Chiefs Edge Mules; Take District Lead

IF YOU SAW the "Prime Time Live" program Thursday night, you no doubt saw the latest "hatchet job" that the ABC network did on the beef packing industry.

ABC proudly touted Thursday's episode with a half-page ad in this past week's issue of TV Guide, which showed a picture of a meat cleaver. The caption stated "Watch us take one of these to the meat industry. Tonight, Prime Time Live goes undercover in some of the biggest meat packing houses in America. When you see what our hidden cameras reveal, you may decide to become a vegetarian on the spot."

The ABC network touted Thursday's program as exposing food safety issues. Beef industry officials claim that instead, it pushes the vegetarian agenda.

The focus of the program was the U.S.D.A.'s proposed new Streamlined Inspection System (SIS-Cattle). SIS is being tested in five beef packing plants.

The underlying issue, according to beef industry leaders, is a fight by the inspectors' union to preserve jobs. The SIS program slightly reduces the number of inspectors needed, compared to traditional inspection. Packing industry officials say that the inspectors are using ABC to advance their case.

An ABC film crew gained entry into Montford, Inc.'s plant at Greeley, Colorado, posing as inspectors. They used USDA inspection badges and uniforms, and had cameras and sound equipment hidden in their hard hats. An inspector reportedly admitted helping ABC to gain entry in this manner.

At one of the Montford plants, an inspector was said to have deliberately contaminated beef, and then sent it to laboratories for analysis in an attempt to build a case to prove that the SIS isn't working. Beef industry officials are wondering if inspectors at any of the plants staged anything for the ABC cameras.

The Excel Corp. was asked by ABC to film inside its plants. Excel was considering the request when an ABC crew "ambush-interviewed" Friona's plant manager, Terry Wilkerson, according to Excel spokesman Greg Lauser.

Beef packers say that under SIS, beef is even safer. They say that the meat inspectors' union is using primitive scare tactics to fight USDA changes. "This is a job preservation and union issue, not food safety," a spokesman for the industry said.

It is hard to realize that the ABC network would stoop to such tactics as disguising themselves as USDA inspectors in order to get cameras into the packing plants for this program. And if it's true that this is mainly a labor dispute by the inspector's union, what kind of respect can the network hope to maintain?

We have felt for some time that the networks have developed "sleeze TV," in an obvious effort to compete with the tabloid newspapers you see at the supermarket checkout stands.

These newspaper tabloids, through the years, have degenerated to the point that no one takes them seriously at all, and many of us like to glance at them (you don't buy one unless you're out of town), just to see what ridiculous headlines they have this week.

With such "superstars" as Sam Donaldson and Geraldo Rivera leading the way, the good news, as regards the beef industry, is that it shouldn't be too long before these hyped-up TV shows will get the same reaction, if they are not already.

SPEAKING OF TV, what are they trying to prove, in regard to the language used these days? We heard the word "penis" used five times in a program's opening scene. Where will it all end?

The Friona Chieftains opened District 2-3A play here Tuesday with a come-from-behind 9-8 win over the Muleshoe Mules. The win was the Chiefs' first-ever district win since resuming baseball last season, and it gave them the early district lead.

Charlie Snead's line-drive single with runners on second and third and two men out brought Seth Houston home with the winning run in what turned out to be an uphill battle for the Chieftains.

The win staked the Chiefs to a 1-0 district record. The team stands 9-5 on the season, prior to visiting Dimmitt on Saturday for their second district outing.

The game was an up-and-down affair. Friona took a 1-0 lead after the first inning, but Muleshoe rallied for a 4-1 lead after their half of the second. Scott Houston's booming three-run homer regained the lead for Friona at 5-4 after two, but Muleshoe quickly tied the score at 5-5 in the top of the third inning.

It stayed that way until Muleshoe scored three runs in their sixth after two were out, and the Chieftains had to respond with a run in their half of the sixth, and then the game-winning three in their last at-bat.

Starter Tony Cuevas pitched commendably for Friona, until the Mules staged the two-out rally in the sixth. Pat Upton came on, and got all four men he faced, striking out two of them. That made Upton the winner, his fourth win against a single loss.

Upton's one-out single in the bottom of the first inning led to Friona's first run. Julian Colunga singled him to third, and Chad Hamilton brought him home with a sacrifice fly. Colunga was out at third trying to advance, but Friona had grabbed an early 1-0 lead.

Muleshoe took the lead in their next at-bat. A pair of walks by Cuevas and a pair of hits by the Mules set the stage, but Muleshoe's aggressive base-running forced a

throwing error that led to two of the Mules' runs. It took a great catch of a long fly ball off the bat of Hartwick by Julian Colunga at the centerfield fence to end the uprising, as Muleshoe took a 4-1 lead.

Friona matched Muleshoe's four-spot in their half of the inning. Junior Trevino singled, and Roy Hendley worked Mule starter Shawn Noble for a walk. Cuevas singled to score Trevino, and that brought up catcher Scott Houston.

Houston tied into Noble's first pitch, and sent it high over the centerfield fence, scoring Henley and Cuevas in front of him, and giving the Chieftains a 5-4 lead.

Once again, the lead didn't last long. Cuevas hit Roberts to start Muleshoe's third inning, and then walked Hernandez on four pitches. The runners moved up on steals, and Roberts scored on an infield out. Cuevas got Mike Guana to hit a grounder back to him, and Houston threw Hernandez out at third base to end the threat. However, Muleshoe had tied the score at 5-5.

Cuevas then settled down to retire eight of the next 11 Muleshoe batters, including three strikeouts.

But with two out in the sixth, Muleshoe rallied with four straight hits. Josh Bacon's line drive got past the diving Chad Hamilton, scoring the go-ahead runs for the Mules, and then Mike Hardwick's wind-blown double scored Alanis and Muleshoe had an 8-5 lead. Upton came in to strike out Roberts to end the inning.

Friona scored a single run in their half of the sixth when Charlie Snead, in off the bench, got on by a fielder's choice, stole a base and scored when the Mules' shortstop couldn't field Scott Houston's hot grounder.

Then after Upton set the Mules down 1-2-3 in the top of the seventh, that set the stage for Friona's final rally.

Time Change Noted For Baseball

The baseball game here Tuesday between Floydada and Friona, originally scheduled for 5 p.m., has been moved up to 4 p.m., according to school officials.

All of the other game times will remain as originally scheduled. This game was adjusted due to other conflicts involving the players.

Upton led off with a double that bounced over the right-centerfield fence. After Colunga grounded out, Chad Hamilton socked a double off the left-center fence, scoring Upton and making it an 8-7 game. Seth Houston singled, and Trevino's line shot scored Hamilton with the tying run.

Hardwick, who pitched five innings of great relief for the Mules, bore down to strike out Ryan Sifford with runners on second and third. That set the stage for Snead, who socked the game-winning hit.

Friona Coach Todd Lamberson said the win should be a big confidence-booster for the Chiefs, especially as it was the district-opener. "That should do a lot for the kids' morale--I was real proud for them. We played well for the most part, except for some throwing mistakes that got us in trouble," the Chieftain coach said.

Lamberson also praised the all-star catch by centerfielder Colunga that saved a couple of runs in the second, and the play of shortstop Junior Trevino.

"I wish he'd have gotten active in athletics a lot earlier. He made some big-time plays for us--but he's a senior," Lamberson added.

Officials Seek Help

Friona Primary School is asking for assistance in efforts to contact all parents of children who qualify for the pre-kindergarten program for the 1992-93 school year.

A pre-kindergarten enrollment has been scheduled for the week of May 4-8 in the Primary Building. Please come by the Primary School during the school day at your convenience to enroll.

To be eligible for pre-kindergarten, a child must be four years of age, on or before September 1, 1992, and unable to comprehend the English language or is at or below subsistence level.

Parents are asked to bring their child's birth certificate, immunization record, proof of income, proof of federal assistance, if any, proof of insurance, if any, and Social Security card. This information will be recorded and returned to the parents.

Please note: your child is required to have a series of DPT and Polio immunizations as well as a booster since the child's fourth birthday. An MMR immunization and an Hib immunization are also required. "We urge you to take care of this immediately. Your child will not be able to begin the new school year until all immunizations are complete," a school official said.

"If you know of some child who will qualify for pre-kindergarten, please have the parents come by the Friona Primary Building during the pre-kindergarten registration week of May 4-8," it was stated.

Polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.



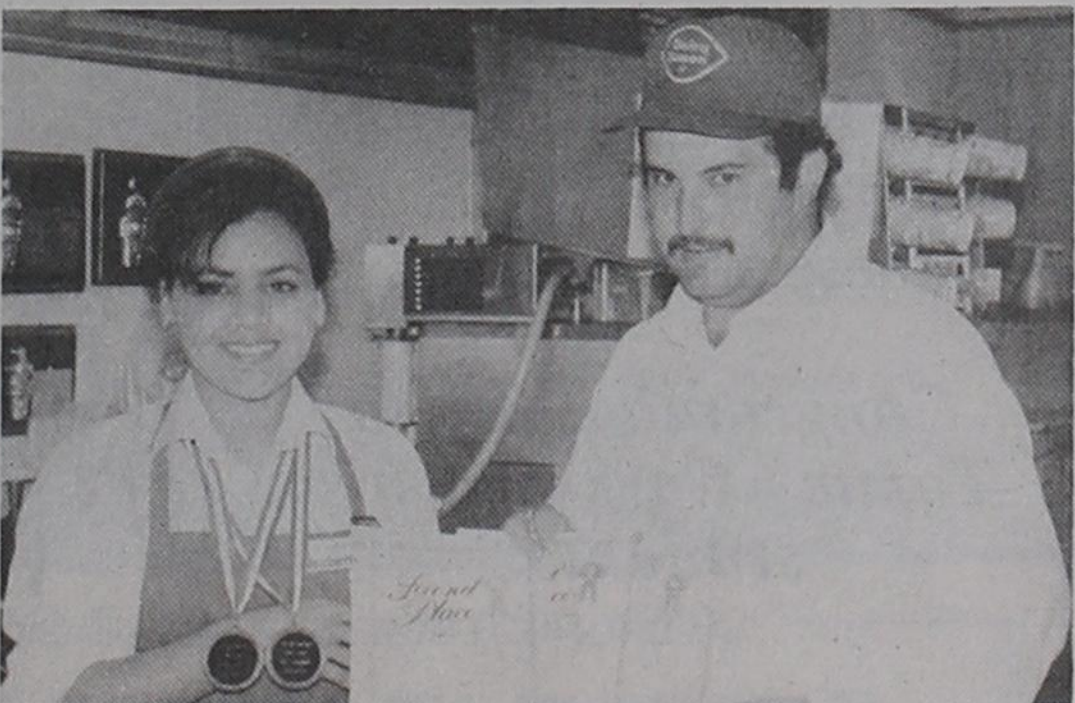

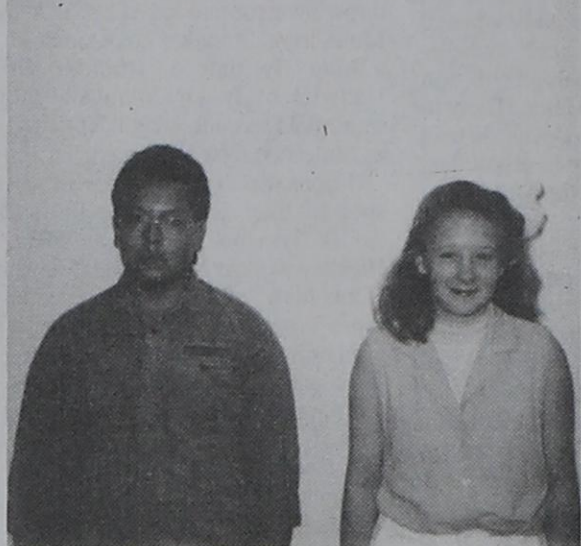

She is a graduate of Hale Center High School, and holds an Associates degree from Texas Tech University's Amarillo campus. She and her husband Alex are parents of three children: Alex, Jr., six, Ashley, five, and Bethany, two.

The schedule for the Friona office for the P.C.S. will be 8 a.m.-12 noon and 1-5 p.m., Mondays and Thursdays. In addition, Mrs. Trevino will be at the Courthouse in Farwell from 8:30 a.m.-12 noon on Fridays.

"I hope to build up the Parmer County office and make the residents more aware of our services," Mrs. Trevino said.

Panhandle Community Services is a private non-profit corporation chartered by the State of Texas in 1965. The primary purpose of the agency, as a human delivery system, is to marshal the available resources from the public and private sectors in such a way as to efficiently provide for the needs of the people living in the Texas Panhandle.

P.C.S. currently serves clients in the 26 counties of the Texas Panhandle. The administrative operation consists of a central office in Amarillo, with 13 satellite centers strategically located throughout the area--such as the center in Friona.

Among the programs operated

by the Parmer County office of P.C.S. are the following:

*Existing Rental Assistance--assists eligible households in paying rental costs for approved standard rental housing units.

*Operation Bootstrap--provides assistance for those eligible who are seeking post-secondary training, to complete within a two-year time frame.

*Weatherization--Aids those eligible in installation of weather stripping, storm windows, caulking, solid core doors, insulation of attics or repair to existing doors and windows to prevent air infiltration.

*Panhandle Transit--transportation services for the general public in rural areas of the Texas Panhandle. No eligibility requirements.

*Energy Crisis--to assist qualified elderly, handicapped, disabled, and low-income families with a crisis situation related to utility bills.

Immunization Clinics Scheduled For May

Immunization clinics offering vaccines that give protection against several childhood diseases are scheduled for May.

Protection is against polio, diphtheria, lockjaw (tetanus), whooping cough (pertussis), measles, rubella, mumps, and HIB (Haemophilus Influenzae Type B).

The Texas Department of Health is charging fees to help with the cost of keeping the clinic open. The amount of money charged will be based on family income and size, and the ability to pay.

The towns nearest Friona and Bovina holding clinics are Hereford

and Dimmitt. Hereford's clinic is held at the Texas Department of Health Office, 205 West Fourth Street. Dates and times are: May 7, 14 and 21 from 9-11:30 a.m. and 1-4 p.m.

Dimmitt's location is the Castro County Expo building, 403 S.E. Fourth Street and the dates are May 19 and 22 from 9-11:30 a.m. and 1-3 p.m.

Southwest Outdoors

By Mel Phillips

After interviewing the winners from over 50 fishing tournaments, I have learned several important 'secrets' that might help you catch more fish.

Lesson 1. Never ask a successful fisherman, "Where did you catch the fish?" He really doesn't want to reveal the exact location of the honey holes. Better questions are, "How deep were you fishing? What kind of structure is holding active fish? When were the fish most active?" Most anglers are so relieved that you are not trying to discover their holes that they will discuss in detail what, where and when the fish were biting.

Lesson 2. Be a good listener. A good silent head-nod will encourage your source to keep talking. Finally, asking about his favorite line size will invariably lead to a detailed description of how to work his favorite lure.

If you know the depth of structure that holds active fish and learn how to work a proven fish-catching line, then catching more fish is just a matter of time.

According to Dr. Loren Hill, water temperature is an important factor when deciding which gamefish you can expect to be actively feeding.

45-55 degrees: walleye will move to the rip-rap one to five feet deep. Night fishing with a count-down Rapala can be excellent.

50-55 degrees: white bass (Sand bass) will roam up-stream looking for sandy creeks. A chrome RattleTrap or Little George can load the boat.

55-68 degrees: crappie will be found in brush on gravel banks three to eight feet deep. Brush eats crappie jigs, but they are cheap. A jig-and-minnow can catch some of nature's best eating.

62-68 degrees: smallmouth bass are looking for calm water with large rocks in pea-gravel banks near creek channels with access to

some 20' water. Jigs tipped with minnows can be slowly worked down the drop-offs.

62-75 degrees: largemouth bass are looking for gravel spawning banks one 1/2 to four feet deep. Spinnerbaits catch the active bass while lizards or gitzits work on the bigger fish. Try different line sizes. If you can see the bass, then use eight lb. or less.

75-78 degrees: channel-catfish prowl the shoreline ledges searching for holes or submerged trees in 18-40'. Catfish will eat almost anything. Try chicken-liver, blood-bait, minnows, or cutbait.

Warning--One of the attractions of fishing is its unpredictability. I have caught catfish in January and been skunked on bass during the middle of the spawn.

Spring turkey season ends Sunday, May 3, 1992.

The American Angus Association is the largest beef registry association in the world, with over 24,000 active adult and junior members.

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

According to a recent report by the Oklahoma part of my family, those of us who have not eaten at The Medicine Mound Depot Restaurant in Quannah, Texas, have missed a rare treat. It is located on U.S. Highway 287 and features mesquite broiled steaks, chicken and seafood.

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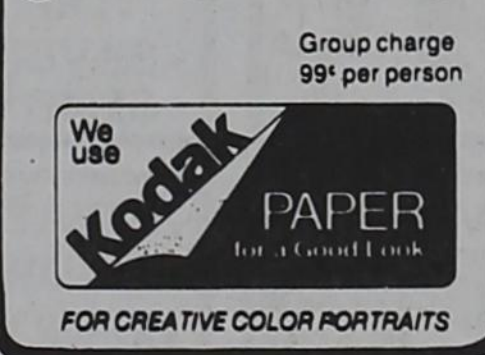

MORE LIGHT TO SEE BETTER

Older eyes need more light to see with. With age, the pupils tend to get smaller, allowing less light to enter the eye and strike the retina. In addition, the lens clouding of a developing cataract may further block light from entering the eye.

Fortunately, it is possible to compensate to some extent by increasing the intensity of room light or moving its source closer for any visual tasks. For example, moving a lamp from six feet away to two feet away from printed material actually increases light on the page nine times. Ideally, light should be directed so that it comes over the left shoulder of a right-handed person--vice versa for lefties--in order to avoid glare and shadows from a pen or pencil. In low-lighted areas, especially at night, it's advisable to carry a flash-light.

Older eyes need regular optometric examination, too, to identify and treat any underlying problems.

Don't Let Investing Mistakes Shortchange You

Mistakes are part of learning, but they need not be disasters. Investing mistakes are no exception. Here are some of the most common investment mistakes and suggestions on how to avoid them.

Mistake number one is to hold only cash. Although cash or low-yielding, fixed-income investments might appear secure, they are actually losing value to inflation and missed opportunities in long-term investments. Prudent investors always maintain a reasonable amount of cash or readily available money-market funds. How much depends on comfort levels and individual needs. The mistake is holding too much cash and not letting it work for you.

Mistake number two is fear of taxes. Too often, national investors throw money into a tax scam on the promise that they can "write it off." Be reasonable. If you earn \$100 and pay \$30 in taxes, you still have \$70 left to spend. If you "outsmart" the IRS and lose \$100, about the best you can reasonably hope for is to save \$30 in taxes when you "write it off."

Mistake number three is, blindly looking for the highest yields. Be aware of current yields offered by securities similar in quality and maturity to those you want to buy. For example, if you want maximum safety for the next ten years and AAA corporate bonds are offering about nine per cent, be suspicious of anything paying considerably more but promising equal se-

curity.

Mistake number four is buying investments you don't understand. Every investment is bought with the hope of future profit. The bigger the profit, however, the bigger the risk. Unfortunately, investments are sometimes sold by magnifying the possible rewards and ignoring the imminent risks. It is your responsibility to understand your investment enough to decide if it meets your needs and risk tolerances while offering a reasonable chance of achieving what it promises.

Mistake number five is buying and forgetting. Today's economy is in a constant state of change. Depending on current conditions, sound investments can quickly lose their favor. A complete annual investment review, along with regular monitoring, is recommended. When things begin to erode or fail to meet your expectations, don't ignore them.

Mistake number six is not admitting a mistake once you realize it. Investment mistakes are inevitable. Allowing them to compound without correction, however, is inexcusable. Re-evaluate your investment in light of what you now know. Would you still buy it? If your investment is not performing as you expect, limit your loss and get out.

The list goes on, but these six investment mistakes are the most common ones. Consider your own experience. Once a mistake is made, correct it and make every effort to avoid repeating it. But don't panic and stop investing. That's another mistake.

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
