Comparative Cost This Year of Bran and Polish Makes it More Profitable Than Kaffir or Maize.

Since 1900 D. F. Sansom & Son have scarce and high. Cattle, hogs, sheep compared with grain, to be fed, but with the high price of grain its use is economical.

A. Van Howeling is feeding rice bran in conjunction with grain to his hogs. He has had them on a ration of this kind for the past thirty or forty days, and finds it satisfactory.

Three years ago M. H. Near, who lives six miles south of Plainview, fed rice bran and polish with success, and is trying the feed again this year. He uses a mixture of two-thirds bran and one-third polish.

Dye Brothers, eight miles west of Plainview, are feeding rice bran and polish, together with cotton seed meal,

T. B. Snyder, six miles south of Plainview, feeds the two products to hogs and milk cows satisfactorily.

The rice by-products are not expensive. The crop this year has been large, and the price has not fluctutaed Quartette, "Holy Ghost, With Love as much as has that of other products Divine" ...... Reed-Gottschalk used for feed. There have been imported into this county this year about twenty-five cars of rice bran and rice 4. Violin, "Simple Aven" .... Thame polish. The market for the bran is around \$31 per ton, delivered, while the polish, higher in food content, is worth about \$40 per ton, delivered. The bran is retailing at \$1.65 per hundredweight and the polish at \$2.05.
