Wrap each sandwich in a paper towel and microwave on high for 30 seconds. Makes eight sandwiches.

1 medium cucumber  
1 medium yellow squash  
1 medium carrot, scraped and grated  
2 cups alfalfa sprouts  
1/3 cup crumbled feta cheese  
1/4 cup reduced-calorie salad dressing, your choice  
1/4 cup low-fat cottage cheese  
1 tablespoon minced fresh oregano, or 1 teaspoon dried oregano

leaves, crumbled  
1/4 teaspoon black pepper  
Leaf lettuce  
3 6-inch whole pita bread rounds, cut in half

Cut the cucumber and squash in half lengthwise; slice thinly. Combine the cucumber and squash with the next seven ingredients and toss. Place leaf lettuce in each bread half and fill with the sandwich mixture. Makes six servings.

### CRUNCHY CHICKEN

1/2 cup corn flake crumbs  
1/4 teaspoon salt  
1/4 teaspoon celery salt  
1/4 teaspoon garlic salt  
1/4 teaspoon paprika  
2 chicken breast halves, skinned  
1/4 cup skim milk

Combine the first six ingredients, mixing well. Dip the chicken in the milk and then roll in the corn flake crumb mixture, coating well. Place the chicken in a lightly greased baking pan. Bake, uncovered, at 400 degrees for 45 minutes or until the chicken is tender. Makes two servings.

### MELON-BERRY DESSERT

1 medium honeydew  
2 cups watermelon balls  
1 cup cantaloupe balls  
1 cup fresh blueberries  
2 tablespoons lime juice  
Mint leaves

Cut a thin slice from the side of the honeydew to keep it from rolling off the platter. Place the honeydew, cut side down, on the platter. Cut off the top third of the honeydew; scoop out the seeds. Using a melon ball cutter, scoop out the honeydew into balls, leaving a 1/2-inch thick shell. Set aside 2 cups of honeydew balls, reserving the remaining balls for other uses. Combine the honeydew and the next 4 ingredients. Spoon the mixture into the honeydew shell and garnish with the mint leaves. Makes six servings.

## Evaluation Assistance Offered

Local producers interested in checking the efficiency of their irrigation wells should contact the Soil Conservation Service.

The Parmer County Soil Water conservation district has an ultrasonic flow meter available. This device is attached to any exposed pipe or sprinkler and measures gallons per minute by a system of sound waves.

Evaluations of the well will show the fuel consumption and fuel cost per hour. It will also give you the overall efficiency of the well compared to the national standard efficiency. This procedure will also give you the annual fuel cost and dollar savings per year.

Wells need to be checked periodically to insure that they are performing at their maximum efficiency. Producers interested in well evaluations and wanting further information should contact the Soil Conservation Service located at 1306 West 9th in Friona or call 247-2220.

"Read to someone you love, literacy begins at home."

**FAMILY LITERACY**--a project for all, a project that will provide for the future of our country through the promotion of literacy within the family unit from its beginning.

American Library Association's "10 Tips For Parents"--1. READ TO YOUR NEW BABY: cards, newspapers, cereal boxes. It's the sounds that are important; 2. INTRODUCE YOUR BABY TO simple picture and story books. The shapes and colors will delight, and listening adds to learning; 3. VISIT THE LIBRARY REGULARLY. Let children select their own books; 4. MAKE THE BEDTIME STORY a regular family event. Older children will enjoy reading aloud if the right books are selected; 5. REMEMBER POETRY! The short verses are perfect for short attention spans; 6. HAVE CHILDREN READ ALOUD while you cook, iron, sew, sort laundry; 7. USE TELEVISION to encourage reading. Read about people, places or things that interest your family on TV; 8. KEEP PLENTY OF READING materials at home. Put children's

books on low shelves within easy reach; 9. LET YOUR CHILDREN SEE YOU READING. Talk about what you read. 10. GIVE BOOKS AS GIFTS. Let your children know you think books are special.

"Parents are their children's first and most influential teachers. What parents do to help children learn is more important to academic success than how well-off the family is." *What Works*, U.S. Dept. Ed.

Our local VIP program at Friona ISD is a good example of family involvement for literacy. The Summer Drama Workshop is also very good for literacy skills (reading, acting, storytelling and imagination skills).

### Investment Flexibility Can Enhance Mutual-fund Performance

Some mutual funds offer shareholders benefits that are often overlooked. One such benefit is the reinvestment of dividends and capital gains. This allows your investment to compound during a time when you may prefer to delay receiving the income.

Consider, for example, a \$10,000 investment in a diversified portfolio of common stocks from Dec. 31, 1974 through Dec. 31, 1991. As measured by the Standard & Poor's 500 Index, the investment would have earned more than \$29,000, and the number of shares would have grown from 146 to more than 300. For those who elected income reinvestment, however, the total investment would have compounded to more than \$125,000.

Many investors, however, prefer to diversify their income rather than reinvest it in the same fund. Until recently, the only way to do this was either to call or write the fund company at the end of each distribution period and specifically request a transfer of shares to another fund. Today, some funds allow shareholders to pre-select a fund, or funds, within their group into which distributions from another fund can be reinvested automatically. This benefit allows you to deposit principal as conservatively as you wish and use only the income or profits to reinvest in another fund, one

possibly more growth-oriented.

Another mutual-fund shareholder benefit that often goes unnoticed is lump sum dollar-cost averaging. Seldom can anyone accurately predict market tops or bottoms. For this reason, one might be uncomfortable investing large lump sums into any mutual fund when the market has shown a prolonged up-trend. After all, it might drop. If not, when do you invest? A higher market offers even more risk, you may reason.

A simple solution that lets your money go to work immediately is to deposit the lump sum into a fund with a history of the least market fluctuation. Most fund groups offer a money-market fund or U.S. Treasury money fund that has no fluctuation of net asset value. This eliminates the anxiety of perfect timing. Next, instruct the fund to automatically transfer a stated dollar amount into your pre-selected long-term mutual fund at specified intervals--monthly, quarterly or semi-annually. This way, you hedge your investment timing. If the market does decline, you benefit by buying at lower prices. If it continues an upward trend, your ultimate profits will probably not be as much, but you are entering the market progressively as it rises.

Shareholder services and benefits have become nearly as important in selecting a mutual-fund family as performance. When properly used, the investment flexibility and convenience of these services can enhance your fund's performance.

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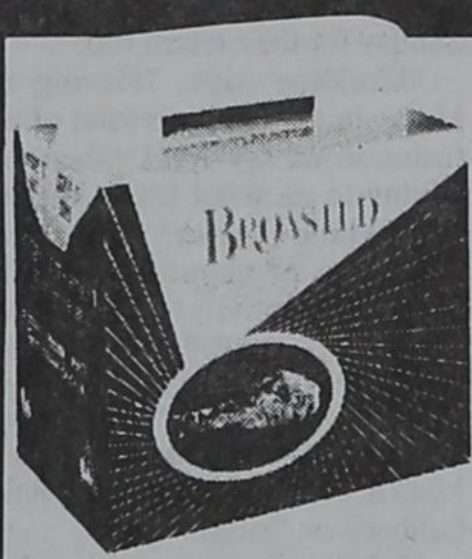
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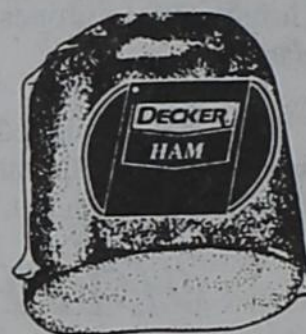
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
