They are to furnish hot-air-blast furnace fan or ventilating system for \$3,985.

The contract for plumbing and electric lighting system will be let within the next few days.

The Acme Brick Company, of Fort Worth, are to furnish from their Denton kilns brick for the building. Dark brick for the base, with grey brick for the superstructure and white for trimming was selected.

The contract specifies that the building is to be ready for occupancy within one hundred eighty working days after the contractor has been authorized by the board to begin work. The board expects to receive the building from the contractor about January first.



But the opening of the Wichita market by special stock trains is a distinct service to the stock industry, and is appreciated.

It is a competitive matter with the Santa Fe, however. Their service to stockmen means money to the Atchison lines, for it makes a longer haul for the Santa Fe, which turns its shipments to Fort Worth to the Texas and Pacific.

Why can't the Santa Fe be as good to its passenger patrons as it is to its freight shippers? It is generally understood that the Santa Fe is the road with the biggest "conscience." Their policy in the recent Ardmore tragedy in settling claims following the explosion there, has been the cause of much comment on Santa Fe policy. But with no competition and no increase in business in sight, they are content to serve the Panhandle and Santa Fe with trains carrying mail one way each day, when it is commonly known that this is one of the best-paying railroad properties in the Southwest. The South Plains people deserve better treatment than this. The business on passenger trains is enough to justify trains twice daily each way. Persistent rumors have been afloat for several months that the service would be inaugurated. It is nothing more than is just and a deserving recognition of the splendid business the South Plains people are giving the Santa Fe.



Often, however, a feed is placed on the market with a guaranteed analysis, but which sells at a price far in excess of its actual value. The price of a food is usually in proportion to the protein it contains, and its feeding value depends not on the amount of these nutrients present, as shown by chemical analysis, but by the percentage of these nutrients that can be digested by the animal.


