BELIEVED THAT BANDIT HAS **ESCAPED TO MOUNTAINS SOUTH** AND WEST OF GUERRERO.

FEAR SUPPLY LINE MAY BE CUT

Extra Heavy Infantry Guard Placed on Truck Trains Moving to Front With Supplies,

SAN ANTONIO, Texas, April 2.--Unless Francisco Villa is definitely located within the next day or two it is believed here that General Pershing will begin a dogged search for him in the mountains west and south of Guerrero. Since the defeat of Villa's force March 29 in and near Guerrero General Pershing has had lightly equipped mobile detachments of cavalry sweeping in whirlwind fashion through the district about the headwaters of the Santa Maria River in efforts to locate the elusive bandit, reported to have gone in that direction after being desperately wounded.

Villa May Not Be Injured.

There is increasing belief that General Pershing may have been deceived in regard to the direction taken by Villa and even concerning his injuries. 

be drawn across every exit from the district northeast of Guerrero, and it was believed that General Pershing would not adopt any new plan until he has thoroughly satisfied himself that Villa was not in the indicated region.

Failure to run him down since Wednesday strengthened the belief that he is south of the railroad, and if General Pershing has to send his scouts and cavalry into that country, broken by mountains and sparsely settled, it was realized that slow progress would be made.

No News of Carranza Troops.

News from Mexican sources that Carranza's forces had proved his promise of co-operation by preventing his escape into that region was anxiously awaited at headquarters, but little information as to the operations of the Mexican Government troops has been received, and that only in an unofficial manner.

General Funston was in receipt today of State Department information regarding the conditions at Chihuahua and other parts of Mexico, but refused to make it public. It was stated at his headquarters, however, that there ap-Colonel Cano, who was leading one of the heavier forces against Villa, had revolted against Carranza and had joined Villa.

Another story that has come out of Mexico that has been given some credence at army headquarters was that Villa was headed for Chihuahua City. The advanced cavalry of General Pershing is not far from Chihuahua.

COLUMBUS, N. M., April 2 .- Army men here were considerably disturbed today by numerous warnings from confidential sources that adherents of Francisco Villa were gathering in the Chihuahua desert, both north and south of Ascencion and near the motor-train route leading from Columbus to Casas Grandes, for the purpose of attempting to cut the line of communication of the American punitive expedition in Mexico.

An extra heavy guard of infantrymen, with specific instructions in the event of an attack, was placed on a truck train which left here for the front today. Diary of Mesdames Garner and Pendley on Trip from Plainview to New Mexico,

CROSSING PLAINS OF TEXAS

IN STORMY MONTH OF

The Herald has received through the mail a communication from Mesdames Pendley and Garner, who are in a party moving from the Scuth Plains Country to New Mexico, in "prairie schooners." As a reminder of days that have almost passed, this diary is interesting.

"Thirty Years' Experience-First Pleasure Trip.

"BOUND FOR MEXICO, March 20,-First day's journey was from Whitfield to Plainview, meeting a real dust storm. First exercise was running our little dog, Karo, about two miles. He was trying to go back to his master, Adolph Linderman, from whom we bought him

"Reaching Plainview, Re-loading. "On Wednesday morning we went to town. At noon we traded horses, and loaded the wagons. At three o'clock we were about ready to start. We started with an awful bad cough and cold-coughed all night the first night. It sprinkled rain half the night on us Was real cold.

"Next morning we went through Hale Center. Thursday morning we met two rain showers full in the face, and in the evening we met an awful sandstorm. Camped at the Spade ranch. Everything in camp has taken a bad cold.

"Friday morning we all like to have froze. We have worn two caps and cloaks. Every day then was cold. Nooned at Littlefield and had one horse shod. Another dreadful evening. We camped at the -N- ranch.

"Saturday morning the wind was from the north, freezing ice. We all like to have froze getting breakfast. The children were all crying with their hands and feet and almost coughing their heads off. We have never got to eat on our chuckbox lid-just have to get in the wagons and eat a handout. We are begging every night to go back home. No one is satisfied but Mr. Garner. Well, Karo is getting satisfied too. He stayed with us without being tied last night. He leads off a day until he gets tired; then he barks until we let him ride.

"Saturday evening we traveled about 10 miles where the grass had all been burned off. Then we had about four miles of rocks, which was surely rough. Came across the line about 5 o'clock p. m., and had about a mile and a half of sand to pull. Camped at 🗶

A post-mortem examination shows with dark, frothy blood, and with a foul-smelling odor.

As a matter of prevention, cattle under two years of age should be changed to another pasture (preferably higher and drier) as soon as the disease makes it appearance, and the market, following closely the directions which usually accompany products.

When once the disease has made its appearnce on a place, it is recommended that vaccination be practiced regularly, treating the spring calves the following fall, and the fall calves the following spring, which will insure their being protected before they become more susceptible .-- W. This well is 309 feet deep. The length of the casing is 110 feet. The well was first drilled to 160 feet, and from this depth ordinary "sulphur" water was obtained. In order to use both kinds of water an inner tubing was run nearly to the bottom of the well. Both this and the outer casing were connected with pumps, so that ordinary water
