Sumner of Dallas, Representative James C. Wilson of Fort Worth and Representative Marvin Jones of Amarillo are especially interested in the proposition.

BLANTON DENOUNCES GOMPERS AND HIS BOLSHEVIKI GROUP

Gives Instances of the High-Handed Tactics and Threats to Government of Organized Labor

It is not often that we endorse the position of Congressman Thos. L Blanton of Abilene on anything, but the following statement from him anent the high-handed and threatening tactics of Samuel Gompers and the leaders of organized labor is timely and true. The statement was called out by a message sent to him by Judge J. F. Carl, of San Antonio, recently, asking his support of an appropriation for a continuance of the bureau, which will cease operation July 1, if the appropriation is not made. Where to Pay and File.

Residents of Texas are required to make their returns and pay their taxes to Alexander S. Walker, Collector of Internal Revenue, Austin, Tex., or deputy collectors who are not doing free advisory work on In-

Payments sent by mail should be as tached to the returns and should be in the form of check, money order or draft. Cash payments by mail are seat

at the taxpayer's risk of less. If you are unable to make your turn personally because of illness, sence or incapacity, an agent or legal representative may make your return.

If there are any doubtful points as & your items of income or allowable de ductions, you should get in touch at once with a Revenue officer or a bank er for advice.

Women Pay Tax.

Women are subject to all the require ments of the Income Tax. Whether single or married, a woman's income from all sources must be considered.

If unmarried, or if living apart from her husband, she must make her re turn for 1918 if her net income was \$1,000 or over.

If married and living with her husband, her income must be considered with the husband's in determining the liability for a return. Their joint come, less the credits allowed by law, is subject to normal tax. The wife's net income is considered separately to computing any surtax that may be due Husband and wife file jointly, as a rule. If the husband does not include his wife's income in his return, the

Severe Penalties. The new Revenue Law places severe penalties on a person who falls to make return on time, refuses to make return or renders a fraudulent return. For failure to make return and pay tax on time a fine of not more than \$1,000 is named, and 25 per cent of the tax due is added to the assessment. For refusing wilfully to make return, or for making a false or fraudulent return there is a fine of not exceeding

ceeding one year, or both. Farmers' Income Taxable.

\$10,000 and imprisonment of not ex-

Every farmer and ranchman who had a fair or a good year in 1918 must heed the Income Tax this year. He must consider all his income as taxable. He is entitled to deduct from his gross income all amounts expended in carrying on his farm. The cost of farm machinery, farm buildings and improvements cannot be deducted. The cost of live stock, either for resale or for breeding purposes, is also regarded as investment.

Overtime and Bonuses Taxed. Salary and wage earners must consider as taxable every item received from employeers and from other sources. Bonuses and overtime pay are to be reported, as well as the rege lar payments.

Allowances for Losses.

Losses sustained in 1918 and not covered by insurance are deductible items if incurred in the taxpayer's business or trade, in any transaction undertaken for profit, or arising from fire, storm, shipwreck or other casualty, or from theft.

Washington, D. C. - "The rights of all persons now filing Income Tax returns are amply * protected by provisions for abatements, refunds and ap-* peals," says Commissioner Dan-* tel C. Roper.



MAYBE THE SOLDIER DOESN'T GO TO CHURCH

But These Figures Will Prove Illumito the Bleeptle-Only

If every man, women and child in the state of Tome, plus the entire population of New Orleans, La., were to unite in going to church on one Sunday the mobilimation would still be less then the attendance at religious meetings in the Army Y. M. C. A. buildings in the Southern department from May, 1017, to December 31, 1918. The total attendance at 24,700 such meetings in the "T" buts was 4.523,348. according to figures compiled by the religious work department of the Army

Y. M. C. A. at San Antonio, Tex. At these meetings 74.457 soldiers requested prayers a number greater than the population of Oklahoma City. The number of Christian decisions made by these soldiers was 69,929more than the number of people in El Paso, Tex. Christian purpose renewed by soldiers at such meetings

reached the big total of 66,581. The number of personal Christian interviews which the "Y" secretaries were able to have with the men as they visited the buildings was 318,246, or equal to the combined populations of Dallas, Fort Worth and Houston, Tex. These secretaries also secured from the men a number of other forlowing: To read the Bible, 111,163; to pray, 34,097; temperance, 4,686; antiprofanity, 9,342; personal purity, 19,-

509; antigambling, 6,925. Records from November 1, 1917, to December 31, 1918, show that 1,880 Bible classes were organized with a total enrollment of 43,012 men. These At interesting price, 2 1-2 miles classes held 15,995 sessions and had an attendance of 345,598. It was not until er, L. F. Pinonka, Tahoka, Texas. 85-3 May 1, 1918, that records were made of the number of teachers used at these classes, but from that time to December 31 there were 1,446 soldler teachers and 1,333 civilian teachers engaged in conducting the classes.

Copies of the Scriptures distributed to soldiers reached 539,683, or one each for every person in the states of New Mexico and Armona. Religious to December 31 numbered 569,249
