NEW TRAINS WILL CARRY MAIL ONLY AS EXPRESS.

Will Be Quite an Improvement in Serv ice, Pouches to Gateways Giving Quick Delivery.

Tomorrow David McKnight, chief mail clerk for this division, will be here from El Paso to give instructions as to handling the mail on the new Santa Fe trains. There will be no mail clerks on the new trains, all mail being handled by express in scaled pouches. Plainview will make up for Amarillo, Snyder and Sweetwater, the delivery to intermediate points being made by returning trains.

As is the Post Office Department's rule, all mail in the office within a half hour of the scheduled train time will be made up.

The new fixtures for the post office, which will be accommodated when the extension is completed, consists of 190 additional lock boxes. For many months the demand for lock boxes has been greater than available boxes, according to Postmaster Ben O. Sanford.

L. L. Wheeler Gets Income of \$18.08 Weekly From Three Grade Holstein Cows, Exclusive of Skim Milk.

Members of the South Plains Dairy Association have their little problems to solve in making their business profitable and pleasant. What business hasn't? The dairy business is no snap -far from it-but it does offer a good way to market farm products profitsued jointly by the Civic League, the ably. It requires skill and extreme carefulness. Those are qualities of any good business man.

The members of the association are pleased with their cows. An interview of practically all members of the association reveals this.

Nearly every member of the association who does not have a silo is preparing to build one this spring or in the early summer.

A meeting of the Association was held Saturday afternoon, in the County Court room. The good condition of the cows of J. G. Seipp, who lives in the Liberty community, north of Plainview, was the cause of comment. The fact that Mr. Seipp feeds ensilage to his cows is attributed as a cause for this. Mr. Seipp uses ripe sorghum for ensilage.

Seeded Ribbon Care a Promising Crop for Sile.

Many farmers will plant seeded ribbon cane for an ensilage crop this year. It is stated that sixty pounds of seed of this variety planted last year yielded 130 tons of ensilage for a Potter County dairyman. C. O. Moser, county agent of Dallas County, is a practical dairyman. He has told members of the local association that the customary yield of ensilage from this crop is twenty tons to the acre. INTERESTING DESCRIPTION OF THE OZARK MOUNTAINS.

The Ozark Mountains are described Springs-Harrison folio, which is numthe mountains owe their ruggedness. The folio is illustrated by a number of

the earth down nearly to sea level shows the wonderful arrangement of the rocks, layer upon layer, which are here and there cut through by stream gorges that expose the alternating beds of limestone, shale or mud rock, and sandstone, and the order in which they wer laid down in the sea, for this area was once covered by a sea-a great Mediterranean or Gulf of Mexico, only shallower-in which were deposited the sediments brought into it from the surrounding highlands by many streams. During the millions of years that this sea existed thousands of feet of sediment accumulated on its bottom, layer upon layer, and in this sediment were inclosed skeletons of the peculiar forms of life that inhabited the sea-corals, crab-like animals, and shellfish of many kinds. The edges of these beds, once soft mud and sand, but now hard rock, are exposed in gorges and hillsides where they can be studied and where the fossils they contain can be

Among the rocks are certain beds of commercial value. Many of the limestones, locally called marble, make excellent building stone, and some of the pure quartz sandstone may be used in making glass. Promising deposits of zinc and lead have beed discovered and mined in this region. The clear, sparkling springs of pure water that issue at Eureka Springs have a wide reputation, and the folio report should be ca special interest to those who visit this

To plan out meals in the interest of family efficiency and economy at the same time, the housewife, fortunately, does not need to do elaborate sums in calories or to have any intimate understanding of such terms as portein and carbohydrates. All she needs to do is to classify the food she uses into five simple household groups laid down in recently issued Farmers' Bulletin 808, published by the Office of Home Economics, U. S. Department of Agriculture. The purpose of the bulletin, which is the first of a series of simple pamphlets dealing with the economical use of foods, is to enable the average housewife to plan her meals effectively, even though she has no special training in chemistry or dietetics.

The substances which the specialists find are needed in the daily diet to maintain the body may be grouped under seven heads: Mineral substances, protein, starches, sugars, fats, cellulose, and certain little-known but very important growth - stimulating substances.

A Day's Food Requirements,

That these essential substances are to provide is shown by the following combinations, which the specialists believe indicate the daily food requirements of normal individuals:

For a Man.

A man who does fairly hard muscular work would be likely to get the food which his body needs if supplied daily with such a combination of foods as the following:

14 pounds of bread (having about the same food value as 1 pound of such cereal preparations as wheat or rye flour, oatmeal, corn meal, rice,

THE WORLD'S GOLD OUTPUT.

The world's geld output a century ago averaged, according to Professor Soetbeer, about \$7,300,000 anually, the son. bulk of which was derived from workings in the Ural Mountains. Such gains were especially marked in the late forties and early fifties of last century, consequent on the discoveries made in California and Australia (Ballarat).

The greatest discovery so far has been that of the Witwatersrand. Prior to the ascertainment of the existence of gold-bearing banket in the Transvaal there had been finds of quartz glass of milk. deposits in other parts of South Afr. ca; also at the Gold Coast. In 1886 the Rand was proclaimed a gold field, production commenced, and by 1899 the corn, cauliflower, or other), 1 pound. output was at the rate of \$97,300,000 a year. For 1916 the production was the record one of \$192,200,000, and at the present time the Rand alone produces 41 per cent of the total gold output of the world, while the whole of Africa contributes 47 per cent.

For many years Victoria was the premier producer of gold of the Australian continent, but it now yields comparatively small amounts. In New Zealand and Queensland finds were reported early in the sixties. In the mid-nineties important discoveries were made in West Australia and other

Until quite recently the output of Canada was nearly all a by-product in connection with copper smelting, averaging up to the mid-nineties only about \$973,000 worth of gold per annum; but late in the nineties the Yukon (Klondyke) field became a fairly important one, and more recently Ontario has begun to show good returns.

Of foreign countries the big producer is the United States, and figures at hand enable one to arrive at an approximate aggregate of some \$3,791,-000,000 as the value of the American output since the first California finds in 1847-48. Later on discoveries were made in other States, more particularly Colorado and Nevada, as well as Alaska and Klondyke.

One company recently advised the bureau that it has clients in the islands who are able to supply large quantities. Many others have given assistance in the development of this source of leather. Skins of various other species of fish are also being tested as possible raw

material for leather production. The bureau has placed skins of 227 sharks and about 50 skins of other fishes, including cod, hake, grouper, garfish, and stringray, in the hands of tanners for experimentation. The tanned skin of one of the large sharks and small samples of others have been received. Several of these look very promising, and indicate that satisfactory tanning processes are being developed. Two firms have advised the bureau that they are in the market for large quantities of fish skins and that they are utilizing these products. Two others recently perfected processes and are preparing to tan fish skins. Companies and fishermen in a position to obtain supplies of the raw materials are being advised as to where they may market them, and have been furnished with information as to methods of skinning, salting, and boxing the


