The special train will leave at 7 a. m., and will arrive in Amarillo at 9:20. Hundreds of automobile parties will also go, and will leave Plainview under the management of L. P. Barker at 6 a. m., and will be in Amarillo when the special train arrives, following which there will be a gigantic parade through the streets of Amarillo, with the Plainview Boys' Band leading, and under the direction of Ray Knoohuizen, grand marshal.

The meeting at Amarillo will be possibly the largest ever held on the Plains, and will center the eyes of the people of the state on the Plains for the location of the Tech. college.

It is announced that eleven towns will send secial trains to the meeting. Those in the vicinity are Plainview. Floydada, Lockney, Lubbock, Canyon and the others will come from above Amarillo on the Santa Fe and from the towns on the Denver road.
