CONGRATULATIONS ARE in order to the Texas Tech Lady Raiders, who have won their first-ever Southwest Conference basketball championship. The Lady Raiders won the regular-season title, then capped that off by winning the SWC post-season tournament last weekend.

The University of Texas had won the women's SWC championship the first eight years that competition was held. The University of Arkansas, in its last year of membership, won the title in 1991, and Texas Tech took it this year.

In some respects, particularly now that Arkansas has "defected" from the SWC, winning the conference title is much akin to a high school team that wins state. In that regard, it is surprising that Texas Tech, located in the hotbed of girls basketball in the state, had not won the title earlier. We predict that this will not be the Tech's last hurrah, either.

Scanning the roster of the 1991-92 Lady Raiders' team gives you a hint of how the South Plains aggregation built their championship team, and brings back memories of how the Raider men used to field equally as competitive teams.

Starting at the coaching position: Marsha Sharp, in her tenth year as head coach of the Texas Tech women's team, is a native of Tulsa. She is a former star for the Lady Hornets, and you're probably aware that Tulsa, home of the 1991 class 3A state champions, has for generations gone in for top-notch girls' basketball.

The star of the 1991-92 Lady Raiders has been Sheryl Swoopes, a six-foot guard from Brownfield. Friona basketball fans should remember Sheryl as the main cog in the Brownfield team that downed their Squaws in the area round in 1987, after they had won bi-district. Miss Swoopes led the Lady Raiders in scoring with 21.3 points per game, in rebounds with 8.8 per game, and had 130 assists. Sheryl started out at the University of Texas, but after three days was lost and homesick on the giant UT campus, and came back home to the South Plains. Texas Tech is very happy about that home-sickness.

When Friona faced off against Miss Swoopes at Brownfield, the Squaws were led by the likes of Ronda Ratcliff and Lacye Osborn. Miss Ratcliff went on to a scholarship and a career at Southwest Texas University.

That was also the year that Bovina's starters included Mindy Neal and Marie Pesch, both of whom gained scholarships to Southwest Conference teams. There was some pretty salty talent in girls basketball in Friona-Bovina for those years.

Back to the Tech roster: Starter Krista Kirkland hails from Spearman, another hotbed of outstanding girls basketball. Miss Kirkland scored 64 three-point baskets for the Lady Raiders.

Noel Johnson, a freshman, is Tech's number one backup point-guard. She is from Nazareth. You've heard of Nazareth, probably? They won something like seven or eight straight state titles. If they don't make it to Austin they feel like they've had a bad year.

Junior Tami Wilson, the team's second-leading scorer at 11.7 and 7.2 rebounds, is from Seagraves. Kim Pruitt, a sophomore forward reserve, is from Idalou. Junior guard Diana Kersey, who saw some starting duty as a freshman, is from Lubbock, as is freshman guard Patrice Conwright and sophomore reserve forward Janice Farris. Nikki Heath is from Sweetwater.

Getting the picture? This year's aggregation of Lady Raiders are basically a home-grown outfit, hailing mainly from the Panhandle-South Plains.

The main starter not from this area is senior center Jennifer Buck, who is from Conroe. Miss Buck averaged 11.4 points, and had a tremendous basket in Tech's 76-74 win over UT last Saturday in the SWC tournament finals.

Capital Credits Returned

Capital credit checks totaling \$91,184.94 are being mailed this month (March) to West Texas Rural Telephone Cooperative members who received service during 1969.

The total amount to be refunded to customers represents 100 per cent of the capital credits allocated for 1969.

Patronage Capital Credit checks represent profits returned to WTRT members. They are based upon the amount of money paid by members for their local phone service, including equipment, access lines and long distance calls.

Members are paid back a percentage of their annual billing totals in the form of Patronage Capital Credits.

The \$10 fee which individuals pay upon application for telephone service from the cooperative entitles WTRT customers to a membership. Members then become part-owners of the cooperative. According to cooperative bylaws, profits earned by WTRT are to be returned to its members.

Two Races Get Ten Candidates

The Friona City Council and School Board each came up with contested races, as the filing deadline passed on Wednesday.

Four people filed for the two council spots. They were Jim Atwell, Joe Mejia, June Rhodes and Tom Randolph. Mrs. Rhodes is the incumbent. Bobby Jordan did not seek re-election.

For the school board, filing for two places were Danny Black, Terry Wilcox, Jason Grimsley, Mike Martin and Ricky White. Terms of Black and Terry Wilkerson are expiring.

Schlenker Descendants Total 76 Years In Friona Schools

When Ty Potts and Hayes Jones enrolled in Mrs. Cheryl Procter's kindergarten class last fall they made the forty-ninth and fiftieth descendants of the late Charles and Amelia Schlenker, who had attended Friona Schools.

These two are the sons of Larry and Judy Shirley Potts and Joe Bill and Holly Welch Jones. Larry is the son of Helen Schlenker Potts and Holly is the granddaughter of Louisa Schlenker Wilson.

The grandmothers are sisters of Mabelle Schlenker Hartwell, who graduated from Friona High School in 1917. She was the oldest child of the late Charles and Amelia Schlenker, who moved from Iowa to the Rhea Community in 1906. Mabelle, who was eight at the time, was home schooled for two years as there were no schools close enough for her to attend.

She and some of her siblings attended a rural school across the state line in New Mexico one year before the first school was built in the Rhea Community, which she attended several years before enrolling here.

Friona High School was vastly different from what it is today when Mabelle was a student. At that time there were only four teachers in the entire system and the enrollment was less than twenty.

However, they did have a girls basketball team. She remembers, "We wore black bloomers, black stockings and white middy blouses."

She also recalls that one team member had to quit before the season was over because the suits were

R. Downey Medalist In Tourney

The Friona High School girls golf team placed second in their own invitational golf tournament last Thursday, but Renee' Downey won medalist honors with a score of 84.

School's Operating Expenses Are Charted

In 1990-91 school trustees budgeted 30 percent more for operating high schools than for elementary sites. Statewide an average of \$3,280 per student was budgeted for high schools, \$2,645 for the 1,073 middle schools, and \$2,543 per child for the 3,594 elementary schools in Texas. In addition, \$1,014 per student was budgeted for the central office.

For the Friona ISD the figures were \$3873 for high schools, \$2976 for middle schools, and \$2265 for the elementary campuses while \$1217 per student was budgeted for the central office.

The figures come from a new report *Tidemarks 1990-91 School Campus Budgets in Texas*, a publication of the Texas Research League, an Austin-based, educational corporation engaged in governmental research.

Hospital Installs System

Parmer County Community Hospital, in its efforts to better serve the public, is upgrading its accounting system with installation of new computers.

As with most new computer conversions, "bugs" show up that need to be worked out. Computer errors can result in overcharges in some instances, or undercharges.

If any of the hospital's customers receive a bill that they feel is not correct, a phone call to the Hospital Business Office will be appreciated.

The report also lists the amounts for direct classroom instruction. The statewide averages were \$2,366 per student for high schools, \$1,965 for middle schools, and \$2,030 for elementary campuses. For the Friona ISD the comparable figures were \$3045.62 for high schools, \$2485.21 for middle schools, and \$2025.18 for elementary grades.

The report is designed to provide reference points for site-based committees and the taxing public to evaluate future school budgets by types of campuses and for individual high school sites.

Excluding small single-campus schools, there are 1,059 high schools in Texas ranging in size from 83 schools with less than 100 students to seven campuses with more than 3,000 students. For these high schools, \$2,328 was budgeted per students for classroom instruction, or 72.3 percent of the \$3,221 per student for total operating expenses. Locally, Friona High School had \$194 per student for school administration, \$403 for cocurricular activities including extra curricular, and \$145 for guidance and counseling.

The legislature provided in HB 2885 for site-based decisions relating to goal setting, curriculum, budgeting, staffing patterns, and school organization. Proponents contend that school boards and superintendents should grant greater latitude to campus level educators in exchange for an initial promise of more productive educational services for the students.

While there is little evidence to indicate that by itself school-based management will improve student achievement, as a management tool in the right hands, the report concludes that it may be helpful.

40 Yrs. Ago-March 20, 1952

Five new board members were named for the Friona Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture this week in voting that was the heaviest yet in the organization's history.

The five elected were Weldon Dickson, A.L. Black, D.C. Herring, Nelson Welch, and Joe Menefee. Frank A. Spring and Wright Williams are holdover directors.

Von Edelman, son of Mr. and Mrs. W.L. Edelman, will leave soon on an eight-week cruise to Europe in the NAROTC program. He is attending school at the University of New Mexico at Albuquerque.

35 Yrs. Ago-March 7, 1957

Saturday is a big day for qualified voters and taxpayers in the Friona School District. They will be asked to approve or disapprove a request to issue \$350,000 in bonds to provide additional school buildings.

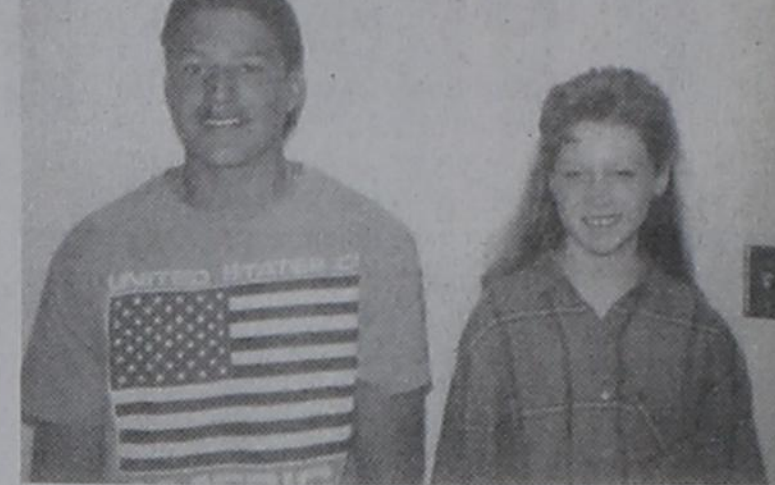

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Soil Moisture Survey Indicates Good Conditions

Soil moisture conditions are better than they have been in many years for Parmer County producers within the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1.

No pre-plant irrigation is needed to bring the five-foot root zone soil profile to field capacity for the 1992 growing season.

"The top three feet of the five-foot soil profile are near field capacity, with small soil moisture deficits occurring at the four and five foot levels. This is the opposite of recent years where the deficits were in the top three feet of the soil," said Wilfred E. "Willie"

Crenwelge, USDA-SCS Soil Scientist.

Two to four inches of water will be needed to wet the top five feet of soil to field capacity over most of Parmer County, according to data collected during the annual joint pre-plant soil moisture survey conducted by the High Plains Water District and the United States Department of Agriculture-Soil Conservation Service (USDA-SCS). The cities of Farwell, Bovina and Friona are included in this area.

An area requiring zero to two inches of soil moisture is found in southeastern Parmer County. This

band begins near the intersection of FM 1172 and 86, then continues southeast along Running Water Draw to the Parmer/Castro County line.

Two areas requiring four to six inches of moisture are found in Parmer County. One area begins at the Parmer/Deaf Smith County line and heads south along FM 1412 to a point just north of Friona. The other area starts at the Parmer/Bailey County line and extends northeast through the Lariat Community, just south of the Oklahoma Lane Community and ends west of Clay's Corner.

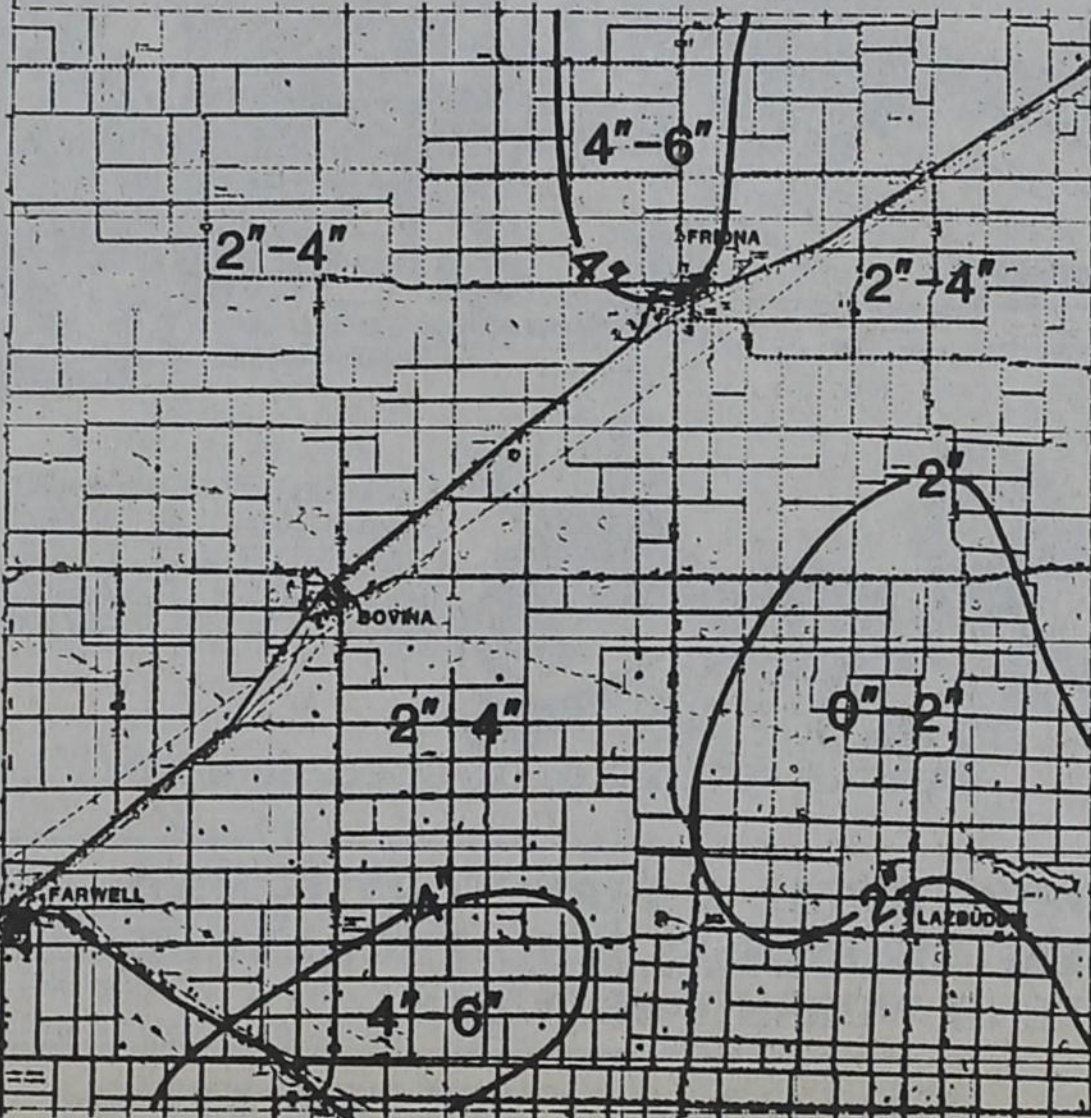
Crenwelge suggests that producers let normal rainfall replenish the deeper soil moisture, since the probability is good that enough precipitation will fall between now and the growing season to fill the deficits.

Soil moisture conditions were surveyed from November 13, 1991, through January 23, 1992, at 270 soil moisture monitoring sites within the 15-county District service area.

However, some sites received additional precipitation after the measurements had been made. In order to provide the most accurate soil moisture information possible to District residents, personnel re-read rain gauges from those soil moisture sites measured from November 14, 1991, through December 16, 1991. They found that additional rainfall had been received at these sites. A second set of soil moisture readings were made at selected sites, and the data was adjusted to reflect these findings.

Soil moisture readings are taken by lowering a neutron probe into a permanently-installed aluminum access tube. Soil density data and rain gauge readings are also recorded during the survey.

TWO TO SIX INCHES of rain is all that's needed in Parmer County to wet the farmland to a depth of five feet. Map from the HPUWCD.

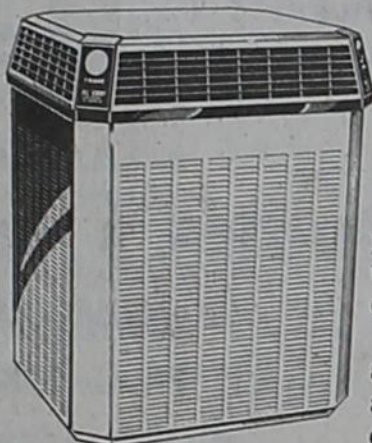

DOUBLE VISION

What causes double vision? There are any number of reasons. If double vision comes on suddenly, it may mean simply that bifocals are misaligned. It's a simple matter to readjust the glasses, or place the reading segment differently. On the other hand, double vision may be the sign of a developing health problem. If it is advisable, your optometrist will refer you to a specialist. In children, though, double vision more often indicates poor eye muscle coordination that can result in crossed eyes. To compensate for the problem, the child's brain may block out the image from one eye, which interferes with normal binocular vision and depth perception. This lack may limit normal school and play activities. Your optometrist can help. After a professional examination, the condition can usually be helped by glasses and/or vision training.

A Vibrant Economy Needs Savers

Our nation is fast becoming one of spenders rather than savers. In fact, the U.S. savings rate, which dropped below 4 per cent in 1991, is much lower than that of many other industrialized countries. Before 1985, the U.S. personal savings rate never fell below 5 per cent, with two brief exceptions shortly after World War II.

Low savings, or "dissavings"--spending more than one earns--could become a vicious national economic cycle. William Dudley, a senior economist at Goldman, Sachs and Co., says that low personal savings rates keep production growth low, which keeps real wages from increasing, further depressing savings rates.

One proposal for breaking this cycle comes from the book, "The Vanishing Nest Egg: Reflections on Savings in America" (Twentieth Century Fund, \$9.95) by B. Douglas Bernheim, who holds an endowed chair in economics at Princeton University.

In the book, Bernheim suggests increasing the personal savings rate by creating an account that would put a floor under savings incentives rather than a cap above them.

These accounts would be similar to today's IRAs. Instead of the \$2,000 cap and other restrictions, however, savers above a specified percentage of a taxpayer's adjusted gross income (AGI) would be tax sheltered and would qualify as a tax

deduction. Lower income families might be allowed to deduct everything they put into such a savings plan. Higher income families, on the other hand, would have to achieve a certain level of savings before qualifying for the tax advantages.

For example, a family with a \$100,000 AGI might have to save 15 per cent, or \$15,000, to qualify. All savings or investments above that would receive the tax break.

Another feature of Bernheim's proposal is to create accounts for special, designated purposes--retirement, college education or the purchase of a first home. Money withdrawn from these accounts and used for the designated purpose would not be subject to tax penalties or other restrictions. The accounts could be funded with savings, stocks, bonds or contributions to a pension plan. All would count toward the savings floor. Finally, existing tax shelters would not lose their status.

Of course, some economists believe the savings rate is primed to rise because the baby boomers are becoming more attuned to financial objectives other than spending. High on their list is preparing for retirement and for the costs of educating their offspring.

Regardless, it's important to remember that to keep your economy vibrant, taxpayers must have an incentive to invest and save. Here's hoping the message gets out before it's too late.
