Prior to the battle Deaf Smith had destroyed Vince's bridge, and thus cut off any possible retreat for either the Texans or the Mexicans.

It was a life and death fight for the Texans, and the numbers and odds were greatly against them. But they fought like demons, to the battle cries of "Remember the Alamo." "Remember Goliad," and the Mexicans could not stand before them.



He asserted that two hundred and fifty thousand men are now held in the army camps in the United States because Gompers demanded it on the ground that rapid demobilization would unsettle the organized labor schedule, and he would not stand for

There is Bolshevism in this country now and it is showing its fangs against the government, he asserted.

The simple Gospel narratives gave enough of the physical details of the evnt to make it convincing; the fact that the disciples themselves did not expect the resurrection and were slow to believe it until they were forced to believe it by his presence among them; by exhibition of his sacred wounds and the fact that it became the burden of their preaching in the future all go to make up the indisputable collateral evidence of the literal fact. Every one of the disciples is said to have died a martyr and his resurrectionn was their "testimony to martyrdom."-H. Lee Mills in Houston Post.
