

PRESIDENT WILSON RETURNS FROM PEACE CONFERENCE

LAYS TREATY AND COVENANT BEFORE SENATE, AND UR-GES RATIFICATION

President Wilson arrived in New York city Tuesday, from attending the peace conference in Paris. He was given a tremendous ovation when he arrived at Hoboken, by hundreds of thousands of people. He made a speech telling of some of his work abroad and making a plea for the League of Nations.

He and Mrs. Wilson were also given a great reception when they arrived in Washington Tuesday night, several hundred thousand people lining the streets from the station to the





COST OF WAR TO AMERICA THIRTY BILLION DOLLARS

Washington, July 9,-The warcost to the United States was \$30,-177,000,000 up to June 30, 1919.

Secretary Glass made this estimate today in submitting to the congressional appropriations committee the preliminary statements of the treasury on the condition of the nation's finances. He arrived at the estimate by subtracting the average peace time expenses for the same length of time, at the rate of \$1,000,-000,000 annually from the total expenditures; \$32,427,000,000 during the war.

Taxes and other revenues than borrowed money took care of \$9,384,-000,000 or about 9 per cent of the war cost. The remainder came from Liberty bond and victory note issues and saving stamps.





Aerial Mail Service

The success of the air mail route between New York and Chicago is assured. The planes carrying mail fly at the average speed of 120 miles an hour, taking mail from New York to Chicago in six hours. Planes are changed at Belfront, Penn., and Cleveland, Ohio.

About 1,200 letters a day are taken for Pacific coast points and through air service from New York to Chicago advances delivery of mail for Seattle, San Francisco and other coast cities twenty-four hours over other letters sent from New York by mail.

Most of the planes used are remodeled De Haviland fours with Liberty motors, having a capacity of 400 pounds of mail.

According to the postoffice department the time made by the air mail cuts down the time made by the fastest railway mail between New York and Chicago more than thirteen hours.


