getting very scarce and high in price.
The distilleries were closed down by
government order Sept. 1, 1917; the
breweries were closed December 1,
1918. Champagne is selling in the
cities at \$25.00 a glass or \$100 a
quart. Ordinary whiskey is selling
at $\$ 20$ a quart; cocktails range in
price from 35c to 85c, and hightalls
run from 45c to a dollar, so the news-
papers say Beer is almost an un-
known article of commerce even in
the wettest states. There are but a
handful of states in which liquor of
any kind can now be sold. July
statuatory nationwide prohibition as
a war measure will become effective,
and next January constitutional pro-
hibition will go into effect. The
coming generations will not know
what a grog shop looks like nor
know the taste of intoxicating liquor.
The annual drink bill of the peopple
of the United States was $\$ 2,000,000,-$
ooo, hence by doing away with the
