

PLAINVIEW NURSERY

(By R. Kenneth Evans)

A few years ago this part of Texas was a section of a vast unbroken prairie. Not a tree was to be seen except in the valleys and the lowlands where wild scrubby trees would spring up and these were exceptionally scarce. Today there are shade trees ,fruit trees and trees of every description. They have been planted by those who were anxious to give the appearance of eivilization to this country and the effect has changed the appearance of the country materially.

An institution ,which is the largest of its kind in the Plains country, which has played a very important part in this change of the face of mother earth in the great Southwest is the Plainview Nursery, from which practically all of the trees and shrubs have been secured. This institution was established in Hale county eighteen years ago, before there was a tree of any kind here, by L. N. Dalmont, who has worked diligently, partly from a financial standpoint and partly from the standpoint of assisting in the development of this section, to .develop the resources of this section. When Mr. Dalmont established the Plainview Nursery here it was after a realization that soil analysis showed the soil of this section adapted to the growing and production of fruit. He began growing fruit trees and since that time has devoted all his time and attention to the establishment of a nursery, experimenting with grafting methods until today he has a wider variety of nursery products and a better class than can be found anywhere in the Plains country and in few places in the entire state of Texas.

Personally, Mr. Dalmont has worked diligently for the devolpment of the resources of the Plains country. He has lived here and watched the country from from the time long before these was a railroad here and when the Long Horn reigned supreme over the unfenced prairies. In those days he had visions of trees and fruit orchards. He worked to that end with the result that many of the orchards and the shade trees which grace this section of the Plains country today had their start in his nursery.

The Plainview Nursery is located two miles north of Plainview, and fruits, ornamental plants, shade trees, grapes, berries, black locust, honey locust, ash, box elders, maples, sycamore, mulberries, hackberries, tamarax and several varieties of catalpa and red bud and others are grown for transplanting purposes. Many acres are under cultivation from a nursery standpoint by Mr. Dalmont and it is certainly worth the time of anyone to visit his nursery and see with what care and consideration he raises these plants so that they are healthy and will grow profusely upon transplanting. These varieites are guaranteed by Mr. Daimont to be strong on survive conditions in this section and to grow and develop rapidly. He has studied every condition pertaining to the successful growing of all kinds of trees and knows the varieties that should be selected for the various kinds of soils.

In the fruits he grows apples, plums, peaches, cherries, apricots, quince, pears and various vari eties of these classes of fruits. In the berries he handles strawberries, dewberries, blackberries, gooseberries, currants and other varieties. These bushes and plants are all strong and healthy this being the only kinds of plants that are ever sent out from the Plainview Nursery. The fruit and berry plants produce the very best kind of fruits and this class of fruits grown on Plainview Nursery plants brings the highest top market prices. Last year Mr. Dalmont had the misfortune to have a portion of his plant destroyed by fire, but he has builded it up bigger and better than ever and this institution is really a credit to the city and Plains country. He takes delight in explaining to anyone how they can produce fruit and shade trees in the Plains country and the proper care that should be given these trees and he knows for he has had eighteen years' experimentation with these plants in the Plains country. NOTE-Since the above article was written by Mr. Evans, several weeks ago, Mr. Dalmont has sold the Plainview Nursery to Mr. D. C. Aylesworth of Plainview, who has had many years experience in the nursery, plant growing and gardening business-and he is determined to maintain the high standards set by Mr. Dalmont. 
