College Band To Perform Here

Groom Staggered By 'Horn Muscles

There is something for everybody in the McMurry College Band tour which includes a performance at 1 p.m. Thursday, December 4, in the Muleshoe High School auditorium. That is the opinion of Dr.

Raymond T. Bynum, director of the McMurry Band since 1946 and one of the best known bandmasters in the Southwestern United States.

"The image of McMurry College is enhanced wherever we play," says Dr. Bynum. "The residents see a bunch of decent kids going where they are supposed to go. So far as I know, we can go back anywhere we've played before."

"And the tours help the morale of the students. There is a semi-professional feeling they acquire in making these tours."

Two former Muleshoe High School students, who both graduated in 1968, will be with the band when it performs in Muleshoe. They are David Dillman, son of Mr. and Mrs. Neal Dillman and Gus Taylor, son of Mr. and Mrs. A.G. Taylor.

Going with the band on this fall tour, the latest in a long succession of such musical embassies which have taken McMurry-style band music from Kansas to Mexico City, will be a variety of rare instruments. Handbells, marimbas and Aida trumpets will be packed into the big band truck, built especially for the McMurry

Band, alongside the trombones and drums an audience is more accustomed to finding in such an organization.

Dr. Bynum's musicians will have a wide repertoire from which to draw their program, ranging from light classics to the popular music sweeping the country. Overtures and suites include Von Suppe's "Light Cavalry Overture," Camille DeNardis's "Universal Judgment" and Gustav Holst's First Military Band Suite.

On the other side of the scale will be Percy Faith's "Brazilian Sleigh Bells," Johnny Mercer's "Autumn Leaves" and Paul Yoder's rumba "Relax."

Marches include Frank Ventre's "Wings of Victory," Henry Fillmore's "Americans We" and one which has become a Bynum trademark for McMurry -- John Philip Sousa's "Stars and Stripes Forever." Solos and ensembles include Sherri Pipkin and Charles Dickey playing "The Two Imps" on the marimbas; Ann Haralson, Barry Brock and Andy Anderson playing "The Three Trumpeters."

There is a novelty for piccolo, "Little Brown Jug Goes to Town." The entire french horn section -- Mike Steinberg, Kathy King, Jim Houston, Kara Sides, David Verner, David Dillman, David Verner, David Dillman, Mike Petty -- step out to play "Horns a-Hunting."

A favorite English handbell choir selection, arranged by McMurry student Charles Dickey, is "Lara's Theme" from the film "Dr. Zhivago." The current short autumn band tour will take the band musicians to Friona, Colorado City, Brownfield, Morton, Muleshoe, Stanton, Sweetwater and points west before they return to the McMurry College campus Dec. 7. There is also a spring tour.

Goodfellows Open, Contributions Sought

Each year, a number of families in Bailey County, as in other counties and states, would not have any Christmas without the aid of an anonymous group of local business people known as the Goodfellows.

The Goodfellows begin, the first of December in their respective communities, an effort to see that Christmas will be enjoyed by even those who could not possibly have Christmas

otherwise. Through their work, any needy family in the county becomes eligible to receive the benefits of the Goodfellows' contributions.

They solicit useable toys, or new toys; canned food, or other non-perishable foods; money and used clothing. Depository for items contributed is the city hall. All money donations should be mailed to the Goodfellows, c/o City Hall, Muleshoe, Texas 79347.

Last year, 72 families, with an average of six persons per family were taken baskets of food, toys and clothing by the Goodfellows just before Christmas. This represents around 432 people aided by the Goodfellows in this county alone.

Deadline for sending money, food or clothing for the Goodfellows to deliver will be December 18. This will allow the Goodfellows time to purchase additional food items with the money received and prepare baskets for delivery prior to Christmas.

In order to begin processing applicants for aid from the Goodfellows, the coupon asking for names of families will be in each edition of the Journal until December 18. The Goodfellows do not want any individual or family to not be able to share in Christmas.

Grain Sorghum Production Down Says GSPA

Grain sorghum production on the high plains is down from last year. This is in contrast to an earlier pre-harvest report by GSPA that total production in this region would equal 1968. Thus, with total production down and local consumption increasing, producers should consider these factors very seriously before selling.

The area south of Lubbock reports yield reduction up to 50 per cent. Lubbock to Amarillo reports production off up to 30 per cent. The north plains production is off up to 25 per cent. Most farmers indicate yields 1000 to 1500 pounds below 1968. A specific reason for lower yields can not be pinpointed, but rather it is the result of several factors. 

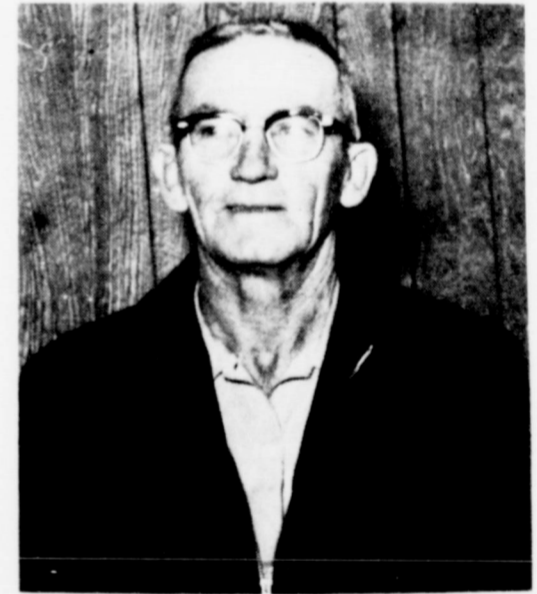

bride; and Miss Susie Redus of Lubbock.

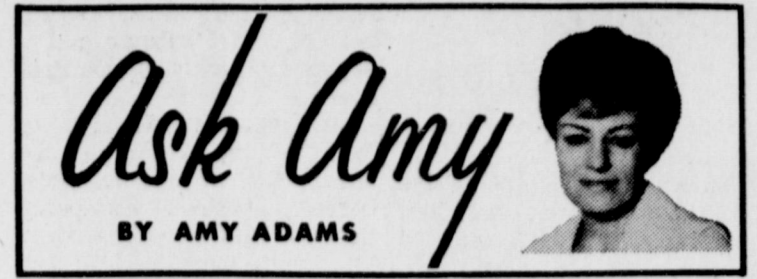

Cotton Program Announced -- Referendum Set

Marketing quotas, farm allotments, price-support loan and payment rates, small farm provisions, and other features of the 1970-crop upland cotton program have been announced by the U.S. Department of Agriculture, according to E.W. Locker, Chairman of the Bailey County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASC) Committee.

This information is being provided cotton producers prior to the mail referendum, December 1-5, on 1970-crop cotton marketing quotas.

If more than one-third of those voting disapprove quotas, the only cotton program would be price-support loans at 50 percent of parity for growers who do not exceed their acreage allotments.

If at least two-thirds of the Nation's upland cotton growers voting approve marketing quotas, the 1970 cotton program would go into effect. Locker said features of this cotton program would be as follows:

Allotments, Quotas and Yield: The national upland cotton allotment for 1970 is 17 million acres plus a 150,000-acre national reserve for establishment of minimum farm allotments. The County allotment is

102,667 acres, up from 96,383 acres in 1969.

The national marketing quota has been set at 16,008,333 bales. Individual farm quotas would be that amount of cotton produced on acreage planted within the allotment.

The national projected yield per acre is 500 pounds. The projected yield for each farm is set by the County ASC Committee and is indicated on the cotton allotment notice sent operators for each cotton farm.

Price-Support Loans and Payments: The national average price-support loan rate for Middling 1-inch cotton at average location has been set at 20.25 cents a pound for the 1970 crop, the same rate as for 1969.

The price-support payment rate has been established at 16.80 cents a pound, compared to 1969's rate of 14.73 cents a pound. The payment would be made to cooperators on acreage planted within the domestic allotment, which is 65 percent of the total farm allotment. The price-support loans would also be available to cooperators in the cotton program.

Small Farm Provisions: Farms with allotments of 10 acres or less or with pro-

jected production (allotment times projected yield) of 3,600 pounds or less could receive a payment of 11.95 cents per pound on the projected yield of 35 percent of the farm allotment in addition to the price-support payment on planted acreage up to the domestic allotment.

National Export Market Acreage: The 1970 export acreage reserve has been set at 62,500 acres. All cotton produced on farms receiving any export acreage reserve would have to be exported. Price-sup-

port loans and program payments would not be available for any of the cotton produced on the farm or on any other farm in which the operator with export market acreage had a substantial or controlling interest. Applications for export acreage must be filed by growers at county ASCS offices before the end of 1969.

Skip-Row Rules: The skip-row rules which were in effect for the 1969 crop would be applicable to the 1970 crop. In general, only the land actually planted to cotton would be

counted as cotton land in determining compliance with program provisions.

Lease and Sale of Allotments: Final date for filing applications for transfer of cotton allotments is December 31, 1969. Producers in 381 cotton-producing counties have approved for 1970 the transfer of allotments to farms outside the county. Allotments cannot be transferred from one State to another.

No Acreage Diversion Provisions: No payments would be offered in 1970 for diverting acreage from cotton, since the

carryover of upland cotton is expected to fall to the lowest level since 1953.

STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights
by Vern Sanford
TEXAS PRESS ASSOCIATION

AUSTIN, Tex.--A "State of emergency" exists for reducing Texas' traffic toll, Gov. Preston Smith warned in addressing some 700 safety-minded persons who answered his call to attend a public support conference to discuss the problem and how to solve it.

Result is a new statewide safety campaign. It got underway immediately and is focusing efforts on the holiday periods--Thanksgiving, Christmas and New Years. These are the times when accident frequency is unusually high.

Smith reminded the conference of community leaders that 10 Texans a day die in automobile accidents. Figures provided by the Texas Safety Association reveal that last month alone the loss--dollar-wise--amounted to \$77 million. Crashes in Texas' urban areas account for \$50 million of this figure.

Causes? Higher speed limits, abolishing the old merit-rating insurance plan which called for higher premiums on bad-risk drivers and a 1965 law which allows judges to probate misdemeanor sentences including traffic offenses were blamed for the climbing death rate.

Whatever the cause, 3,481 died last year, 217,000 were hurt and \$875 million in economic losses chalked up. Department of Public Safety statistics indicate 3,700 will die this year unless holiday safety campaigns are a remarkable success.

"The grim reality," said Smith, "is that one out of every seven motor vehicles registered in Texas was involved in an accident in 1968. The certainty of 10 Texans losing their lives on the highways of our state each and every day is more than tragic. It constitutes a crisis--a crisis that, in my mind, is a state of emergency."

OIL ALLOWABLE ROCKETED--State oil production allowable zooms to a near record 62.7 per cent of potential for December under a Railroad Commission order.

December figure is highest set under present formulas except for last June's 63.5 per cent. It will authorize a maximum 3,770,319-barrel daily production. This is 472,051 more than November which was limited to 52.7 per cent allowable. Estimated daily production during December is expected to average out at 3,194,476.

Five of 14 major crude oil purchasers asked for an allowable increase. Eight asked retention of the November level, and only one sought a reduction.

EDUCATION'S INVESTMENTS--Moving more heavily into equities instead of debt investments, the Texas State Board of Education has decided to put 60 per cent of its income into corporation stocks. It may increase that to 70 per cent if it finds bargains in the stock market in November and December.

Board took this action after two vice presidents of the Chase Manhattan Bank, the board's fiscal advisors, suggested heavier investments in common stocks. Voters of Texas have removed the constitutional limit that the fund's money must go 50 per cent into municipal and government bonds.

Board of Education buys from \$4 million to \$5 million worth of securities a month. It put the \$4.1 million it got from cash bonuses on oil and gas leases on November 4 mainly into U.S. treasury bills. This was timed so as to fill in the gaps in the year ahead and hold average buying to about \$4 million.

COURTS SPEAK--State Supreme Court in a major will contest held that 22-year-old Army Sgt. Albert Buckman Wharton III is sole heir to the \$45 million oil-ranching estate of Electra Waggoner (for whom the town of Electra was named). High Court set arguments for December 17 in a case which

will determine if private clubs in dry areas can hire agents to buy liquor for "locker system" pools. Four months ago the Third Court of Civil Appeals holding against the State Liquor Control Board, said such a procedure is legal.

Sixteen-year-sentence of a 17-year-old Dallas youth for possession of marijuana was reversed by the Court of Criminal Appeals on grounds that there was no evidence the boy was ever in the room where burned marijuana was found.

San Antonio discount stores have filed a motion for reconsideration of a split Supreme Court decision on upholding Saturday-Sunday closing law's constitutionality.

ATTORNEY GENERAL SPEAKS--A Court order stating that a person with a suspended driver's license can drive under certain conditions with an "occupational license" must set out the actual hours of the day that driving is permitted, says Att. Gen. Crawford Martin.

Martin altered an earlier opinion to reflect that those seeking "occupational licenses" need only a court order and proof of insurance (or its equivalent) under the Texas' Safety Responsibility Law.

The Attorney General is warning Texans to be on the lookout for lottery punchboards currently being mailed into the state. Letters accompanying the boards attempt to induce people to sell chances on the punchboards to win merchandise. Martin pointed out that selling chances on the punchboards is a violation of the state lottery law.

AUTO INSPECTIONS DOWN Auto inspections are 30 per cent behind the number last year, according to Col. Wilson E. Speir, director of Texas Department of Public Safety. Unless things pick up, forecasts Speir, car owners are going to be waiting in some mighty long lines at garages and service stations around the April 15 deadline.

During the state fiscal year which ended August 31, 6.3 million vehicles were inspected. Since September 1, only 538,000 have gone through the required check. All inspection stickers issued after September 1 will expire 12 months from date of issue. All new stickers must be displayed before April 15, however. Stickers this year will go on driver's side of windshield.

VALLEY VISTAS YANKED James W. Griffith, new Southwest Regional Office of Economic Opportunity boss, announced withdrawal and reassignment of 15 VISTA anti-poverty workers in Cameron and Willacy counties.

Griffith charged that Volunteers in Service to America were made "scapegoats of local political disputes" and subjected to "harassment, uncertainty and threats." He said the VISTA group in the two counties were responsible people and there was no evidence of improper action on their part. Griffith lashed Cameron County commissioners for again requesting the governor to remove them after a 90-day truce period has been agreed on for re-assessing VISTA work. There is, Griffith concluded, a shortage of such workers, and they will be sent where they are needed and wanted.

APPOINTMENTS ANNOUNCED-- Gov. Preston Smith named the members of the new Texas State Board of Examiners of Psychologists, then changed his mind about qualifications of three of the six, pending a more specific definition of "accredited" Colleges--a requirement of appointments.

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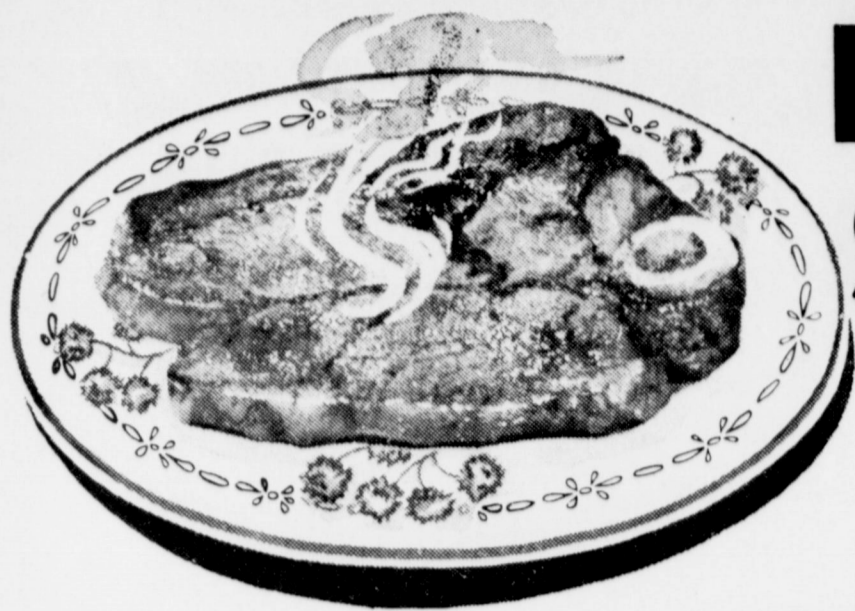
