BRIEF FOR TECH IS SUBMITTED

COMMITTEE LEAVES FOR AUS. TIN TO MEET WITH LOCAT-ING COMMITTEE

Col. R. P. Smyth, C. S. Williams and A. E. Boyd left yesterday morning for Austin to formally submit to the locating committee the brief of Piainview for the Texas Technological college, and it will be place i before the committee today most likely. The brief is a very handsome book. containing a complete resume of the many resources of the Plainview coun

try, and putting forth the advantages of locating the institution here. There are sixty-five handsome pictures of farms, irrigation plants, industries, residences, streets, public and educational institutions, etc. Statistics are given on a number of subjects.

The brief was compiled by a committee composed of Col. R. P. Smyth, C. S. Williams, A. G. Hinn, E. H. Perry, Winfield Holbrook, John Lucas John Boswell, H. S. Hilburn, E. P. Miller and J. M. Adams, and should make a very favorable impression on the locating committee.

The local committee has had a num ber of additional copies of the brief printed and bound in paper and these will be for distribution within a week or so.

Building Large Oil Tank

A force of twenty men are working on the big oil storage station b-ing built here by the Santa Fe railway. One of the largest steel under ground storage tanks in West Texas is being erected over a large underground storage tank. Several buildings and a large amount of machinery is a part of the plant. A rack for unloading tank cars of oil is being built. It will be possible to emp'y six cars at one time on this rack. The estimated cost of these improvements is \$25,000. Similar stations are being built at Amarillo, Slaton and Dermott
