

#### PREPARING FOR ALFALFA.

This is the proper time to prepare and to sow in alfalfa next spring. Much will depend upon the time and manner of preparation. Unless the soil is properly prepared one need have little hopes of a good stand or satisfactory growth.

It is a fact doubtless that many failures could be traced to poor preparation of the seedbed. While the failure may not be easily attraibuted to inadequate preparation at first, if the facts were known it could be generally traced to this as the fundamental

The general recommendation, "deep breaking" for alfalfa, should be modified to say "deep breaking provided it is done early enough." To break deep and plant soon, that is, before the vegetation is decayed and the mulch settles, would hardly come under good preparation. The land should be plowed deep if this is done early.

Land that is not in a growing crop should be prepared at once. If the crop can be removed soon it may be prepared in time. But it will be a very difficult matter to get corn or

In recent years someo f the finest playfor moving pictures, a fact that permits the humble citizen to get within the marble palaces of amusement that adorn most South-American capitals. The business, too, has made its way to the smaller town, and even to the hamlet, where the amusement appears to be just as popular as in the great cities, and often forms the only source of diversion. Prices of admission are generally considerably higher than in this country.
