MEXICAN PRISONER TELLS

VILLA'S BAND MURDERS

Practically None of Official Movements Made Known Because of Strict Censorship.

On information furnished by a Mexican prisoner as to the whereabouts of Villa, American troops are supposed to reach Casas Grandes at midnight tonight, preparatory to moving on the

hills in which Villa and his bandit army are suposed to be hiding. The American troops are being directed in their march by Carrancista scouts, and are said to be making advances of more than thirty miles daily.

Reports indicate that Villa's band is murdering, burning and plundering as is goes. The American expeditionary force has not encountered any of the bandit chief's outlaws, according to advices to the War Department.

It is felt now that the better class of Mexicans will make no attempt to support Villa or make objection to the campaign of the War Department against him, but rather will assist in his capture and the elimination of his band. Villa's strength is not definitely known, and it is problematical whether he will fight or try to escape. Much depends upon developments as to whether the United States troops will continue to have the support of Carranza's followers.

HACHITA, N. M., March 15 .- Copies of military orders issued to the expeditionary force and received here indicate that dispatches from correspondents with the troops will not be passed by the censor for several days.

EL PASO, Texas, March 15 .- American troops were on Mexican soil tonight sixty miles west of here. They were the vanguard of an expedition gathered in less than a week, but nevertheless one of the most powerful forces assembled in this country since the war between the States.

The troops tonight were out on the hills where one week ago tonight Pancho Villa led 1,200 of his bandite stealthily up to the American border to make an early morning raid upon the sleeping American city of Columbus, N. M.

Censor Guards Secrets.

From how many hundreds of miles this force had been assembled, the elements of its armament, its numbers and the direction or directions in which its various columns headed after they passed the international line were secrets held by the military censorship. The one important fact that the Americans had gone into Mexico again was an event witnessed by hundreds lumbus. 





The success of the United States Department of Agriculture in discovering and introducing grain and forage sorghums and other plants, upon which a permanent and prosperous agriculture has been built in vast sections where corn and the Eastern tame has grasses canot be depended upon, encourages the belief that further research might, and probably would, result in the discovery of a grass that will do as much for the pastures and ranges. No other agency is so well qualified to undertake this work as the Department of Agriculture, and the expense should be paid out of the general revenues of the country, since the entire country would share in the benefits sought to be derived; every section is interested in the production of meat animals on the ranges. Not only for the initial research work is the Department best equipped, but the testing out of the species introduced can best be done on the Government's many established dry-land experimental farms. From three to six years would be required for testing out each grass, before its value could be determined.

The agricultural appropriation bill to be passed by the present Congress should by all means carry an item of sufficient amount to enable the Department to start this search at once, and keep it up until the grass is found, tested out and introduced. The amount required would be trifling, considering the need and the probale results.

The cultivated plants of every section of the earth have been studied and tested by the Department of Agriculture, with marvelous results. If all the money ever expended on the Department had resulted in nothing more than the introduction of the kaffirs and milos, feterita and Sudan grass, it would have been the best investment the Government ever made, for it has vastly increased the possible grainand-forage-producing area of the entire country, and stabilzed and made more certain other large areas.

In an address before the Tenth International Dry-Farming Congress, at Denver, last October, C. V. Piper, agrostologist of the Department of Agriculture, said:

"The most striking and significant fact is that all of our cultivated grasses and clovers came from the Old World. This is true not only of our hay plants, such as timothy, clover, alfalfa, redtop, orchard grass, brome grass sorghums, the millets, cow peas, soybeans, vetches and peas, but also of our pasture plants, such as blue grass, 1842 Bermuda grass, Japan, white and bur clover, and alfalfa. From the rapid way in which most of these pasture plants have spread and occupied the land, the erroneous idea commonly prevails that they are native to North America, which is just exactly what they are not. Indeed, these Old World grasses and legumes possess an aggressiveness that enables them to conquer, which is perhaps in its boilogical nature not unlike the aggressiveness of the white man in making the New World his own. Be that as it may, the fact is too clear to be mistakable, and is one of profound significance in agriculture as in other fields. * * * Most of the plants I have mentioned are adapted to humid or semi-humid conditions. Are there not others adapted to more arid conditions which will likewise spread over our dry lands and increase their pasturage? It would be strange indeed if such were not the cese. * * * One other fact needs emphasizing in regard to the finding of better dry-land pasture plants, namely, that all our valuable crop plants came from regions of comparable climatic conditions. Thus, nearly all of the posture plants of the Eastern States came from Europe; of the Southern States, from Eastern and Southern Asia and from South Africa; of California, from the Mediterranean regions. * * * Where, then, are we to look for better dry land pasture plants for the Great Plains region especially? Undoubtedly the most promising field would be Central Asia, a region of enormously diverse climatic conditions.



TWO COUNTIES FOR AGRICULTURAL PROGRESS.

Now a farm demonstrator for Hale and Floyd Counties is assured. The Commissioners of the two counties have seen fit to make the appropriations to pay a man to do the work. Professor Hare, who it seems sure will be employed by the commissioners, is a man of practical experience in farm management, and a man who has studied the scientific side of the business. He should be worth much more than the salary paid him to the people of the two counties. And, indeed, if he is not the move has been an unwise one. But the experience of other counties the Nation over with farm demonstrators is such that we have no doubt but that Hale County and Floyd County will retain a demonstrator through a series of years.

The demonstrator for the two counties has been secured at a cost of \$2,200 a year. Hale County and Floyd County pay each \$750 and the United States Department of Agriculture's Extension Department pays \$700.

Our demonstrator will be at a disadvantage the first year, for he comes at the opening of the planting season, and his work here is new to him. Had he begun work in the fall he would have been able to make his first year's work show up better. But we have no doubt that, even with the disadvantage of a late start, his year's work will result in much good.

His services will be at the command of any citizen of either county. He is a servant of the public, in the noblest sense of the expression. It is his duty, and we are sure his pleasure, to help the farmers and stockmen of Hale and Floyd Counties in every way possible, bringing to them the knowledge of tree spraying, treating livestock, testing seed, feeding balanced rations, farm sanitation, and other branches of the important business of farming.
