Altogether it has plowed 1,000 acres of land, double disced 1,125 and cut 482 acres of wheat. It has used on an average 20 gallons of kerosene and 21/2 gallons of hibritating on in every ten-hour day. The repairs have cost \$185.75.

This engine, together with two other Titans and one 8-16, is now double-discing 400 acres of land on the Pioneer farm, 2 miles east and one mile south of Plainview. We would be glad to have you look this engine over, see what parts are worn, condition it is in and kind of work it is still doing.


