Lions Broom Sale Set For April 16



Residents are urged to check their cleaning supplies, and support the Lions during this annual fundraising activity.



Since you did not bother to sign your letter, I do not know who you are, but if you will contact me personally, the next time we have severe weather, I will call you and you can go with us and we'll see if you can do a better job.

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

residents qualifying for financial assistance.

Early detection of breast cancer is the major goal of cancer control for each woman seen in the clinic. The clinic provides low cost screening which includes a breast exam by a Registered Nurse trained in breast cancer detection, teaching of breast self-examination and a mammogram.

Currently, the most effective method known to win the battle against breast cancer is early detection. Early detection is best done by following the guidelines recommended by the American Cancer Society for breast screening for women who have no signs or symptoms of breast cancer.

The guidelines are: (1) Learn and perform breast self-examination; (2) Have a physical examination every year; (3) Have a mammogram according to the recommendations by age. Age 35-40, one baseline mammogram; 40-50, a mammogram every 1-2 years; over 50, yearly mammograms.

A clinic will be held in Friona on Wednesday, May 20 from 10 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. at Parmer County Community Hospital, 1307 Cleveland. Exams are done by appointment only.

COLOR DEFICIENCIES

People aren't really color-blind. Everyone sees some color, but certain individuals are color-deficient: they have difficulty differentiating between specific colors. The most common problem: being unable to tell red from green.

As it happens, in our automotive society, it is particularly important to be able to distinguish between red and green, stop and go, danger and safety Color-deficient pedestrians and drivers must learn to interpret whatever it is they see in place of those colors so they can function on streets and roads.

Your optometrist will test your eyes for color deficiency. The usual test is a chart on which numbers made up of dots in various shades of green are integrated into a background of dots in various shades of red. Most people have no difficulty picking out the number; those who do are color-deficient to some degree. Males are more likely to be color-deficient than are females.
