As the leaves begin to dry a warm, dry, well-ventilated Candles were lighted by shed or garage with good light is best to remove as much of the soil as possible when lifting. This hastens the drying and curing process, the Texas A&M specialist says.

After drying remove dead leaves and inspect tubers to be sure they are free of disease and insects. Dust them thoroughly with a combination of Capton and Sevin to protect against insects and fungus disease in storage.

Using dry peat moss or vermiculite, pack the tubers in a container so they do not touch each other. Store in a warm dry closet at 60 degrees F. Colder themperatures will promote rotting; warmer temperatures will cause premature sprouting.

Caladium tubers should not be set out in the spring until the soil temperature reaches 70 degrees F., Janne says.

In Central Texas this is usually about May 1; in the Dallas-Fort Worth Area about May 15; and in South Central Texas about April 15.


Inspect stored tubers before planting and discard those that have rotted areas or appear damaged in any way.
