ONCE AGAIN THE residents of the Panhandle have been made to wonder why we even bother with a criminal justice system.

A week earlier, Governor Ann Richards, in response to a reporter's question, stated that as governor, she "would not second guess a Potter County jury," and had no plans to block the scheduled execution of Johnny Frank Garrett, convicted Nun rapist/murderer.

But just prior to midnight on Tuesday, Gov. Richards did what no Texas governor had done in 25 years, reportedly yielding to a request from Pope John Paul II, to grant murderer Garrett yet another stay of execution, at the continued expense to Texas taxpayers.

We realize that the redistricting attempts by our state legislature have been ultra-political in nature, but we would have sworn there was no way that you could ever draw the map where Pope John Paul could ever have a vote or a say-so as to our criminal justice system in the state of Texas.

A caller to a radio talk show this week posed the question: "Does the Catholic church plan to pay the expenses for Johnny Frank Garrett for the rest of his life?" Of course, you know the answer to that one.

We had the thought—maybe the Pope has done some investigating and thinks Johnny Frank Garrett is good material for the priesthood. Actually, we would have pictured him more in line of a Trappist Monk, but who knows.

Garrett may have limited mental capacities, but he was quite aware of the fact that his crime against the church would be particularly heinous if it were committed on Halloween night. That fact, alone, proves that the murder was premeditated by someone who knew exactly what he was doing.

The reason the death penalty is no longer a big deterrent to murder is because it is so seldom carried out, and never swiftly. If swift justice were carried out, it would serve as an example to the rest of the hoodlums and would-be killers on the streets.

Plus, we need to have a limit to the number of criminal appeals which can be made. Every time an appeal is made it costs taxpayers big bucks.

Is it any wonder that people hate to take time off from their jobs to serve on jury duty? When a jury spends weeks of their time, deciding cases like these, only to have their verdicts overturned by appeals judges, time and time again.

Potter County District Attorney Danny Hill stated this week that if Garrett's sentence is commuted to life, when you count the 10-plus years that we've already kept this unfeeling animal alive, he would be eligible for parole in approximately 18 months. "And I guarantee you that he would kill again," Hill says.

How is it that Governor Richards knows more about the Garrett case than all of the investigators, lawmen, prosecutors and jurors in Amarillo?

Are we going to have to revert to vigilante law, if we are ever to truly take care of our criminals? We were under the impression that our modern criminal law system should take the place of vigilantes, but based on the recent track record of our governor and some federal judges, it makes you wonder: "Where is a good old fashioned lynch mob when you really need it?"

He may have lacked party manners, but we seriously doubt that Clayton Williams would have granted Garrett's stay of execution. Darn it, Clayton, why didn't you go on a six-month cruise before that gubernatorial election! And some of us who thought we needed to ease up and give the woman a chance are realizing what we did.

Check your voter list, Ann. I don't think you'll find the name Pope John Paul II on any of them.

Special Election Is Focusing On Bingo In Friona

Absentee voting is underway at the Friona City Hall on the special election January 18 to legalize bingo for charitable purposes.

Friona VFW spearheaded the drive for the special election, and plans to use the proceeds from the bingo for its regular charitable activities.

Last day to vote absentee will be Tuesday, January 14.

The election will be held on Saturday, January 18, and the polling place will be at the Friona Fire Station. Only residents of the city of Friona, who are eligible to vote in city elections, will be able to cast ballots in the election.

The election is being called in order to legalize bingo for charitable purposes, as authorized by the Bingo Enabling Act.

A spokesman for the VFW said that it was planned to instigate a weekly bingo session, and the organization hoped that the bingo would provide local residents with an opportunity for some local entertainment, in addition to helping fund the VFW projects.

Mammography Clinic Slated For Friona

The Don and Sybil Harrington Cancer Center and High Plains Baptist Hospital of Amarillo Breast Cancer Screening Program will offer a screening clinic in Friona on Tuesday and Wednesday, February 18 and 19, 1992, from 10:00 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. at the Parmr County Hospital.

Exams are done by appointment only. For information about the clinic or to make an appointment, interested parties are asked to call the Harrington Cancer Center at (806) 359-4673, or the toll-free number 1-800-274-HOPE. For more information locally, call Elda Hart at 247-2754.

Early detection of breast cancer is the major goal of cancer control for each woman seen in the clinic. The clinic provides low cost screening which includes a breast exam by a Registered Nurse trained in breast cancer detection, teaching of breast self-examination, and a mammogram.

Women between ages 35 to 40 are recommended to have one baseline mammogram during those years. Women ages 40 to 50 are recommended to have a mammogram every one to two years. Women over 50 should receive mammograms yearly.

CONSTRUCTION SET

U.S. Hwy 60 Second Stage Ready To Roll

Contract has been awarded for the second stage of the widening of U.S. Highway 60, from State Highway 214 (North) in Friona to the east city limits of Bovina.

The contract, in the amount of \$10,795,844.15, was awarded to Amarillo Road Co. A preconstruction conference was held at the City Hall in Friona on Thursday, January 9 to announce plans for the project.

The project will call for the widening of Highway 60 from two to four lanes from Friona to Bovina. It also states that the two new lanes (westbound, or north lanes) will be constructed first.

Then, when traffic is routed onto the two new lanes, the old lanes will be torn up and re-built.

The specifications also calls for the widening of bridges across Frio Draw on the western outskirts of Friona, and Catfish Draw, just east of Bovina.

The contract calls for 520 working days on the project, or 29 months, based on 18 working days per month.

Charles Schmidt, spokesman for Amarillo Road Co., said it was his company's hopes and intentions to finish the project by December 1 1993. That would roughly mean a year for construction of the two new lanes, and another year for reconstructing the present two lanes of the road.

"We don't have any other project going at the present time, and we intend to get onto this one as quickly as possible. We could be doing some work clearing the right of way as early as next week," Schmidt said.

Schmidt said it was planned to start laying asphalt by June 1. Under the contract specifications, no asphalt may be laid from October 1 through April 30 of a calendar year.

The construction official also indicated that a hot-mix plant would be set up in the Catfish Draw area near Bovina to provide materials for the Bovina-Friona roadway.

Rhea Bradley, resident engineer with the Texas Department of Highways and Transportation, conducted Thursday's meeting.

"The purpose of this meeting is to secure close cooperation between the contractor, law enforcement agencies and the Texas Department of Transportation personnel in promoting traffic safety on the construction project," Bradley said.

The longtime engineer said that a major problem in the current phase of the project will be widening the roadway in the western portion of Friona, where there are businesses located along the curving highway.

"We know there will be some inconveniences involved, but it is our intentions to keep this to a minimum," he said.

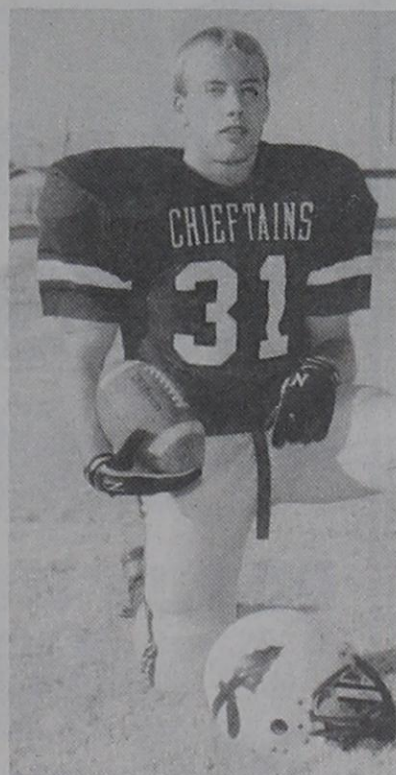
The federal government provides 75 per cent of the money for the U.S. 60 project, with the state paying the other 25 per cent. Parmer County paid for 10 per cent of the right-of-way costs, which amounted to about \$100,000 on the county's part.

Widening of U.S. Highway 60 through Parmer County has been a project at the top of local leaders' list for years, and Bradley said he had been working on the situation off and on ever since he assumed his present position with the Highway Department in 1949.

Among those attending Tuesday's meeting were members of the Friona City Council and Mayor Clarence Monroe. County Judge Bonnie Clayton was otherwise engaged and sent her regrets. Also attending were representatives of the contractor, highway department, the Department of Public Safety, county sheriff and Friona's Police Chief.



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HPUWCD To Elect District Directors

Early voting for Parmer County Committee members and District Director of Precinct Three of the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 began Monday, December 20, 1991 and continues through Tuesday, January 14, 1992. The election will be held on Saturday, January 18, 1992.

Parmer County voters may cast early ballots during regular business hours at City Hall in Bovina. The election clerk is Pat Kunselman.

A.W. "Webb" Gober of Farwell is the incumbent Precinct Three Director seeking re-election to a four-year term. District Director's Precinct Three consists of Parmer County and the portions of Bailey and Castro Counties within the Water District boundaries.

The five-member Board of Directors meet monthly to consider Water District business. They oversee all Water District activities, including legal, financial, and business matters. Water District Board

members also do long-range planning for the District and direct staff activities through the District's general manager.

The County Committee is made up of one member elected at-large and one member elected from each of the County Commissioner's Precincts in Parmer County.

The candidate for County Committee member at large is Carroll R. Cook of Friona. County Committee candidates from the Parmer County Commissioner's Precincts are: Alan Monroe of Friona, Precinct One; Dale E. Gober of Bovina, Precinct Two; Vick Christian of Farwell, Precinct Three; and Robert Gallman of Friona, Precinct Four.

County Committees meet on a regular basis to recommend approval or denial of applications for water well permits to the District's Board of Directors. County Committees also serve as a liaison between the voters and the Water District Board of Directors.



The Farmstead Windbreak

When planning a farmstead windbreak, it is important to choose the proper tree species for the Panhandle.

The tree species should be cold tolerant. Some species are adapted to the Panhandle, while others are better suited to the warmer climates south of the Panhandle.

The species should be drought tolerant. Species native to arid regions perform better in West Texas. In order to perform well, species should also be resistant to insect and disease problems.

Species compatibility is also important. Some species are fast growing, while others are very slow

growing. The mature height of the trees should be considered. The mature height of different species can vary greatly.

The tree species can be a mixture of conifers, deciduous and shrub species. A mixture of different types provide year round protection and greater aesthetic values.

The aesthetic value of the windbreak can be enhanced by selecting species with a combination of colorful blooms, fruit or leaves.

Trees can be selected for wildlife benefits. Many tree species can provide both food and cover for many wildlife species.

If snow control is needed the species selected should provide density during the winter months.

With proper planning and species selection the farmstead windbreak will give good wind control, enhance the beauty of the farm and provide good wildlife habitat.

Windbreak trees are available from the Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District. Trees are selling fast, so be sure to order soon to insure the availability of your desired species.

Programs and services of the Soil Conservation Service are offered on a nondiscriminatory basis without regard for race, color, national origin, age, sex, religion, marital status or handicap.

Cattle Women Set Texas Beef Cookoff

Changes in consumer lifestyles have generated changes in the 1992 Texas Beef Cook-Off -- including more opportunities to win more prize money than ever before.

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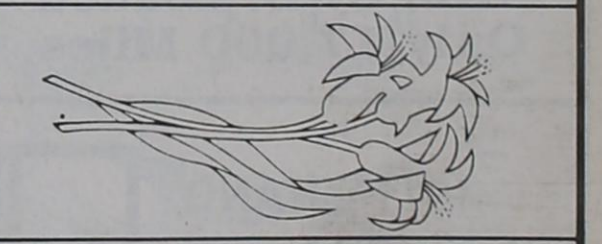
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L. Venhaus Rites Held At Nazareth

The family suggests memorials to the American Cancer Society.



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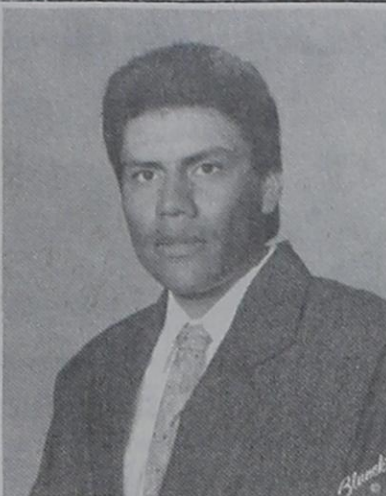

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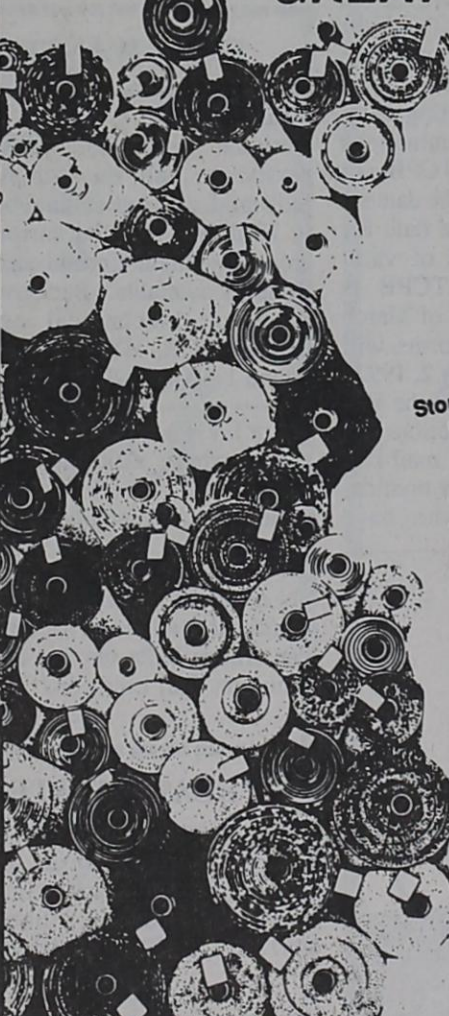

Texas Corn Producers Board Voting Region Two

The Texas Corn Producers Board (TCPB) will conduct elections in four of its eight voting regions for the purpose of electing six new TCPB board members whose current members' seats have expired or where expanded production of corn has created new seats in different voting regions of the state. There are a total of fifteen TCPB voting board members. These elections, to be conducted in 147 Texas counties, are being held pursuant to the Texas Commodity Referendum Law, Title 3, Chapter 41, Subchapter A, Section 41.032. Voting Region Two consists of the counties of Bailey, Oldham, Deaf Smith, Hartley and Parmer, and there is One Seat open for election of TCPB board members in Voting Region Two.

In 1990, Texas Corn producers voted to expand the research and promotion program for corn, funded by a uniform corn checkoff, collected on a refund basis, to every county in the State of Texas. This election is the biennial election required by the Texas Commodity Referendum Law.

A person is eligible to vote in the board election if he or she is, or for at least one production period during the three years preceding the date of the board election has been, a producer of, or caused to be produced, corn for commercial purposes. This includes owners of farms and their tenants or sharecroppers, if the person would be required to pay the assessment. For a producer to vote in this voting region and for these TCPB seats, such producer must reside within the counties stated above. Only voters residing within the above counties may vote for candidate(s) representing this voting region.

Any eligible voter-producer as defined above may place his or her name in nomination to serve as a director on the TCPB. Nomination applications must be submitted to the TCPB signed by the applicant and ten other eligible voters. Nomination forms will be available in all 147 county agent offices for counties where elections are to be held this year, including the specific counties within this voting region, as listed above. Nomination forms can also be obtained by writing the TCPB, 218 E. Bedford, Dimmitt, Texas 79027. Please state your county of residence if you request nomination forms in writing from the TCPB office. All nominations must be filed with the TCPB not later than 30 days before the date set for the elections, and the date for the deadline for receipt of valid nomination forms by TCPB is therefore a postmark date of March 2, 1992. Nomination forms will be available after February 2, 1992.

The election in each of the four voting regions where elections are called for will be held by mail ballot. Ballots containing the nominations of all persons who have

validly filed petitions under Section 41.025 of the above stated code will be available after March 11, 1992, at either elevators or other points of check-off collection in each of the appropriate voting regions, at county agent offices in each of the 147 counties where elections are to occur, or by writing the TCPB at the address stated above. For a ballot to be counted, such ballot must be postmarked no later than April 10, 1992. There are four voting regions conducting elections in 1992. A voter must reside within a county contained within the voting region that the voter is casting his or her vote, and a voter must meet the definition set forth above as to a qualified voter. Voters may also vote for board members by "writing in" the name of any eligible person.

Pursuant to Section 41.023 of the Texas Commodity Referendum Law, this notice for a TCPB election within this voting region is being published in all appropriate newspapers within the voting region, such notice being published at least once a week for the three consecutive weeks beginning at least 60 days before the date of the election.

The Texas Corn Producers Board is certified under section 41.011 and section 41.012 of the Texas Commodity Referendum Law to conduct this election, and has obtained all approvals and determinations required by law from the Commissioner of Agriculture, Texas Department of Agriculture. 14-3tc

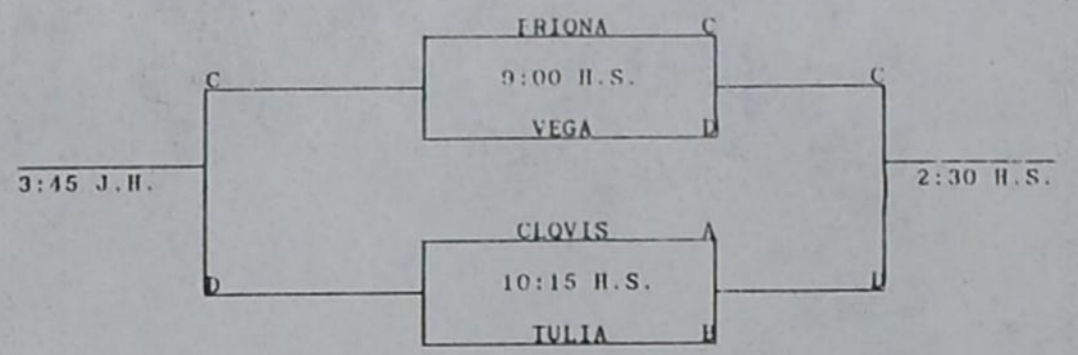
The two teams were tied at halftime, 31-all, but the Buffaloes outscored Friona 34-26 in the second half.

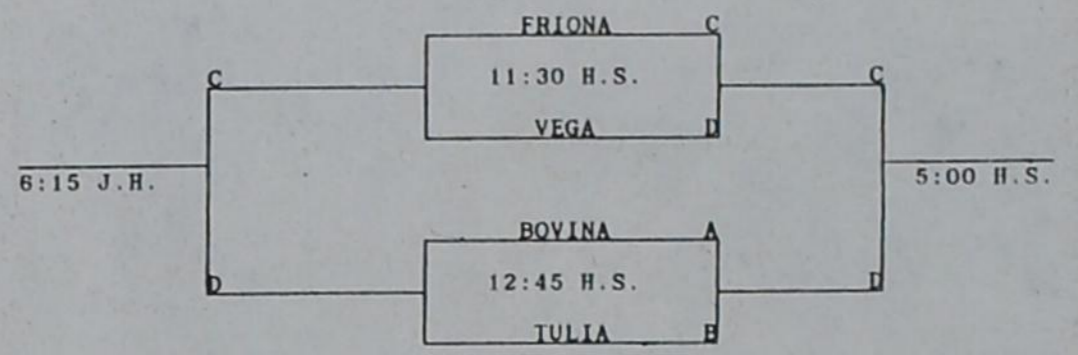

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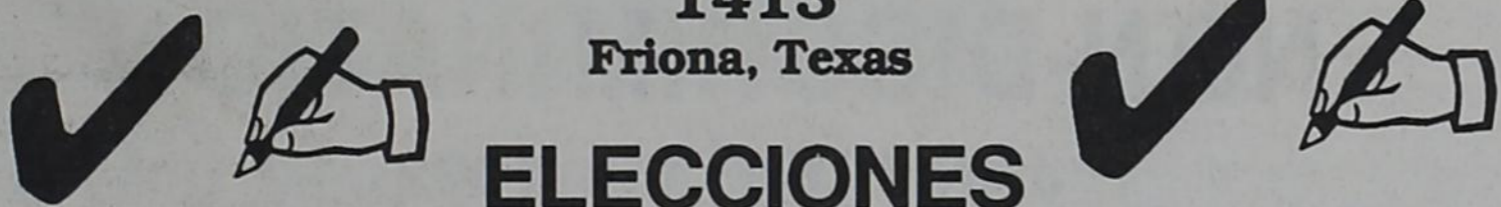

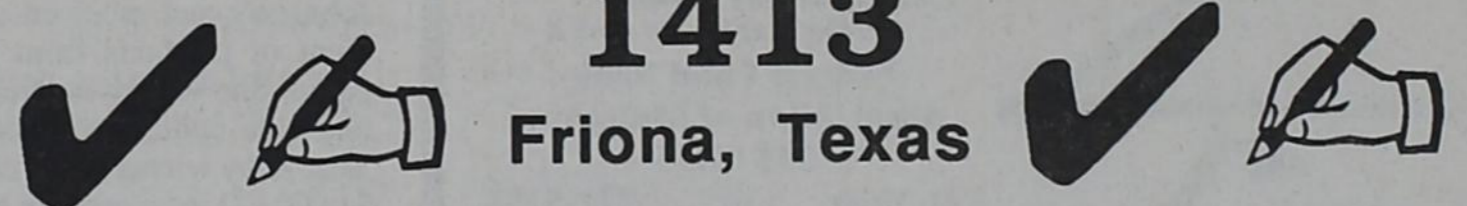

Public Securities Protection Up To The SEC

The Securities Act of 1933 was the first law enacted by Congress to regulate the securities market. It outlined the registration of securities prior to sale, disclosure of financial data in a registration or securities prior to sale, disclosure of financial data in a registration of securities prior to sale, disclosure of financial data in a prospectus, anti-fraud provisions and more.

In 1940, the Investment Company Act required registration and regulation of investment companies by the Securities and Exchange Commission (SEC). The 1940 act further set the standards by which mutual funds operate in the areas of promotion, reporting to shareholders, pricing of securities, sale to the public and allocation of investments within their portfolios.

These two acts are still the most important pieces of securities legislation protecting the public. However, the pooled investment funds of tax-qualified pension plans at banks and insurance companies are exempt from regulation under

the Securities Act of 1933 and the Investment Company Act of 1940.

John Collins, a spokesman for the Investment Company Institute (ICI), says the exemption was justified because at that time, banks and insurance companies handled pension funds for more professional, sophisticated investors representing major corporations and pension plans.

Today, though, banks and insurance companies have taken an increasingly active role in directing investments for small employers through the use of defined contribution plans and 401-K plans. These employers, for the most part, are not professional investors. Like the general public, they need the protection of the Securities Act of 1933 and the Investment Company Act of 1940.

The banking and insurance industries oppose lifting the exemptions they currently enjoy. They argue that the pooled investment accounts are adequately covered by state and federal regulations.

This issue has yet to be resolved, but it will be interesting to see how it unfolds.
