feet back and make the streets around the Court House twelve feet wider than the other streets. By doing this, when the time comes to pave the streets the present curb and gutter will be permanent, and will not have to be reconstructed. Should the curb have been located at any other place, it would have to be removed when the city paved the streets.

"It has been suggested by some that had the curb been set twelve feet back in the Court House property that the city would never have authority over that strip. This is a mistaken proposition of law, for the city is given by its police powers as much authority on the Court House yard for the purpose of abating a nuisance as anywhere else in Plainview.

"We are very sorry that the wrong impression has gone forth to the citizens of Hale County, and we wish to assure each and all of these additional improvements and conveniences for the people, and in addition thereto the city has purchased a Market Square, located near the public square, where those who care to trade and feed may leave their produce wagons with comfort and safety.




